Do not conform to the pattern of this World (1 Samuel 29:1-11 & Romans 12:1-8)

G'Day Church Family...

There are **Bibles** in front of you

And we're looking at 1 Samuel chapter 29 - and we'll also be referring to Romans 12:1-8.

You've got the usual **outline** for you to **take notes** - if that helps you concentrate.

Let me ask God for His help and guidance first - let's pray...

Intro

I once counselled a **Christian couple** before **they got married** (no one in this church)

And they wanted to live together before they were married – they insisted they wouldn't be sleeping together (1 Cor 7:2) – and that they just wanted to <u>be</u> together.

So, I asked them **how would they be different to any non-Christian couples** in their street that were also living together **– how would anyone see any difference** in <u>their</u> behaviour than the others?

Is that what God would expect of Christians?

[PowerPoint 1-world]

In our NT reading [Romans 12 please turn there], the apostle Paul says: not to conform to the pattern of this world (Rom 12:2)

Why does the Apostle Paul say - not to conform to the pattern of the world?

Well - we need to go back a verse - to verse 1

[PowerPoint 2-mercy]

Because [in view of] of God's mercy?

What mercy?

God's mercy in sending Jesus to be sacrificed on the cross - that mercy!

The mercy that replaced our sin and death - with forgiveness and eternal life

Because of God's mercy to us - in Jesus

[PowerPoint 3-sacrificial lives]

V1 says we are to *live lives which are sacrificial* and pleasing to God How?

[PowerPoint 4-transformed]

Back to V2 again - by **not conforming to worldly** standards - but by being **transformed into Jesus people**

As, Jesus Himself says in John 17:14: We are not of the world any more than He is of the world

In our OT passage - 1 Samuel 29 - [Please turn there now] - we're dealing with David still on the run from King Saul.

David's in *enemy territory* and he has *befriended* the Philistine King - *Achish*And he's Achish's *bodyquard*.

David has been <u>so</u> convincing at deception - that he's deceived Achish - into thinking that David has turned against his own people, the Israelites - and is now willing to fight for the Philistines.

Now - remember - David is described, earlier in 1 Samuel, as a man after God's own heart (1 Samuel 13:14)

How do people know David is a man after God's own heart? Is David acting like it?

In this chapter (29) and in chapter 27 - David is <u>not</u> acting like a man after God's own heart

[PowerPoint 5-David]

He's actually conforming to the patterns of this world - rather than acting like a man of God

Even though - God has shown David - great mercy

Here's what God has done so far, for David:

- God helped David defeat Goliath
- God anointed him the next king of Israel
- God has preserved David from being killed by King Saul
- God prevented David from foolishly wiping out Nabal by sending
 Abigail
- God provided David with a beautiful and wise wife Abigail
- God prevented David from taking vengeance on Saul

Despite God's mercy to David

[PowerPoint 6-Heading]

David is *compromising with the world in 4 ways* - which I believe can happen to <u>us</u> today - if we're not diligent in our walk with God

[PowerPoint 6a-subtle]

First - compromise is subtle and gradual

Back in chapter 27:1 - David thought the **best thing he could do** was to go to the **Philistine** territory (**enemy territory**) to escape Saul

There he serves King Achish of Gath - he becomes Achish's servant

Achish is so pleased to have David - the mighty warrior - to defect from Israel

to the Philistines - that he gives David his own town - Ziklag

David makes secret raids against Israel's enemies and then lies about it to gain favour with Achish

Achish is so impressed with David - he makes David his bodyguard

And now as we pick up the story in chapter 29 - David is in the compromising

position - in v2 of marching with the Philistines against his own people, the

Israelites.

And David and his men are at the rear protecting King Achish

I hope you can see that one compromise has led to another

Going to live in enemy territory - and then having to live a life of lies and deception - has gradually led to more and more lies and deception - and now

David is in a tricky situation.

If continues to march with the Philistine army - he will be put in a position of having to kill his own people.

If he turns on Achish and betrays that friendship which Achish clearly thinks is genuine - and attacks the Philistine army at the rear - David and his men are heavily *outnumbered*

Compromise is subtle and gradual

Application: It's the same for us.

If we lie - we may have to tell another lie to cover up the first lie - so we don't get caught out.

If we **steal** - we may have to **tell a lie and cover up** - when someone asks where we got that thing from?

If we cheat - we'll have to lie - so no one finds out we've cheated.

If we let one of children or grandchild - watch an inappropriate movie for their age - then regret it - then the next child comes along and says - well you let him/her watch it - why not me? So, we cave in?

[PowerPoint 6b-relationships]

The second way, David compromised with worldly behaviour - was to have a wrong relationship - David became a servant of Achish and called Achish, he's Lord. But David has only one true Lord.

David's worldliness is so good - that Achish was deceived into thinking David was trustworthy - see the end of v3 - from the day he left Saul until now, I have found not fault in him!

You have to feel sorry for *Achish* - is so *sincere* and yet so *gullible*. He really thinks David is an honest man - little does he know.

But the Philistine commanders aren't so gullible.

They can see a problem with David - an Israelite (who killed their giant Goliath) being in their army and fighting against the Israelites is a major conflict of interests - v4 - and they're rightly concerned that David might turn against them

It would be like during **WWII** - allowing a **German general** to join the **British** army.

David shouldn't even be in this position - having a close relationship with a King of a country that worships false gods and not the one true God - let alone fighting in that country's army - against his own country.

