To be served or to serve? (1 Samuel 11:1-15 & Mark 10:35-45)

Recap

Let's remind ourselves of the story so far

[PowerPoint 1-Recap]

- The people of Israel unhappy with the prospect of having the prophet
 Samuel's corrupt sons as their leaders have asked for a King a King
 like the other nations
- But of course, they <u>already</u> have a King God Himself
- So, there were rejecting God as their King
- Nevertheless God gave them the King they asked for
- The Prophet Samuel anointed Saul a man from the tribe of Benjamin as
 the King in private
- His mission was to deliver the people from the *Philistines* and *govern the* people (1 Sam 9:16-17) and to wait for instructions from God (1 Sam 10:7-8)
- Then last week, we saw that Saul was then publicly coronated as King
- Then he went back to his hometown of Gibeah to wait for God to tell him what to do next

- And there was a mixed response to Saul being crowned as King
 - o 10:24 Long live the King!
 - o 10:27 Some scoundrels said "How can this fellow save us?"
- For some, Saul would have to prove himself before they would accept him

Which bring us to today's passage from 1 Samuel 11 [which you can turn to now]

The Problem (1 Samuel 11:1-4)

Picking up from 1 Samuel 11 - verses 1 to 4 - there was a problem for one of the towns of Israel - a place called *Jabesh Gilead* [Explain Map]

[PowerPoint 2-Problem/Map]

- Nahash, the leader of the Ammonites went up to attack town of Jabesh Gilead
- This Israeli town Jabesh Gilead has a *checkered history* from back in Judges chapter 21 they were the town that refused to assemble with the rest of the tribes of Israel to punish the tribe of Benjamin for a dreadful thing the Benjamites did in Judges chapter 19
- Israel also had history with the Ammonites there was a claim in Judges 11 that Israel had stolen land from the Ammonites - when the Israelites came out of Egypt - and entered into the Promised Land
- So, here in 1 Samuel 11
- Nahash, the Ammonite, was trying to take advantage of the fact that Israel
 was in the early days of their Kingship and disorganized by bringing
 disgrace on Israel by defeating Jabesh Gilead and giving himself some
 glory and prestige and fame

- Nahash wanted Jabesh Gilead to serve him
- Nahash basically gave Jabesh Gilead 2 choices
 - o Either they surrender and become Nahash's servants
 - Or they make a treaty with Nahash where Nahash will gouge out their right eyes
 - The problem with gouging out their right eyes (apart from being very painful) it would mean they can't fight normally a shield is held in the left hand covering left eye and a sword in right hand but they won't be able see. Also having eyesight in one eye = means no depth of vision
- Is there a way out for Jabesh Gilead?
- They bought some time by asking for 7 days to see if the rest of Israel would help
- Nahash must be pretty confident they won't get help to allow Jabesh Gilead 7 days to come up with the help
- And given the history of Jabesh Gilead's disobedience back in Judges 21 there's no quarantee the rest of Israel will help
- But remember, they <u>are</u> God's people and God is in control...
- So, the elders of Jabesh Gilead sent messengers throughout Israel asking for help
- When the messengers came to Saul's hometown of Gibeah? The people of Gibeah wept. They can see the dilemma for Jabesh Gilead but remember also the people of Saul's hometown did haven't a high opinion of Saul as King they didn't think he would be able to save anyone!

The Solution (1 Samuel 11:5-11)

Which brings us to the solution to the problem - verses 5 to 11

[PowerPoint 4-Solution]

- In v5 = Saul returned from the fields where he'd been working with his oxen
- From this we can see Saul was a humble guy going about his normal work until the Lord called him into action
- When Saul found out what the situation was and that Jabesh Gilead was under threat from the Ammonites there was a turning point in verse 6 immediately the Spirit of God is with Saul. From this we can deduce that God is not going to stand for this injustice against His people, Israel
- Saul was angry it's okay to be angry about injustice Saul's anger was righteous anger it's okay to be angry but we shouldn't sin in our anger as the Apostle Paul says in Ephesians 4:26 in your anger do not sin
- Saul was also decisive in v7 he chopped up his pair of oxen and sent the pieces by messenger to the whole of Israel calling them to act and follow Saul & Samuel by mentioning *Samuel the man of God* Saul was showing this is *God's plan* to stand against the Ammonites, not just Saul's plan.
- Saul warned the Israelites if they didn't stand together with Saul and Samuel their oxen would <u>also</u> be chopped up this would mean a loss in their livelihood
- So, the tribes of Israel mustered 300,000 from tribes of Israel and
 30,000 from Judah they gathered together at a place called Bezek [near Gilgal?]

- The gathered tribes promised the messengers from Jabesh Gilead that Jabesh Gilead would be rescued by the next day
- The men of Jabesh Gilead now full of confidence knowing they would be rescued - deceived the Ammonites into thinking that they would surrender by the next day
- Meanwhile Saul made a decisive strategic plan he made 3 divisions of his army and attacked and destroyed the Ammonites overnight
- He scattered the Ammonites so there was no chance of them regrouping
- It's was a great victory
- And it was Saul's first battle which gained him great credibility as being the sort of king the people wanted and had asked God for.
- It was a unifying victory silencing Saul's doubters

Response - Glory to God (1 Samuel 11:12-15)

After the victory - there was a response by Saul and the people - that's in verses 12 to 15

[PowerPoint 4-Response]

- In v12 some people wanted to take revenge on those who had doubted Saul those that said that Saul wouldn't be able to save anyone - they wanted those doubters killed
- But Saul decisively said No! and he attributed the victory to God and gave God all the glory see another key verse v13 'this day the Lord has rescued Israel' a lesson for us to attributed our victories and blessings in life to God!

