Today we're continuing our look at the Apostle Paul's letter to the Corinthians - which we interrupted for Easter - and we're now looking at chapter 7

It's a difficult chapter - so we really need God's help in understanding His Word. Let's pray...

It would be good to have your Bibles open to 1 Cor chapter 7

#### Intro/Context

#### [PowerPoint 1-Intro]

- Just to remind you where we got up to last time
- In chapter 6 the Apostle Paul spoke about sexual immorality
- And he finished the chapter with vv19-20
- Do you not know that your bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit,
  who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your
  own, <sup>20</sup> you were bought at a price. Therefore, honour God with
  your bodies
- Now in <u>this</u> chapter chapter 7 Paul explains <u>how</u> we honour God with our bodies

# [PowerPoint 2-Context]

- But we need to remind ourselves of the <u>context</u>
  - Corinth was an extremely pagan and sexually immoral city (not unlike Sydney today!)

- Many worshipped at the great temple of Aphrodit-e the Greek
   goddess of love
- o There were also many temple prostitutes
- o There was some weird thinking too
  - Some thought the body was evil so it didn't matter what you did with your body so any sexual immoral activity was ok it just affected your body which was nothing
  - Others thought if the body was so evil you shouldn't do even
    things that are natural for your body so if you were
    married you should abstain from sexual activity with your
    husband or wife
- o Also, Paul is writing with the overlying thought (brought out in v29)
  - that time is short. Paul believed the Lord was returning very soon, and so his advice on marriage and singleness is swayed by that thought
- If you then add to the mix that Paul has established a Christian
   church in Corinth
  - The Corinthian Christians are wondering what should they do now - in terms of their sexual behaviour?
  - If they're married should they still have sex with their spouse?
  - If they're single should they be getting married at all?
  - If they're married to an unbeliever should they be divorcing their spouse - now that they're a Christian?

So, the Apostle Paul answers these sorts of questions - and we'll look at how that relates to us - in our marriages - and in our singleness - today

There are two sections in the chapter

- 1. Instructions to those who are married & that's verses 1 to 24
- 2. Instructions to those who are single & that's verses 25-40

Let's look at the instructions to those who are married first - vv1-24

Instructions to those who are Married (1 Cor 7:1-24)

<u>Before</u> we go any further - we'd better be clear on **God's definition of** marriage...

Jesus - in Mark 10:6-9 - brought together two passages from Genesis (1:27; 2:24) and said that marriage was God-made, God bringing together a male and a female - as one flesh - for a lifelong (let no one separate), monogamous (one wife-one husband) relationship.

So, to those married...

First up, Paul talks about sexual responsibilities within marriage - that's in vv1-7

### A. Sexual Responsibilities in marriage (vv1-7)

In v1 the Corinthians had asked Paul the question "Is it good for a man not to have sexual relations with a woman". Some translations may say 'marry' - but the correct translation is "touch - sexually".
 There may have been the thinking if sexual immorality is so bad and so

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- rampant in this city maybe it's better to not have sex at all.

  Perhaps that's somehow more super spiritual?
- But Paul says sexual relations are perfectly fine in the context of a
  husband and wife and he's also implying no sex before marriage and
  no sex with others outside your marriage
- But within the marriage there is equality as far as sexual activity is concerned the man does not own the woman or vice versa it's important for the husband and wife to come together sexually and not deprive each other otherwise Satan might tempt either party to look for sexual satisfaction outside the marriage
- Mutual fulfilment in sexual relations is Paul's teaching here and this
  is quite a normal condition of marriage
- Paul himself, is unmarried (at this stage) and sees singleness as a gift
  from God and equally he sees marriage as a gift from God

Next, Paul gives advice to the unmarried about marriage - that's vv8-9

# B. Advice to the Unmarried about Marriage (vv8-9)

- Paul's advice to singles (whether never married or widowed) is that if they
  don't have the gift of remaining single and burn with passion for the
  person they are in love with then it's better to get married
- Just because Paul himself has the gift of being able to be single and celibate doesn't mean he's advocating celibacy for everyone
- Celibacy is a gift from God too and it's not for everyone
- We've seen over many years how forcing priests into celibacy in the RC
   church has caused horrendous consequences to victims of child abuse

Next, Paul gives advice regarding divorce - that's in vv9-10

### C. Advice Regarding Divorce (vv10-11 & Malachi 2:15-16)

- In the context of Corinth with their ideas on the body being evil & the
  rampant sexual immorality The Corinthians had wondered whether they
  should stay married Paul's general advice is a husband and wife are not
  to separate and divorce
- If they do separate they should either reconcile or remain unmarried
- That advice fits with God's definition of marriage as a life-long union
- Our **OT reading** from **Malachi 2:16** says God does not approve of divorce and says that a man who hates and divorces his wife does violence to the one he should protect
- Nevertheless, because of our sinful human nature separations and divorces do happen
- When Paul says a married couple should not divorce
- We need to balance Paul's teaching with the rest of the Bible and to also look at other teachings about divorce
  - Jesus says in Matthew 19 divorce is permissible for sexual
     immorality that is unfaithfulness
  - Jesus <u>doesn't</u> say <u>even</u> in the case of unfaithfulness that divorce is mandatory - there could still be reconciliation
  - o But certainly, for unfaithfulness divorce is allowed
  - It does beg the question what about a marriage where there is abuse? - both physical and emotional abuse? Neither Paul or Jesus say anything about that?

