Deuteronomy 6:1-9

These are the commands, decrees and laws the LORD your God directed me to teach you to observe in the land that you are crossing the Jordan to possess, ² so that you, your children and their children after them may fear the LORD your God as long as you live by keeping all his decrees and commands that I give you, and so that you may enjoy long life. ³ Hear, Israel, and be careful to obey so that it may go well with you and that you may increase greatly in a land flowing with milk and honey, just as the LORD, the God of your ancestors, promised you.

⁴Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God, the LORD is one. ⁵Love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. ⁶These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. ⁷Impress them on your children. 1 Corinthians 12:31-13:13

³¹ Now eagerly desire the greater gifts.

And yet I will show you the most excellent way.

13 If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. ² If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. ³ If I give all I possess to the poor and give over my body to hardship that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

⁴Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. ⁵ It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. ⁶ Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. ⁷ It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

⁸ Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they will be stilled; where there is knowledge, it will pass away. ⁹ For we know in part and we prophesy in part, ¹⁰ but when completeness comes, what is in part disappears. ¹¹ When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put the ways of childhood behind me. ¹² For now we see only a reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known.

¹³ And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

The Way of Love (Deuteronomy 6:1-9 & 1 Corinthians 12:31-13:13)

It would be great to have your Bibles open at 1 Cor chapter 13 Let me ask God to give us understanding of His Word; Let's pray...

Context/Most Excellent Way (1 Cor 12:31)

Before we begin then

Let's **remind** ourselves of the **context**:

- The Apostle Paul is writing to a bunch of Christians in the Greek church of Corinth
- In chapter 12 he spoke of spiritual gifts

[PowerPoint 1-Context]

- Spiritual gifts are for the common good of all (1 Cor 12:7)
- God (thru His Holy Spirit) distributes spiritual gifts as He determines (1 Cor 12:11)
- All the spiritual gifts of the people in the church family are <u>like</u> a body in fact the body of Christ (1 Cor 12:12) one body with many parts
- Each of us is part of the body of Christ and we all have a different purpose and the gifts work together (1 Cor 12:27)
- Each body part is necessary and important and no body part is better than another - we need each other
- Unfortunately, some of the Christians in Corinth thought they had better
 gifts than others in the church -they thought they were super spiritual and they looked down on others.

- This was causing disunity in the church
- That's why Paul's writing this letter to stop disunity and disharmony in the church
- Now in this chapter 13 Paul says when it comes to using these spiritual
 gifts there is a most excellent way
- See v31 of chapter 12

Now eagerly desire the greater gifts. And yet I will show you the most excellent way.

[PowerPoint 2- excellent way]

What is this most excellent way?

Simply it is LOVE!

Love Defined

What is love?

[PowerPoint 3-Love Defined]

It's hard to define.

A dictionary definition is: an intense feeling of deep affection

But that's not a very good definition.

Especially since in English - we often misuse the word

We say - "we <u>love</u> our husband or wife" - and then say "we <u>love</u> roast dinners" Surely the word love in both those statements is not the same?

In Greek - the language of New Testament [NT]

There are several words for love:

There's **Eros** = where we get the word **erotic** from = **sexual** pleasure **Philia** = a deep **friendship**, **brotherly** or **sisterly** love (Philadelphia means brotherly love)

Storge = **family** love – the bond between mothers, fathers, sons, daughters, sisters and brothers

Agape = unconditional, sacrificial love – not necessarily expecting anything in return'

Agape is the love word used in 1 Corinthians 13 - it's God's love The love word, Agape, is used in many places in the NT

Here's some examples:

John 3:16 - For God so loved [**verb: agapeo**] the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

1 John 4:7 - Dear friends, let us love [verb: agapeo] one another, for love [noun: agape] comes from God. Everyone who loves [verb: agapeo] has been born of God and knows God.

1 John 4:9 - This is how God showed his love [noun: agape] among us: He sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him.

In chapter 13 of 1 Corinthians - Agape love is described

And I want to make 3 points about agape love this morning

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Love is Indispensable (1 Cor 13:1-3)

1st point is "agape love is indispensable" - that's in verses 1 to 3
[PowerPoint 4 -indispensable]

Paul tackles the problem in Corinth where some people thought they were super spiritual and better than everyone else.