- It would have been a grave mistake for Saul to have defeated the enemy and then agree to start killing their own people
- Satan can trick us into fighting amongst ourselves instead of giving glory to
 God and staying united under God
- Instead Samuel took the opportunity to confirm the kingship of Saul
- Saul had proven himself as a worthy king -
- So, they made sacrifices to God in thanks and had a fellowship meal
 together
- Saul had served the people well
- It was celebration time:

Hava nagila, Hava nagila, Hava nagila, Ve' nismecha.

- This all worked out because Saul was a Godly king
- And it will only continue to work out whilst Saul remains a Godly King and not a king like the other nations – who serve other false gods and serve themselves and look to glorify themselves – like Nahash, the Ammonite did.

A Servant King (Mark 10:35-45)

Which brings us to our NT passage today from Mark 10:35-45 [Please turn there now]

- And as we think about serving and who gets the glory
- In this passage

[PowerPoint 5-Servant King]

- Two of Jesus' disciples James and John they want the glory they want to be recognised and sit at Jesus' right and left hand
- Just like Nahash the Ammonite wanted the glory and prestige and power of defeating God's people James and John want to glorify themselves
- But thankfully, Jesus doesn't think or operate like James and John nor
 Nahash
- Jesus is a different leader a different king He says if you want to come first in His kingdom - you have to be last and serve people - not be served and glorify yourselves or be glorified.

Jesus says here He's a different kind of King - He came - not to be served - but to serve - and to give his life as a ransom for many.

In other words - he's a king who goes into battle against the enemy of sin - and defeats the punishment for sin - by taking the punishment for all of us - and dying for sin. Nahash wouldn't do that - because there's no glory - he thinks - in dying for his subjects.

Jesus challenged James and John - that they don't know what their asking - being a follower of Jesus - means the glorify comes in - doing what Jesus does - and being sacrificial and serving in our lives - even perhaps facing death like Jesus. James and John want the glory without doing anything sacrificial - but just getting the glory for being Jesus' mates. But that's not what followers of Jesus are supposed to be like - Jesus says. His followers have to be self-sacrificing, servant like - loving and serving others - not serving themselves - not being served - not looking for glory - but being serving and humble - like Jesus was all the time - and like Saul was in this story.

Applications

[PowerPoint 6]

3 applications for us to take home today...

- 1. What if I told you *Nahash's* name means "serpent" or "snake" it throws a different light on things. Just like the serpent in the Garden of Eden was Satan Nahash the serpent is a picture of Satan and evil and what Satan can do.
 - Satan wants our surrender to him but remember he's a defeated enemy
 - Satan wants us to serve him and will attempt to intimidate us into giving into him and have us thinking of things which are not God's way
 like James and John looking for glory instead of realizing God gets all the glory. We can be tricked into thinking we need glory, power and status
 - Satan wants to blind us like Nahash threatened to blind the people of Jabesh Gilead. If Satan can't blind us completely he will blind us partially and have us ineffective

[PowerPoint 6a-App1]

- We need to be alert to Satan's tricks and claiming God's help and protection in prayer!
- God should be our *first resort* for help and protection not our <u>last</u>
 resort!

[PowerPoint 6b-App2]

2. In the story from 1 Samuel 11 - King Saul attributed his success <u>entirely</u> to God - in the key verse - v13 - this day the Lord has rescued Israel. In the same way our Lord, Jesus - the ultimate Godly King - rescued us from the danger and enemy of sin. He is a King who fights and defeats the enemy of sin and is prepared to die for his subjects - because he came to serve - not to be served. He saved us instead of himself. We need to model our lives on him - always bringing Glory to God - as Saul did and as Jesus always did - modelling Jesus will look like serving others sacrificially rather than serving ourselves and looking for glory like James and John did

[PowerPoint 6c-App3]

3. But how are we going to do that serving? Well the turning point in 1 Sam
11 is v6 - The Spirit of God came powerfully upon him (Saul). It's the Holy
Spirit - that makes all the difference in our lives too - He empowers us.
See the Apostle Paul's advice in Galatians 5:22-25: 22 But the fruit of the
Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness,
faithfulness, 23 gentleness and self-control. Against such things there
is no law. 24 Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the
flesh with its passions and desires. 25 Since we live by the Spirit, let
us keep in step with the Spirit.

So, our lives need to be spirit-filled lives - keeping in step with the Holy

Spirit - and claiming the fruit of the Spirit

Take a look at the fruit - which in that list - do we need work on any of them - to claim them for our lives? If we were in step with the Holy Spirit

- this fruit of the Spirit - would show itself in our lives as humble, loving and serving - always seeking to give God the glory

So, a challenge to finish with, then...

Would we say - with honest self-assessment - that we are currently here $\underline{to\ be}$ served or

that we are currently here <u>to</u> serve? (pause)

Are there changes we need to make? Let's pray...
