God's way, not our way (1 Samuel 26 & Matthew 26:47-56) 20-Oct-19

There are Bibles in front of you

And we're looking at 1 Samuel chapter 26 - and we'll also be referring to Matthew 26:47-56.

Let me ask God for His help and guidance first - let's pray...

## Intro/God's Way

Sometimes it's **not** so easy to know if what we are doing is God's will - how do we know if what we're doing is our idea or God's plan?

Sometimes I hear people say - God told me to do such and such - and yet what they are about to do is - not a wise thing - or even a Godly thing?

Yes, there are certainly times, when we may hear God's quiet inner voice telling us to act - to phone someone - or visit someone - or pray for someone

I came across a story recently of a young Christian man (no one in this church) who was convinced that God had told him – he must ask a certain girl out for a date – all his friends told him this wasn't a good idea – because they knew this girl wasn't interested – but the young man was convinced – God had told him.

So eventually he built up the courage – to go up to the girl and say "God told me I should ask you out on a date"

Wisely the girl, said "That's funny, God hasn't told <u>me</u> that" (pause)

[PowerPoint 1a-What's God's will?]

So, what <u>is</u> God's will for us? How do we know?

Well - how about looking at what the Bible says... (that's a good idea)

According to Jesus - He says in Mark 3:35 - whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother - so to be part of Jesus' family - we must do the will of the Father

### [PowerPoint 1b-Matt 21:32]

And at its most basic level - Jesus says in Matthew 21:32 - doing the will of the Father - is to say sorry to God for our sins and believe in Jesus.

### [PowerPoint 1c-Transform]

And the Apostle Paul tells us in Romans 12:2 - that if we should "not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be **transformed** by the renewing of our mind. Then we will be able to test and approve what God's will is—His good, pleasing and perfect will."

This tells us that a true child of God refuses to be conformed to what the world thinks they should do - but instead allows themselves to be transformed by God's Spirit.

So, as our *minds are renewed to be aligned with* the the things of *God*, then our will becomes *aligned with God's will* for our lives.

# [PowerPoint 1d-God's Word]

And let's not forget we always have *God's Word* as a guide and *lamp* to our feet (Psalm 119:105)

So, doing God's will boils down to doing things God's way and not our way Why should we do that?

[PowerPoint 2-Isa 55:9]

Because as Isaiah 55:9 says:

As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are *my ways higher than* your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts.

Basically, God's way is better than ours!

### [PowerPoint 3-Heading]

In our story from 1 Samuel 26 today - we learn how to do things God's way - and we see what God's way looks like...

## [PowerPoint 3a-faith in plan/timing]

1. God's way looks like - having faith in God's plan and God's timing (1 Sam 26:1-12)

First, God's way looks like - Having faith in God's plan and in God's timing that's in 1 Sam 26 - vv1-12

- Remember David already spared Saul's life back in chapter 24 in the cave
- David could have killed Saul but instead David just cut a corner of his
  garment to prove he had the opportunity to kill Saul
- David had hoped this might convince Saul to stop pursuing him but it didn't
- So here we are in chapter 26 and David engineers another opportunity to get close to Saul

- David is out to prove the point that it is a futile exercise for Saul to continue pursuing him - because God is not with Saul - God is with David
- David and his off-sider Abishai in v7 sneak into Saul's camp
- Saul is asleep with all his men around him to protect him
- Next to where Saul is lying is a jug (water) and Saul's spear. Saul's spear is a symbol of his kingdom wherever he goes indoors or outdoors his spear goes with him to show he is the king
- <u>Abishai</u> is ready to run Saul through with the spear in v8 he's so confident one thrust of the spear will be enough
- But Abishai's way is the way the world thinks today payback revenge Saul deserves what's coming to him let's take the kingship by force!
- But that's not God's way!
- David realizes God's way is having faith in God's plan and having faith in God's timing (which is always perfect)
- See v9 so David says to Abishai, "Don't destroy him! Who can lay a
  hand on the LORD's anointed and be guiltless?"
- David has respect for Saul because Saul is still the king anointed by God
- As far as David is concerned <u>God will be the one to hand out any</u>
   <u>consequences</u> for Saul's wicked behaviour see v10. David realizes either
   God will *punish* Saul or Saul will die of <u>natural causes</u> or die in *battle* whatever way it happens that's *God's planning* and God's *timing*
- And David knows that <u>he</u> is now God's anointed and he knows it's up to God
  to hand him the kingship in God's own perfect timing- and it's <u>not</u> up to
  David to take the kingship for himself
- So instead David takes Saul's jug and spear

- Taking Saul's spear is a symbol of David taking Saul's kingship one day
- And look at v12 David has some supernatural help God put Saul and all his
   camp mates into a deep sleep so David could get so close to Saul
- God's way is having faith in God's plan and in God's timing
- Application what about us?

