<u>Intro</u>

So, throughout the month of January - we're doing a series on "SHUN" words in the Bible - that's words in the Bible that end in "TION" - SHUN

In January 2019 - we looked at:

Revelation, Substitution, Salvation, Redemption

Now in January 2020 we'll be looking at a few more SHUN words:

Propitiation (last week), Justification, Adoption and Resurrection

Our "SHUN" word this week - is *Justification*:

Before we look at Justification

I want us to look at a problem we all have

Problem (Romans 5:12-14)

[PowerPoint 2-Rom 5:12-14]

- Please turn to the book of Romans 5:12-14 written by Apostle Paul
- According to Apostle Paul Adam and Eve were real people

- And their disobedience back in Genesis 3 when they disobeyed God
 and ate from the tree they were told not to eat from brought sin into
 the world
- The blame lies fair and square with Adam as Eve was deceived by Satan
 but Adam sinned with full knowledge of what he was doing (1 Tim 2:14)
- And because of that sin Paul says we all inherit sin see V12
- And with sin still in v12 comes death
- All humans are mortal subject to dying as soon as we are born
- Paul says we are made sinners by Adam's sin, before we even start committing our own sins - which of course we can't avoid
- And if we don't think we are born sinners think about how selfish and naughty a child can be pretty early on their life and think about how we don't teach our children to be bad they learn it all on their own
- However it doesn't mean babies/toddlers go to hell if they die early
 in life 1 Cor 7:14 says children are sanctified (made holy) by the
 faith of their believing parents and remember also God is a merciful
 God (Gen 18:25)
- Sin disrupts our relationship with God
- Paul then goes on to say v13 that sin and death were in the world way
 before the commandments were given to Moses
- When the commandments came, they showed the extent that we disobey
 God before that people would not necessarily know what sins they had
 committed because they didn't have all the rules
- V14 And the punishment for sin death this huge abyss separating us
 from God, dominated the landscape from the time of Adam to Moses
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- Even if people didn't sin exactly the same as Adam did, by disobeying a
 specific command of God people still experienced this termination of
 life and this separation from God
- Paul says in v14 that Adam who got us in to this mess, also points to
 ahead to One who will get us out of this mess
- Which brings us to the Promised Solution

<u>Promised Solution = Justification (Isaiah 52:13-53:12)</u>

[PowerPoint 3-Promised Solution]

- Please turn to Isaiah 52:13 53:12
- More than 600 years before Jesus
- The prophet Isaiah talks of a coming Suffering Servant of the Lord
- There is <u>no doubt</u> as we read these verses that Isaiah is referring to
 none other than Jesus the Messiah and describes Jesus' suffering
 before <u>and</u> during His crucifixion and describes what He will achieve in
 His suffering
- Verse after verse we can see Jesus and it does beg the question how
 the Jews missed this passage as referring to Jesus?
- Before Isaiah mentions anything about the servant's suffering
- In V13 He says Jesus this servant will be highly exalted and He will triumph over His suffering
- V14 He says Jesus' appearance is disfigured and His form marred remember how Jesus was scourged and mocked and beaten before being crucified (Luke 22:63-64)

- Then V15 Jesus will sprinkle many nations sprinkling is often
 associated with cleansing of sin (Ex 24:8; Lev 3:6; Num 19:21; Ezek 36:25)
- So, Jesus will cleanse many nations of their sins not just Jews
- Isaiah continues in v15 By the time everyone has heard about who this
 Jesus is and heard what He has done He will cause kings to shut their
 mouths because the good news of Jesus that was so concealed in the
 OT is now revealed in the NT and revealed as we share the story and
 message of Jesus
- As we move in to chapter 53:1 Isaiah asks who will believe our message about this suffering servant, Jesus?
- Isaiah anticipates how strange it will be that the suffering servant
 whose face is disfigured will be the same servant who cleanses nations
 from their sins it seems contradictory that a dying servant can do
 this?
- But it's true!
- And so Isaiah anticipates some people will reject this Servant Jesus
- V2 Jesus does not have any distinctive physical attraction to bring people to him
- V3 He is despised and rejected
- V3 He is a man of suffering and familiar with pain
- V3 Because there wasn't any outward distinctive beauty about Jesus people are not drawn to Him and so reject Him this shows that people
 often look at the outward appearance whereas God looks at the heart
- V4 He took our pain and bore our suffering He not only died on the cross for our sins - and in our place - He understands our suffering now Page 4 of 9

