The Believers Pray

²³ On their release, Peter and John went back to their own people and reported all that the chief priests and the elders had said to them. ²⁴ When they heard this, they raised their voices together in prayer to God. "Sovereign Lord," they said, "you made the heavens and the earth and the sea, and everything in them. ²⁵ You spoke by the Holy Spirit through the mouth of your servant, our father David:

"'Why do the nations rage and the peoples plot in vain? ²⁶ The kings of the earth rise up and the rulers band together against the Lord and against his anointed one.'

Sermon

Psalm 2 - The Father and His Son (Psalm 2:1-12 and Acts 4:23-26)

Intro

- "The King is dead, Long Live the King!"
- You might have heard that saying?
- The saying dates back to 1272 during the reign of King Henry III of England.
- Henry died whilst his son Edward (I) was fighting overseas in the Crusades.
- To avoid any chance of civil war erupting over the succession to the throne, the Royal Advisers pronounced that "The throne shall never be empty; the country shall never be without a monarch".
- So, Edward was <u>declared king immediately</u> and ruled in absentia, <u>until</u> news of his father's death reached him and he returned to England.
- There were no mobile phones or emails back then!

Context

Back in the time of King David, about 1000 BC, Nathan the prophet
delivered a <u>similar promise</u> from God to King David. In 2 Sam 7:16, Nathan
said to David "Your house and your kingdom will endure forever before
me, your throne will be established forever".

- God was making the declaration just like the Royal Advisers in England that
 <u>David's throne would never be empty!</u>
- This morning's Bible passage from Psalm 2, is known as the Royal Psalm or the Coronation Psalm. Psalm 2 is believed to have been read on the occasion of a new Jewish King coming to the throne.
- To the nations around Israel in King David's time, it's a Psalm about what is expected of you when you are a subject of the king of Israel a king appointed by God.
- To people in the Apostles time and to us today, it's MORE than just a Psalm about what is expected of you when you are a subject of an <u>earthly</u> king, it's about what is expected of <u>us</u> by God the <u>ruler of the Heavens and the Earth</u> what does God expect of us?
- Speaking of what God expects of us...
- Christmas has come and gone and many in our country have celebrated

 Christmas without acknowledging the true reason for their celebration
- Instead, they've celebrated family, Santa, presents, overindulging,
 overspending and partying
- Is that what God expects of us?
- I wonder if Christ was in your Christmas in 2020?
- Christ means God's anointed God's Promised Anointed One the One
 He promised to save people
- The Hebrew for Christ is Messiah

- We spent all of December <u>counting down</u> to the birth of this promised
 Messiah Jesus
- The <u>reason</u> Jesus came is the subject of our Psalm this morning
- Psalm 2 [Please turn there now] tells of a problem in verses 1 to 3
- A problem they had way back in the OT
- And a problem we have today

Rebellion (Psalm 2:1-3)

- That problem is explained here in Psalm 2 v1-3
- It's the problem of **rebellion against God** [which is sin]
- V1 says nations conspire to keep God out of the picture we see that today in countries like: North Korea, Afghanistan, Somalia, Libya,
 Pakistan, Eritrea, Sudan, Yemen, Iran and India. These are the Top 10 countries in the world for persecuting Christians countries who want to keep God the Father and His Son Jesus out of the people's lives. And will persecute and even kill people who follow Jesus
- But they're not the only countries in the world doing this
- There's the subtle keeping God out of the picture even in Australia ignoring God's rules for living ignoring what God says about sexuality ignoring what God says about marriage and allowing same sex-marriage and things like the "conversion therapy bill" in Victoria [explain] and things

- like the **removal of Scripture** <u>in our schools in some states</u> and <u>even</u> the push to say "happy holidays" <u>rather than</u> "happy Christmas"
- And look who the rebellion is against see v2 it's not just rebellion against
 God but against His anointed one!
- <u>In our NT reading today</u>, Acts 4:23-26, we see that verses 1 and 2 of Psalm 2 were quoted by the earliest Christians, in a thanksgiving prayer, following the release of Peter and John from jail.
- These early Christians identified the Anointed One, as not any old king, but as King Jesus, the Son of God -
- and they identified the rebellion against God and His Anointed One, as being from earthly King Herod, Pontius Pilate, the Gentiles and the people of Israel.
- So, rebellion against the Anointed One, is rebellion against God. As the
 Apostle John puts it:

- "He who does not honour the Son does not honour the Father who sent him"
 (John 5:23)
- See v3 The people back at the time of the Psalm and many people today

 think that God's rules just tie people up and are too much of a burden
 and that it's much better when we keep God out of the picture and run

 things our own way there's the idea out there we don't need God we

 can do everything quite well on our own thank you!