- I would argue that abuse (physical or emotional) is unfaithfulness in the marriage too!
- In the past churches may have been guilty of sending battered
   wives back to their husbands when they should not have done so
- So, where a marriage breaks down because of unfaithfulness divorce is allowed and the injured party is free to remarry
- Also <u>Remember</u> Ephesians 5 says a husband must love their wives
   <u>like</u> Christ loves the church how did Christ love the Church? He
   died sacrificially for the church
- $\circ$  So, husbands, need to love their wives with <u>a</u> "to die for" love they would literally die for their wives
- We also need to understand that this passage and in fact the whole Bible - says very little about marriage & divorce between two unbelievers?
- However, in general terms God is for marriage and God is for faithfulness
- Despite of all of this separations and divorces do occur today.
- You may be someone in our church family who has been divorced
- o I'm sure it was very very painful for you
- o But the Bible also teaches repentance and forgiveness
- Divorce is not some unforgiveable sin that cannot be repented of and it does not mean God cannot use you in the future
- o For example Heather and I have both been married before
  - I wasn't a Christian in my first marriage

- When I met Heather she made it clear she wouldn't have anything to do with me if I wasn't a Christian because she could see the problems that may occur if two people in a marriage aren't both believers both on Jesus' page and she wisely did not want to go through the same pain as her first marriage
- God used my divorce for me to become a Christian God can
   turn a bad situation around and use it for good
- God has also used Heather and my hurts and problems in our first marriages - to help others that we've come across in ministry - we praise God for that

Next, Paul gives advice on **Mixed Marriages** – that's in verses 12-16 D. Mixed Marriages (vv12-16)

- By mixed marriages we mean where a believer is married to a nonbeliever - remember in Corinth under Paul's ministry - there could be marriages where one of the spouses became a Christian and the other didn't
- Paul says the believing spouse must <u>not</u> divorce the unbelieving spouse
- Remember God is for marriage
- Why would a believer try to keep their marriage to a non-believer together?
- Because God may do a work through the believing spouse sometimes
  the godly and loving conduct of the believing spouse leads their
  unbelieving spouse to Jesus

- Paul also says the believing spouse "sanctifies" the unbelieving spouse
- Sanctified here doesn't mean that the unbelieving spouse is saved just by being married to a Christian. It simply means that they are set apart for a special working in their lives of the Holy Spirit, by virtue of being so close to their Christian spouse (i.e. they receive God's blessings because of their marriage to a Christian)
- Paul <u>also</u> says that any children of this mixed marriage are made holy
- In other words <u>until</u> a **child** is **old enough** to take **responsibility** for their own **relationship** with **Jesus** the **child** of a **believing parent** is to be regarded as a **Christian**. The parent's "**holiness**" (<u>through Jesus</u>) **extends** to the **child**.
- This is a beautiful assurance that the children of a Christian parent are saved, until they become of an age of personal accountability.
- We have no similar assurance for children of non-believing parents. If children of non-believing parents are saved and go to Heaven, it is not because they are innocent as we all inherit Adam's sin but they are saved because the rich mercy of God has been extended to them as well.
- Paul finishes his comments about mixed marriages by saying if the
  unbelieving spouse can't handle being married to a believer and leaves let them leave. God has called us to peace in marriage not warfare!

Next, Paul gives advice on living in the status we were called as a Christian - that's in verses 17-24

E. Living in the Status One was Called (vv17-25)

- Paul's advice is that people remain in the status they were in when they first became a Christian
- In the context of Corinth if a circumcised Jew became a Christian, they shouldn't try to become uncircumcised. And if an uncircumcised Gentile became a Christian, they shouldn't seek to be circumcised like other believing Jews (like Paul)
- Similarly, if slaves became a Christian, they could still remain a slave but they have freedom in Christ, & are free from the slavery to sin. In fact, all Christians enjoy the freedom from slavery to sin and become slaves for Jesus.
- In today's terms, it means we don't have to change our status radically when we become a Christian. Whether we are a bricklayer or a CEO of a company we are all equal in Christ Jesus (Gal 3:28)
- The <u>only time</u> a new Christian should **seek** to **change** the **status** they were called in is to **improve** their **conditions** <u>or</u> where their **occupation** before they became a Christian is **incompatible with Christian principles**.