Paul says in v1 - even if he had the gift to speak some obscure foreign language or speak the language of angels in Heaven - it doesn't mean anything if there's no love shown with that gift

The noise he would make with that language would be <u>like</u> resounding gong or clanging cymbal - it just <u>sounds like</u> a rusty old gate creaking

Paul's point in v2 & v3 is - <u>whether</u> a person has the gift of prophecy to speak

God's word really plainly <u>or</u> has super wisdom that can explain any mystery

clearly <u>or</u> has super faith that can move a mountain <u>or</u> if a person gives

everything <u>to</u> the poor - or if a person is <u>like</u> a martyr - the person with these

gifts is nothing - if there's no love shown with it.

Here's some illustrations to make the point:

Suppose someone says - "you can't speak other tongues like me - when you can you'll be a proper Christian, like me"

Or they say "When you can preach like me - or can explain the Bible like me - come back - and we can have a decent conversation"

Or they say "If only you had more faith, you could achieve so much more, you really are quite weak in your faith"

Or they say to a homeless person "here's some food and money - don't ask for anymore - stop being a bludger and go and get a job"

Or they say "I make so many sacrifices for this church, I never see you do anything for the church"

I hope you can see <u>none</u> of these statements are using spiritual gifts <u>with</u> love!

They are more about the person being proud than being loving.

You see there's a spiritual mathematical equation - that goes like this

5 minus 1 = Nothing

That's - 5 spiritual gifts minus love = nothing

Love is the essential ingredient when using our gifts

Love is indispensable

Application:

When it comes to using the spiritual gifts that God has blessed us with - are we using them with love? If not, what do we need to change - to show love?

Love is other person focused (1 Cor 13:4-7)

The second point is "love is other person focused" - that's in verses 4 to 7
[PowerPoint 5 - other person]

Paul describes the characteristics of love in verses 4 to 7

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These verses are often used at weddings to talk about love in a marriage
But the context here is - how we show love when using our spiritual gifts.

In general terms, though, these verses - do give us a clear picture of love

- Love is patient: the King James version says long suffering (it literally means not to lose heart) -- so even when someone might be annoying or hurtful we continue to show patience and love them and forgive them and don't look for revenge or look to get even remember Jesus said "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing" (Luke 23:34) and Peter says "Love covers over a multitude of sins" (1 Peter 4:8)
- Love is kind: kindness means saying nice things, doing nice things being considerate to the other person. Think about the way Jesus dealt
 with the woman caught in adultery He didn't condone what she did but
 he was kind to her (John 8:1-11)
- Love is not envious: -we shouldn't want what the other person has like
 we're in some sort of competition we should be pleased that they have
 what they have after all we're meant to share our gifts & possessions
 with one another
- Love does not boast: we shouldn't be bragging about how good we are that does two things a) it annoys the heck out of the other person and
 b) it makes the other person feel inferior and even hurt
- Love is not proud: it <u>literally</u> means puffed up big headed arrogant looking down on someone. <u>Love without pride means</u> we <u>should not</u> think any job is beneath us. It's okay for a husband to sweep the floor and wash the dishes and hang the washing out.

- Love does not dishonour: -it literally means being rude showing no manners it means forgetting pleases and thank yous it means showing no respect just riding over someone else's boundaries. Our love should never be like that.
- Love is not self-seeking: our love should not be seeking what's best for me but seeking what's best for the other person. Pleasing and caring for the other person first. Usually, they can't help but respond in the same way anyway.
- Love is not easily angered: it means we don't blow our top over the slightest thing. We don't raise our voice, yell and scream. That scares the other person and breaks down trust, and they won't want to talk about anything deep in the future in case things blow up again.
 - Sometimes it's **okay to be angry** about something <u>but</u> in our anger we shouldn't sin (Ephesians 4:26). Rudyard Kipling said "it is the mark of a man if he can keep his head when everyone around him is losing theirs and blaming it on hm; and if the man is hated but doesn't give way to hating back"
- Love does not keep record of wrongs: [the Greek literally means keeping a record in a ledger]
 - If we do have a disagreement about something we don't bring up the last 5 years of arguments and say "remember when you did this and this and this and this" or say things like "you AWLAYS DO this!" saying things like that just inflame the problem. Much better to forgive past wrongs and put them behind our back.

