Dealing with Doubt (Proverbs 3:5-8, 1 Samuel 27 & John 20:24-29)

There are **Bibles** in front of you

And we're looking at 1 Samuel chapter 27 - and we'll also be referring to Proverbs 3:5-8 and John 20:24-29.

Let me ask God for His help and guidance first - let's pray...

Intro/Doubt

I don't' know if you're like this

If I turn up for a meeting or an appointment - and no one else is there - my first thought is - Oh - maybe I got the wrong day - or maybe I got the wrong time?

(pause)

Today we're looking at doubt -

Well - at least I thought that's what we were looking at? (pause)

So first up then - we'd better have a definition of doubt

[PowerPoint 1-Definition]

Feeling uncertain or lacking confidence about something or someone

In this chapter David is doubting God is with him

[PowerPoint 2-David's Doubts God]

- Even though God helped him defeat Goliath
- Even though God anointed him as the next King of Israel

- Even though God has preserved David from being killed by Saul,
- Even though God prevented David from foolishly wiping out Nabal by sending Abigail
- Even though God gave David a beautiful and wise wife, Abigail
- Even though David previously trusted God to take vengeance against Saul, when David had 2 opportunities to kill Saul

But now in verse 1 of chapter 27

David <u>thought to himself</u>, "One of these days I will be destroyed by the hand of Saul..."

Why would David think like this - when he has been shown clearly that God is with him and he will be the next king - and Saul will not prevail?

David has doubt - because he's just like us - isn't he?

(pause)

[PowerPoint 3-What things?]

What things do we doubt God about?

Here's a few to choose from

- Is God real? Maybe the sceptics and Atheists are right?
- Is God really listening?
- Will God help me this time? Like He has in the past? He helped me with 2 big problems before maybe he won't help this time
- Does Jesus really take away my sins?
- Will we really go to *Heaven*?
- Is the **Bible** really **true**?
- And so on...

Personally, my doubts come when I'm tired - lupus - affects my thinking when I'm tired - and I get cognitive clouding - and start to doubt. Is there another sermon in this head of mine? Will God get me thru' this visit from Presbytery? (pause)

We all doubt - don't we?

But, does doubt come from God?

(pause)

The very first expression of doubt in the Bible is in Genesis chapter 3 - when Satan tempted Eve - and said - "Did God really say," You must not eat from any tree in the garden'?" (v1) - Satan wanted Eve to lack confidence in God's command. When Eve confirmed God's command, including the consequences, Satan replied with a denial, which is a stronger statement of doubt - v4: "You will not surely die." Doubt is a tool of Satan to make us lack confidence in God's Word and consider His judgment unlikely.

But we can't lay all the blame at Satan's door - the Bible also shows <u>we</u> are accountable for our own doubts - when Zechariah was told by an angel. he would have a son (John the B) in his old age (Luke 1) - he doubted that God could overcome the obstacles of age. Anytime we allow human reason to overshadow faith in God - sinful doubt is the result.

But the apostle Paul says - nothing is impossible for God - God has made wisdom of this world foolish (1 Cor 1:20).

In this chapter (27 of 1 Samuel) there is no mention of God - and no mention of David consulting with God. Doubt often leaves God out of the picture all together - and has us going it alone - that's what David is like in this chapter Page 3 of 12

So, let's look at the problem with doubt in this chapter

The Problem with Doubt (1 Samuel 27)

[PowerPoint 4-Heading]

Looking at verse 1 of chapter 27 - we see how the doubt comes in

But David thought to himself, "One of these days I will be destroyed by
the hand of Saul"

David's doubt comes because he *relies on himself* - and it was *his thoughts* - and *not God's plan* - that he was *focusing on*

[PowerPoint 4a-Discouragement]

And this doubt leads to DISCOURAGEMENT and FEAR - David doubts God's protection and fears one day Saul will kill him - even though God has shown He is with David all the way

Application - But aren't we like that? We let doubt get the better of us - and become discouraged and afraid? Maybe God won't help this time? Maybe God doesn't care about me anymore? Yet His Word - says He will never leave us nor forsake us (Deut 31:6 and Heb 13:5)

[PowerPoint 3b-Wrong Decisions]

Doubt also leads to WRONG DECISIONS - see the rest of v1- David thinks the "best thing" he can do is go the land of the Philistines?