Now - the second section of the chapter looks at instructions to those who are Single - that's vv25-40

### Instructions to those who are Single (1 Cor 7:25-40)

And first - Paul looks at advice for virgins - that's vv25-28

# A. For those who are virgins (vv25-28)

Paul's advice to virgins is influenced by what he calls the present crisis in
 v26

- This present crisis is the persecution of Christians
- So, his advice is because of this persecution in Corinth -virgins should
   remain unmarried
- We can <u>only</u> imagine in a time of persecution having a wife and family how terrible it would be to be tortured and asked to "renounce Jesus or
  we'll harm your wife and children"
- However, if virgins do marry Paul says that's not a sin but remember
   being married brings other troubles and responsibilities that being
   single you don't have

Next Paul looks at Investing in a Passing World - that's vv29-31

- B. Investing in Passing World (vv29-31)
  - In v29 Paul says time is short because he sees Jesus' return is imminent
  - Paul is not being a false prophet here he is true to Jesus' teaching
     where Jesus taught Christians in all ages to be ready and anticipate His
     coming (Matt 24:44 the son of man will come at an hour when you do not
     expect)
  - Because time is short Paul warns against over-investing in this world
  - Paul is not encouraging the neglect of our family duties but living in a
    way where our earthly family is not all that matters but we live with
    an eye to eternity
  - And because time is short Paul says we're not to over indulge in the
    feelings and things of this world our weeping, rejoicing and having
    possessions must not get in the way of following Jesus

• Paul's argument is that there's nothing solid and lasting in this world - the world is passing away - and the world is our temporary home. Much better to invest in the rock-solid foundation of Jesus for eternity.

Next Paul looks at singles serving God with less distractions - that's vv32-35

C. Serving God with less Distraction (vv32-35)

- Here, Paul simply recognizes that when a person doesn't have a spouse and family responsibilities - they are "freer" to serve God. This was the main reason Paul saw being unmarried preferable for him
- Paul's saying when we're married quite rightly a person has to be
  concerned about how to please their spouse as well as God whereas a
  single person only has to please God
- Unfortunately, Paul's teaching here has caused the RC Church to force singleness on their clergy even if they are not gifted to be single!
- And also, unfortunately, for some single Christians, being single has
  become a terrible distraction looking for a partner rather than
  viewing their singleness (whether temporary or permanent) as a special
  opportunity to serve and please God

Next Paul looks at whether singles should marry - that's vv36-38

# D. Should they Marry? (vv36-38)

- Here Paul is either talking to a father looking for a marriage for his
   virgin daughter or talking to the fiancé of a virgin
- And again, Paul says it's perfectly fine for the virgin to marry especially
  if passions are so strong

- And it's also perfectly fine not to marry
- In fact, for Paul, the choice between married and single was <u>not</u> the choice between good and bad <u>but</u> between better and best. Paul sees being single, best, for him, for two reasons a) because of the present crisis of persecution in Corinth and b) being single "freed" a person up to serve the Lord <u>without</u> distractions.

Finally, Paul gives advice to widows - that's vv39-40

E. Advice to Widows (vv39-40)

- And the advice is a widowed person is free to remarry but they
   should marry a believer ("belong to the Lord") (cf. 2 Cor 6:14)
- But again, Paul sees remaining unmarried as preferable as he wants a
  widowed person to consider whether God is calling them to a single life
  now in order to serve Him without distractions?

# **Applications**

What are we to make of this whole chapter - there's a whole of heap of teaching here?

Let me give us 3 applications to take away this morning

#1 - Marriage and singleness are gifts from God - married people should not see themselves as somehow superior to people who are single.
 Single people should not see themselves as somehow inferior to those who are married - and should not see themselves as somehow a failure.

2. #2 - God requires us to be faithful in our relationship with Him - remember the OT - pictures the relationship between God and His people as a Marriage - where God is always faithful - and His people are not always faithful - in fact adulterous at times.

In the NT marriage is a picture of the relationship between Jesus (as the bridegroom) married to His church - the believers (His bride).

God wants us to have a faithful relationship with Him and with His Son.

And God wants our relationships whether single or married - to be faithful relationships

- 3. #3 We are to use our singleness and our marriages to serve God
- I. What might serving God look like for singles?
  - I. Growing closer to God through prayer, Bible reading, devotions, and Bible Study
  - II. Serving others by seeking out people who need an extra set of hands or a loving, compassionate friend
  - III. Consider mission work? with <u>fewer</u> responsibilities a single person is freed up to go on mission in Oz or overseas
  - IV. Witnessing to other singles your testimony of being content in your singleness by God's grace will be a great encouragement to other singles
    - V. Praying if you are seeking marriage for a suitable partner
  - VI. Serving in a ministry (or two) at church
  - VII. Practicing unconditional love in relationships it's not just marriages that need unconditional love family and friends all Page 13 of 14

require love without necessarily receiving in return. **Practice loving** <u>without</u> **ands**, **ifs and buts** 

- II. What might serving God look like in our marriages?
  - I. Growing closer to God through prayer, Bible reading, devotions,and Bible Study
  - II. Husband and wife working together. In the book of Acts every time Priscilla and Aquila are mentioned they are mentioned together they were seen not as two but one two are better than one! (Eccles 4:9-12)
  - III. Talking about spiritual matters not just your plans, your finances, your children, your problems and your holidays
    - IV. Modelling a Christian marriage to others watching a husband is to love his wife - <u>like</u> Christ loves the church - his wife is to love and support her husband
      - V. Serving in a ministry (or two) at church together
    - VI. Connecting with other married couples Christian and non-Christian
  - VII. Raising godly children and grandchildren