- Love does not delight in evil: we should not answer wrong with more wrong retaliating & getting even never works. Two wrongs don't make
 a right e.g. look what's happening in USA right now.
- Love rejoices in the truth: the secret of a loving relationship is to always tell the truth. Lies always lead to more lies and deceit and cover ups.
- Love always protects: it <u>literally</u> means putting a covering over someone so they can endure anything so in this sense it means love can bear any insult, any injury and any disappointment. So, in our loving we would want to protect someone from insult, injury and disappointment.
- Love always trusts: in terms of our relationship with God it means
 believing every promise God makes and in terms of our relationships with
 others it means trusting someone completely with our life- and saying I
 trust that you will always have the best intentions for me
- Love always hopes: this means always looking for better days ahead -
- Love always perseveres: this means enduring to the end and never giving up. As marriage vows say (and this can be friendships too) for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health,

Notice with each one of these love characteristics - they are focused on the person being loved and not on ourselves - love is other person centered

Notice too - these love characteristics - are a picture of God's love for us.

And they are a picture of the love Jesus showed in His life and death.

<u>Application</u>: <u>which</u> of these **love characteristics** <u>do you</u> **find easy?** <u>Which</u> do <u>you</u> **find difficult?**

<u>If you're game</u> - **ask someone close** to **you** - to tell you which one's you struggle with?

What will you do about the love characteristics you find difficult?

Repent and pray and ask for God's help?

Love is everlasting (1 Cor 13:8-13)

The third point is "agape love is everlasting" - that's in verses 8 to 13
[PowerPoint 6-Everlasting]

See v8 - Paul says love never fails

How can Paul say that - when we see so many loving friendships break down - when we see so many marriages end in divorce?

It sure doesn't seem like love never fails.

Well - that's because <u>those</u> relationships <u>haven't</u> applied the agape love <u>that</u>

Paul's described here.

Remember agape love is God's way of loving - it's other person focused - it loves sacrificially like God loved us by sending His son - and it's a "to die for" love - like the love Jesus showed on the cross.

That's what Paul means here - God's type of love - agape love - never fails

We just sometimes fail to love like that!

God's agape love is everlasting.

<u>Whereas</u> Paul says - still in v8 - spiritual gifts - and he lists a few examples - like prophecy, speaking in tongues and knowledge - spiritual gifts will all pass away?

Why will they pass away?

Because once we're in Heaven with the Lord - we don't need those gifts.

Paul explains what our time on Earth is like with 2 examples - in v11-12

1st example is a child (v11) - when we were children we obviously acted and thought like a child - but when we grew up and became an adult - we stopped acting like a child [not sure if that's happened to me yet - ha ha]

Paul's point is our knowledge of God whilst on this earth is childlike in comparison to what we'll know and see - when we meet Him face to face

2nd example is a mirror (v12) - Corinth was famous for its manufacture of mirrors. But <u>our</u> modern mirror as we know it - gives pretty much a perfect reflection [since 13th century] <u>but</u> mirrors in Corinth were made from highly polished metal and at best gave an imperfect reflection.

<u>Paul's point</u> is that in this life we only see imperfect reflections of God and are left with mysteries and unanswered questions.

Paul's point is - this way of agape love will lead us in the end to come face to face with the Lord - when we'll have all those mysteries and questions answered and we'll see the complete picture.

When will this happen?

When Jesus returns or when a believer in Jesus dies and goes to Heaven - whichever comes first

The bottom line - Paul says - in V13 - is that

Faith, hope and love remain but the greatest is love

Why is love the greatest?

Because God is love and God is everlasting.

And it's God's love for us - that produces a rock-solid faith and gives us a certain hope of Heaven and eternity with Jesus

Application:

In our use of spiritual gifts - are we showing agape love?

In our relationships with others - are we showing agape love?

When we look around our world and our community

We see many people operating with conditional love

They'll love as long as no one lets them down - then they're off.

They'll love as long as there's something in it for them - if not there out of there.

<u>We</u> see people <u>who</u> are victims of being loved like that - and they are wounded and battered and bruised - <u>from</u> this incomplete love.

Because it's not agape love.

Our job as Christians is to correct this conditional love that people are swimming in and love them with Jesus' agape love.

It's easy to love someone who is loveable -

What about the unloved? Who's going to show them the most excellent way?

What about the unlovable? Who's going to love them, if we don't?

Conclusion

To finish up then

The most excellent way of love - is shown magnificently in the Cross of Jesus.

If we had a Bible picture dictionary and looked up love

[PowerPoint 7-Picture]

We'd see a picture of Jesus dying on the Cross

It's unconditional sacrificial agape love

Will people say that about our love?

Let's pray?