Really David? The best thing is to go and live in enemy territory - away from God's Promised Land - away from worshipping with God's people - to live with the enemy - and to live with people who worship false gods. Really David? (pause)

It's *ironic* - that *if Saul told David to leave* Israel and go to the idol-worshipping Philistines - *there's* <u>no way</u> David would go - but doubt and discouragement and fear drove David to do something Saul could never make him do!

Remember back in 1 Sam 22:5 - the prophet Gad - told David to go to the land of Judah. There have been no further instructions from God - so David should be staying in Judah. But David hasn't consulted God on this? What happened to the priest Abiathar and the Ephod - David hasn't consulted him since chapter 23 - because he's not relying on God for his decision making now.

Application - maybe we're a bit like David - we don't ask God - because we don't want to hear the answer - we've already decided what we're going to do?

[PowerPoint 4c-Others]

Doubt also affects OTHERS AROUND US (see v2,) - David's doubt leads his

600 men into danger and into ungodly territory (v2) - and the men's families

(v3) and David's 2 wives (Ahinoam and Abigail)

You could argue he's protecting them from Saul - but it would be like us taking our family to an anti-Christian country - not the wisest move?

David's decision solves one problem - Saul gives up the chase (in v4). But it creates more problems - because it puts all those people in great danger in a foreign hostile land - and leads to lies and deception as we'll see

Application - what about us? Does our doubt - lead to a bad decision - which affects others?

For example - we doubt God will provide a new job - so we quit the job we're in - before God has provided us with a new one - and that affects the whole family?

Or we doubt God will provide for us - so we steal - or fiddle our tax return - or fiddle Centrelink - or make a false insurance claim? Then we get caught out - and that affects the whole family.

[PowerPoint 4d-Deals with the ungodly]

David's doubt also leads to making DEALS with the ungodly - David has to compromise and make a deal with King Achish of Gath - David calls himself Achish's servant (in v5, and 28:2) Really David?

God's anointed King - is a <u>servant</u> to the Philistine King of Gath? Really?

The deal also includes David living in Ziklag (so he has freedom without being watched as closely - as he would be in Gath) - and living in Philistine territory for 16 months (v7). Would you like to make a deal with the North Korean leader - Kim Jong-un?

Achish accepts David's deal this time - as opposed to chapter 21:10-15 - for 2 reasons - David and Achish have a *common enemy* - Saul - <u>and</u> David has 600 fighting men that Achish can use

Application - What about us? Is our doubt of God's help - causing us to go to the ungodly for help - and then having us compromise on our Christian values - because we want their approval and their friendship?

[PowerPoint 4e-Ungodly Actions]

David's doubt also leads to UNGODLY ACTIONS (in vv8-12) -- David and his men attack the enemies of Israel [like Gershurites, Girzites and Amalekites] rather than enemies of Achish and the Philistines. David is using his deal with Achish - to go and attack Israel's enemies.

But David, has to lie to Achish and pretend that he's been raiding Israelites areas [the Negev of Judah, the Negev of Jerahmeel and the Negev of the Kenites] - and he has to kill everyone in the places he raided - so no one can inform Achish what David is really doing. In one sense David's fighting the enemies of God's people and he can justify it that way. But God hasn't told David to do this. And this is no way of life - for God's anointed one. He's fighting wars for profit and not under God's approval or guidance - and not for God's honour.

David didn't lie to Achish because he was ashamed of what he doing, he lied to gain favour with Achish, he knew Achish would be pleased David had raided his own people.

So, David's doubt has caused discouragement, fear, caused him to make a wrong decision, endangered others around him, caused him to make deals with an ungodly king and country - and led to ungodly actions - lies upon lies, mass murder, cover ups and deceit. You may have thought spies and double agents were just in James Bond movies - but they're here in the Bible.

And disturbingly, **David is so very good at it** - he has King Achish - in v12 - believing that David - is on the Philistine's side now and has become "obnoxious" to his own people?

And before we start thinking - well it's war-time conditions - David is just trying to survive. Yes - but has he once consulted God on any of this?

Application - the problem is - the *roots of sin must be dealt with* or they come back with greater force. What happens here in 1 Samuel chapter 27 - sows the seed for what David does with Bathsheba and Uriah later on in 2 Samuel 11.

Still want to be like David?