Do we get impatient waiting for God's plan to work out?

Do we jump the gun and try to help God with his plan? [remember how Abraham and Sarah - were promised a son - but they got impatient waiting and jumped the gun - and Abraham slept with Sarah's maidservant Hagar - and had a son called Ishmael - but that wasn't the son God promised - and there were huge consequences]

Are we **tempted to sin** - to get things happening **quicker**? That's what Abraham and Sarah did?

Is what <u>we</u> want to happen <u>more important than</u> what <u>God</u> wants to happen? God's way looks like - Having faith in God's plan and in God's timing

## 2. God's way looks like - Exposing Sin (1 Samuel 26:13-20)

[PowerPoint 3b-exposing sin]

2<sup>nd</sup>, God's way looks like - exposing sin - that's in 1 Samuel 26 - vv13-20

- See V13 David returns to the other side of the hill away from Saul's camp
- And he calls to Abner, who was supposed to have guarded Saul
- And he shows him the evidence of the jug and the spear
- Saul hears that it's David calling
- David asks Saul why he continues to pursue him?

- As far as David is concerned, he hasn't done anything to deserve this
  continual hatred from Saul
- David confronts **Saul's motive** in v19
  - o Is it God's will that you are pursuing me Saul?
  - o Or is it human will?
- It's always good for us to examine our motives for doing something
  - Asking ourselves is this something God would want us to do? Is this something God would be pleased with?
- David also makes the point to Saul in v19 that his continued pursuit of
  David is driving David out of the Promised Land and away from God's
  promised inheritance and is in effect causing David to leave his own
  country and go to a country that serves false/other gods
- Also, David explains in v20 that Saul is hunting him down like he's on some hunting expedition - and that this is hardly behaviour fitting of the King of Israel

God's way looks like - exposing sin

Application - are we examining our behaviour to see if it is contrary to God's word? Exposing our own sin - like - telling lies [it's only a white lie], taking stuff that's not ours [no-one will notice], cheating [everyone cheats don't they], hating [they deserve to be hated], being jealous of others getting ahead [if I can't lose weight make all my friends fat]

Are we in a **gentle way** - **not** a **judgmental** way - exposing sin in <u>others'</u> lives - gently asking - is that something **God would approve** of? - is that **what God's word says?** 

Even our good behaviour can convict people of their bad behaviour.

Is our behaviour pushing people away from God and His people - not towards Him? Like Saul did?

Jesus warns about being a stumbling block - He says in Matt 18:6 - it would be better to have **millstone** around our neck and be thrown into the sea than to cause someone to stumble - and turn away from God!

God's way looks like - <u>exposing</u> sin

# 3. God's way looks like - genuine repentance (1 Samuel 26:21-25) Third, God's way looks like - genuine repentance - that's in vv21-25 [PowerPoint 3c-Repentance]

Let's be clear what **repentance** is:

Repentance is doing a *U-turn* - where we were *once travelling away from God* and away from following His ways - and we do a U-turn - and *start travelling God's way* - we say we are sorry - *genuinely sorry* - *from the heart* - and commit to moving in the direction of following God's Son, Jesus and His commands - we may still sin - but our intention is changed - we're now committed to God and His son, Jesus

And repentance is **not** a **one-off exercise** - every time we sin - we must come with **heartfelt repentance** and remorse to God

- Back to 1 Samuel 26 and David's speech to Saul convicts Saul's conscience
- See v21 Saul says "I have sinned. Come back, David my son.
   Because you considered my life precious today, I will not try to harm you again. Surely I have acted like a fool and have been terribly wrong."