Application - For us it means we have to be careful with our relationships with non-believers. Yes, by all means, be friends and witness to them. But be diligent and alert to being sucked into their world. If we are not strong in our faith and obedience to God - we may be led their way - instead of them being led God's way.

Analogy - if you're the Christian on the *chair* - and the non-Christian is sitting on the floor. It's *easier* for the person on the floor *to pull you off the chair* - that for you to pull them up off the floor

As the Apostle Paul says in 1 Corinthians 15:33 - Do not be misled: "Bad company corrupts good character."

[PowerPoint 6c-joined in]

The third way, David compromised with worldly behaviour - was he joined in sinful behaviour to win approval.

David joined the enemy - the Philistines - and to win the approval of Achish - back in chapter 27 - David carried out raids on innocent people - wiped out the whole town - so no one could inform on him - and took all their stuff He's acting like one of the kings from the surrounding nations - he's not acting like God's anointed King - and a man after God's own heart.

What's the difference between David and any other king?

He's compromised himself

Application - what about us?

Are we tempted to join in sinful behaviour - to gain approval from people? When I worked in IT - the guys in the office - would call me over - come and look at this "hot" girl on the screen - I'd say - no thanks - which would mean I would cop insults.

It would have been easy for me to give in to them - so I didn't cop insults from them?

What about if we hear people gossiping about someone at church - are we tempted to join in - so we're accepted by the people gossiping - or are we brave enough to say - "hey we shouldn't be gossiping about anyone?"

Or what if we're with a group of friends who aren't Christian - and they're using foul language or blaspheming - OMG or JC - do we use the same language to be accepted by them - or do we say "hey I don't like that language or blaspheming - it's wrong!"

[PowerPoint 6d-ignoring]

The fourth way, David compromised with worldly behaviour - was he ignored God and His Word. At no stage in this chapter or in chapter 27 - does David consult God for direction - and at no stage is he obedient to God's Word.

Ironically, it's Achish who mentions God in this chapter - in fact twice.

In v6 - Achish says to David "As surely as the **Lord lives**, you have been reliable"

And in v9 - Achish says to David "I know that you have been as pleasing in my eyes as **an angel of God**"

You see - David's pride is in the way.

The Israeli song and dance of verse 5 has gone to David's head:

Saul has slain his thousands

And David his tens of thousands

David is *flying solo* - without God

But flying solo without God - is a very dangerous thing to do.

Because - David's decision to go to the Philistine territory seems to have worked in his own eyes - he's got his men - his own land - he's in favour with Achish - everything is going well - he's fooled himself into thinking - I can do it all myself - without God's help

But now he's in a really compromising situation

Application - what about us? We can **fool ourselves** into thinking - **we can fly solo without God** - or have God as our co-pilot - instead of realizing God is the only one - who can fly the plane - properly and safely.

It's important we keep God in our lives.

He must be front and centre of our lives.

His guidance for our lives is paramount

Consulting him daily is essential.

How can we know about God - know about Jesus - and know about ourselves - without *reading His Word* - and *believing* it - *meditating* on it - and *following* it. (pause)

Despite David's compromises and conforming to the world.

God still shows David mercy.

God arranges for David to be sent back to Ziklag - and out of harms way of the impending battle.

See v7 - Now turn back and go in peace, do nothing to displease the Philistine rulers.

How merciful is our Great God!

Solution for Us

[PowerPoint 7-Heading]

Coming back to how this all ties in for us.

How do people know we are Christians?

Is it obvious?

Are we acting like it?

Have you noticed how non-Christians - always seem to know how we Christians should behave?

What's the **solution for us** - not to get sucked into conforming to the pattern of the world?

Our NT passage from Romans 12:2 - tells us:

[PowerPoint 7a-transform]

² Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be *transformed* by the renewing of your mind.

So, the solution is to be <u>transformed</u>

The Greek word for transform - is metamorphosis

It means a complete change - like a caterpillar changing to a butterfly

How are we able to be transformed?

It tells us...

By the renewal (literally - renovation) of our minds

So, we're not thinking like the world

But thinking like Jesus

WWJD?

This is <u>possible</u> by us having the *Holy Spirit* - in our lives - *guiding* us, *teaching* us and *reminding* us what Jesus taught - and keeping in step with the Holy Spirit

This is <u>possible</u> by us being in *constant communication* with God in prayer And this is <u>possible</u> by *reading God's Word*.

What does this renewal (renovation) of our minds look like?

Well - verses 3 to 8 - of our Romans 12 passage tells us:

[PowerPoint 7b-Humble service]

It simply looks like - humble service as a member of Jesus' body - the Church - each of us using our God-given gifts to serve each other - and bring glory to God

That will make us the opposite to the ungodly behaviour of the world we live in - and will attract others to join this body of Jesus.

The question for each of us then is:

Are we using our God given gifts - in humble service of each other?

Conclusion

[PowerPoint 8-Heading]

To finish up then.

Are we tempted to follow the world's way?

Because sometimes it's easy for us to get sucked in.

Well - let me leave us with a few words from the Apostle Paul from 1 Corinthians 10:11-13 to help us, when we <u>are</u> tempted:

[PowerPoint 8a-no tempting]

¹¹ These things happened [in Israel's history] to them as examples and were written down as warnings for us, on whom the culmination of the ages has come. ¹² So, if you think you are standing firm, be careful that you don't fall! ¹³ No temptation has overtaken you except what is common to mankind. And God is faithful; he will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But when you are tempted, he will also provide a way out so that you can endure it.