(pause)

Perhaps we all are a bit like David - to some degree?

To some degree, many Christians have been where David is at in this back-sliding state. We can understand what David is doing; but it is still wrong, and very very dangerous.

God left David to himself - so that we see how sin can grip even the best of men - and to show the necessity of God's grace and mercy - in sending Jesus - to release us from the grip of sin.

David is in the Bible to show us it can happen to us if we're not relying on God. (pause)

Doubt leads to unbelief (John 20:24-25)

There's one more thing that doubt can do to us.

And it's in our NT passage from John 20:24-29 - [if you could turn there in your Bibles]

The context is that one of the disciples, **Thomas**, **wasn't present**, when the resurrected **Jesus**, **appeared** to the disciples.

Now, remember, *Thomas*, has been an *eye-witness* to a lot of Jesus' *miracles* - he's seen and witnessed the most amazing things - and he knows that Jesus said - He would *die* and on the *third day rise* from the dead. But when the other disciples tell Thomas - they've seen the risen Jesus - *Thomas* - *full of doubt* - says in v25

[PowerPoint 5-Unbelief]

- "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe"

You see, Thomas' doubt leads to him not believing

For Thomas - seeing is believing

He's **not prepared** to **trust Jesus'** promises nor the **evidence of** the other **disciples**

Application - for us - it can mean - if we keep doubting God's Word and God's Promises - we'll start to believe less and less of God's Word - and start to even doubt Jesus' forgiveness of our sins and His promise of eternal life - in Heaven.

The Answer to our Doubt (John 20:26-29, Proverbs 3:5-8)

The answer to our doubt is <u>faith</u> - faith comes by hearing God's Word (Rom 10:17)

[PowerPoint 6-Answer]

God gave us the Bible as a testimony of His works in the past. As we have faith in God and study His Word - we gain an understanding of what God has done in the past, what He has promised us for the present, and what we can Page 9 of 12

expect from Him in the future, we are then able to act in faith instead of doubt.

Jesus shows a better way than doubting Thomas

See v29 - Jesus says:

Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed."

Jesus is saying here - the answer to our DOUBT is FAITH

Hebrews 11:1 says, "faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see."

With faith - we then have confidence in God's promise - even in the things we cannot see - because God has proven Himself faithful, true, and able.

Every Christian is in a blessed position and will be blessed - Jesus says - because - unlike Thomas - we <u>believe without having seen</u> the Risen Jesus. Yet, *Thomas*, is in the Bible because *he's like us* - and we sometimes doubt. Our *response* to doubt - *boils down to trusting God* - no matter what. So, let's get <u>our</u> response from our OT passage from Proverbs 3:5-8 [Please turn there now]

See v5 - Trust in the Lord with all your heart - David didn't do that - he trusted in his own doubtful heart. What about us? Are we trusting in the Lord or ourselves?

V5 still - Lean not on your own understanding - David leaned on his own understanding and made a wrong choice. What about us? Are we relying on our own strength & understanding instead of God's?

V6 - submit your ways to God and He will make your paths straight - David didn't consult God before taking action. What about us? Do we consult God before we act?

V7 - do not be wise in your own eyes - David was wise only in his own eyes - He didn't seek the wisdom of God. What about us? Do we think we know better than God?

V7 still - Fear the Lord and shun evil - David feared Saul <u>not</u> God - he didn't shun evil - he became an outlaw. What about us? Do we have a reverent fear of God - and do we keep away from doing evil?

V8 - this will bring health to his body David's mental health was not the best here was it? - he was thinking negatively and doubtfully [understandably tired on the run] - and not thinking about how God could help and protect him as God had done many times before.

Thinking negatively and doubtfully and **not trusting God** - will affect <u>our</u> **mental health** - and will cause us to have fear and to have stress - and this will also affect our **physical health too**. Much better for us to **trust the Lord with all our heart** as the Proverb says.

Conclusion

So, as we leave here this morning/evening - we are waiting for the promised return of our Lord Jesus - and waiting for our life on this Earth to end so we can be with the Lord in Heaven - whichever comes first?

I encourage you, friends, as we do wait - to remember

We are in a blessed position - by having faith - and believing without seeing -

Jesus says so -

[PowerPoint 7-Conclusion]

And remember as the Apostle Paul says in 2 Corinthians 5:7

We live by faith, not by sight.