- too and we can hand our sorrows over to Him $\operatorname{\underline{if}}$ we care to release them
- Still in v4 when Jesus was crucified people thought He was being punished by God for something He'd done wrong (apparently blaspheming and saying He is God) whereas He was innocent and He was punished as part of God's plan to save people from the punishment they deserved
- V5 He is pierced for our sins crushed for our iniquities all pointing to the cross
- V5 He brought peace between God and humankind by Him being wounded
- V6 Why? Because people are like lost sheep gone astray doing their own thing - away from God - and lost people - like lost sheep - need a shepherd - Jesus - the Good Shepherd
- V7 He will be oppressed and afflicted but He won't open his mouth to defend himself (Mark 15:2-5) and that's what He did at His trial and at the cross He never spoke to defend Himself only to glorify God
- V7 He was led like a lamb to the slaughter pointing to Jesus being
 like the lamb sacrifice for sin in the temple and to the fact that Jesus
 is the Lamb of God the Passover Lamb that takes away the sin of the
 world
- V8 by Oppression and judgement of the Romans & Jewish LeadersJesus is taken away and none of His generation protested because no
 one really understood what was going on his followers fled and those
 who wanted Him killed didn't realize what they were really doing and
 who Jesus really was

- V9 He was assigned a grave with the wicked and with the rich in death points to the fact that Jesus died in the company of the wicked thieves on the cross on either side of Him (Luke 23:32-33) and His grave was a tomb owned by the rich man called Joseph of Arimathea (Luke 23:50-56 and Matt 27:57-60)
- V10 It was all the Lord's will it was God's plan for Jesus to suffer and for Jesus to be an offering for sin
- V10 still but Jesus' death and burial are not the end He lives on! He
 lives to see His offspring His spiritual offspring those who believe in
 Him
- V11 and when He has done all this He will live a glorious life in Heaven and be satisfied with His work of saving people from their sins
- Verse after verse we see this Suffering Servant that Isaiah promises
 is so clearly Jesus!
- And the result of all this work is at the end of V11 by His knowledge my
 righteous servant will justify many,
- It is in us knowing the Messiah Jesus in knowing both who He is and what He has done, that makes us justified before God.
- Which finally brings us to our SHUN word

Justification -

So, we'd better **define** what **Justification** is:

[PowerPoint 4-Defintion]

Justification is: The action of showing something or someone is right

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In Bible terms justification is: The act of declaring an ungodly person is right before God

So, for an ungodly person to be right before God

And remember we all sin - so we're all ungodly

There has to be a solution that makes us right with God

Which is where the rest of our Romans 5 passage comes in

If you'd like to turn back to Romans 5 - from verse 15

Solution (Romans 5:15-21)

You see the solution to sin and death is a gift from God

- Paul says the solution is not the same as how we got the problem from
 Adam see V15
- The gift is a gift of grace from God
- Grace a free gift a gift not deserved and not earned

[PowerPoint 5-Diagram]

- Paul's explanation of how we are justified in Romans 5:15-21 can be
 explained by this diagram
- Adam's sin brought sin and death to us
- Then we ourselves sin also
- So, we're guilty of our sins which separates us from God and deserves death
- But justification means the guilt of our \sin is put on or credited to Jesus (the 2^{nd} Adam)

- Jesus' the 2nd Adam then dies on the cross to take away the punishment of our sin
- And makes us right with God by transferring His righteousness His right standing with God - onto us - IF we believe in Jesus'
- So Paul says just as one person [Adam] did wrong and got us in all this
 trouble with sin and death, another person [Jesus] did right and got us
 out of it. But more than just getting us out of trouble, He got us into life!
 One man said <u>no</u> to God and put many people in the wrong; one man said
 yes to God and put many in the right.
- Paul goes onto say in v20-21 that all that God's Law did against sin was produce more people who break God's Law like us. But sin didn't, and doesn't, have a chance in competition with the aggressive forgiveness we call grace. When it's sin versus God's grace, grace wins hands down. All sin can do is threaten us with death, and that's the end of it. Grace, because God is putting everything back together again through Jesus, invites us into life—a life that goes on and on and on, beyond this world into eternity.

<u>Applications</u>

So, let me leave us with 3 applications:

Because of Jesus - justifying us:

1. 1st -we can embrace assurance - Romans 8:1 - Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, = no one can point Page 8 of 9

finger at us about what we have done in the past - if we now believe in Jesus - all our sins are forgiven. And when God looks at us - He doesn't see us in our sinful nature - what God sees is Jesus standing in our place.

2. 2nd Application - a warning - from Heb 10:26-27 - If we deliberately keep on sinning after we have received the knowledge of the truth, no sacrifice for sins is left, but only a fearful expectation of judgment and of raging fire that will consume the enemies of God.

3. 3rd an Action - from 2 Cor 5:17 & 20 - Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; and we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God were pleading through us

It's my prayer - we can go out and be ambassadors for Jesus - because God sees us - just as if we never sinned.