- Saul admits his sin, he says he won't do it again he admits he's been a
  fool and he's been terribly wrong
- Saul's confession has all the hallmarks of repentance
- The question is though is it genuine?
- Saul hasn't got a great track record of being genuine has he?
- But he asks David to come back
- It's a bit like what happens in domestic violence
  - o A poor woman gets bashed by her husband
  - o In the emotion of the moment the husband realizes what he's done
    - is wrong and promises <u>not</u> to do it again and says please have me back
  - o The woman out of compassion says ok I forgive you
  - o Only for it all to happen again
  - o The sorry or repentance wasn't genuine after all
- Repentance <u>has</u> to be genuine
- If someone says sorry to us it's one thing for us to forgive them but
  we must also apply wisdom if this is a repeat offense and say I need
  time to see if your sorry is genuine
- David is not convinced that Saul's repentance is genuine
- He has no intention of returning to Saul
- See v22 he says Here's your spear Saul send someone for it?
- Application: When we say sorry is it genuine?
   Or is it like the child who gets caught out and says sorrrry.
   Or like when we make 2 kids say sorry to each other and they don't even look at each other sorry sorry

Or is our sorry - heartfelt - with the intention not to repeat this offense?

What about our relationship with God?

Have we genuinely come to God - with hand on heart and said - sorry

See *Psalm 51* - here's how King *David genuinely repented* later on in his life:

- ¹ Have mercy on me, O God, according to your unfailing love; according to your great compassion blot out my transgressions.
- <sup>2</sup> Wash away all my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin.
- <sup>3</sup> For I know my transgressions, and my sin is always before me.
- 4 Against you, you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight;
- so you are right in your verdict and justified when you judge.
- <sup>5</sup> Surely I was sinful at birth, sinful from the time my mother conceived me.

God's way looks like - genuine repentance

4. God's way looks like - Peace (Matthew 26:47-56)

Finally, God's way looks like - peace

[PowerPoint 3d-Peace]

Which brings us to our NT passage from Matthew 26:47-56 [Please turn there now]

Just like *David* - had the *opportunity* to *take* his *kingship by sword* - but *didn't*The same thing happened with Jesus - when Judas and a *band of people with*swords sent by the chief priests and elders - came to arrest Jesus.

One of Jesus' disciples drew his sword and chopped off the ear of the high priest's servant

But look what Jesus said - from v52:

<sup>52</sup> "Put your sword back in its place," "for *all who draw the sword will die by the sword*. <sup>53</sup> Do you think I cannot call on my Father, and he will at once put at my disposal more than twelve legions of angels? <sup>54</sup> But how then would the *Scriptures be fulfilled* that say it must happen in this way?"

The bottom line is God's plan is for Jesus' kingdom to be brought by peace not by violence

God's prophecies about Jesus being a suffering servant who dies for His people - <a href="have">have</a> to be fulfilled - God's prophecy wasn't that Jesus would fight with swords for His people - but to bring peace between God and human kind by dying on the cross - to take the punishment of our sins away from us - and give us forgiveness

Jesus <u>does</u> have a *sword* though - it's His *Word* - as Hebrews 4:12 says:

For the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart.

It's Jesus' words that transform attitudes and change behaviour - and lead people to believe in Him - and bring peace between God and humans - and Page 10 of 12

bring peace in our hearts. That peace - the Apostle Paul describes (Phil 4:7)

- as a *peace that surpasses all understanding* - and actually *guards our hearts* (so they are not like King Saul's) and *guards our minds* (so they are not like King Saul's)

Saul didn't have that peace - and look how his life panned out

### David did

Application: have you come to Jesus - the Prince of Peace?

The one who gives that **peace** in your heart - knowing you're forgiven and have the promise of eternal life

And are you offering and sharing that peace to all you come across?

### Conclusion

To finish up then:

[PowerPoint 4a-What if?]

What if David had killed Saul? After all Saul deserved it? Well...

- David would be guilty of murder
- He would have been guilty of not trusting God
- He would have the stigma of having taken his kingship by force and lost the respect of Saul's followers - when he became king
- And he wouldn't have been following God's way but his own way

[PowerPoint 4b-What if?]

What if Jesus had allowed the use of swords at the time of His arrest?

After all they deserved it - He was innocent - those arresting Him were doing the wrong thing?

### Well...

- It would have started a rebellion
- He would have been guilty of not trusting God and disobeying God
- That would have made Jesus sinful like us instead of sinless
- He wouldn't have gone to the cross to die for our sins to be forgiven because he would no longer be the perfect sacrifice if He sinned
- Then we would still be guilty of our sins
- He would not have fulfilled God's plan to give people the opportunity to be forgiven and have eternal life
- And we would have no hope now

# [PowerPoint 4c-John 4:34]

But *Jesus always did the Father's will* and in fact Jesus said in John 4:34: "My food, is to do the will of Him who sent me and to <u>finish</u> His work" Jesus' work was to bring peace between God and humans - through the Cross

Like David - like Jesus - It's God's way not our way!