- Sinful people never want to walk in the limitations which God places on them.
- <u>Sinful people claim</u> their supposed freedom and <u>claim</u> they are masters of their own destiny. There are <u>many people today</u> who want to do whatever they want <u>be their own God</u> deny God is in control <u>in fact</u> deny God even exists?
- The Year 2020 if nothing else has shown us we can't control everything
- It's time to look up to the Heavens time to acknowledge and worship God
 not the time to continue to ignore Him!

The Father's Response (Psalm 2:4-6)

- How will God, the Father, respond to this rebellion?
- See V4 God is still on His throne
- And God finds the rebellion of the nations and rulers back in the time of the Psalm - and Today - God finds this rebellion laughable
- It's laughable because no one can kick God off His throne
- No-one can outsmart God or think they know better than Him
- He scoffs at such a thought
- God laughs at this rebellion <u>because</u> laughing is what human attempts to overthrow the rule of God <u>deserve</u>.
- It's <u>understandable</u> that **humans** should want to **reject God's rule** <u>that's</u> <u>what SIN is</u> - it's **our will** <u>instead</u> <u>of</u> **God's will**.

- All the same, it's foolish and laughable to think we can get rid of God.
- The Roman Emperor Diocletian (AD 245-313), during the persecution of
 Christians, had a medal struck with the inscription "The name of Christianity being extinguished".
- <u>But Diocletian</u> did not abolish Christianity in fact it grew and triumphed and <u>became</u> the religion of the Roman Empire!

- Humans' attempts to get rid of God cannot succeed
- Look at v5 such rebellion and disregard for God makes Him very angry
- And so, we come to the climax of the response from God. And surprisingly, it is not a direct punishment by God but simply an announcement. See Verse 6

 God says "I have installed my King on Zion, my holy hill." This implies that all the rebellious nation's kings will be no match for God's king. It's a bit like, kids playing with weapons made of Lego and someone turns up with a real army tank! There's no contest!
- It's also worth noting that the word installed in verse 6 is better translated as anointed. And that the anointed king and the holy hill he rules on, Zion, which is another name for Jerusalem, are inseparable.
- <u>In the same way</u>, God's anointed king, [PowerPoint 3] Jesus, and his holy Church are inseparable.

The Son's Response (Psalm 2:7-9)

- With God's King anointed the writer of the Psalm tells us what the King says - in see v7.
- The King says: I will proclaim the decree of the LORD: He said to me,
 "You are my Son; today I have become your Father.
- Here the anointed King is saying that He is God's Son and God is His
 Father -and that there is a special relationship between them
- It's an everlasting relationship because this King and Son is the forever
 King of the forever kingdom that God promised through the prophet
 Nathan in 2 Samuel 7 which I read at the start
- And verse 7 has even more significance, when we look to the New Testament
 and see that this actual verse is quoted about one particular descendant of
 King David namely JESUS
- Ps 2 verse 7 is quoted at the baptism of Jesus (Matt 3:17, Mark 1:11 and Luke 3:22),
- and <u>quoted</u> again at the **transfiguration of Jesus** (Matt 17:5) and again in reference to the **resurrection of Jesus** from the dead (Acts 13:33).

• It is Jesus' resurrection from the dead that publicly declares that he is the true King and true Son of God that Psalm 2 is talking about.

- It's Jesus' resurrection that <u>fulfils</u> the <u>claim</u> of Nathan the prophet that King David's throne would be established forever <u>because</u> Jesus is an "alive" ruler <u>not a dead one!</u>
- The <u>psalm continues</u> with **God speaking to the king**, **verse 8** reads: Ask of me, and I will make the nations your inheritance, the ends of the earth your possession.
- Here, being God's son carries privileges. A bit like an American Express
 Card membership has its privileges!
- The king is promised that he will have control and ownership of all nations to the ends of the earth. If we take this as a promise to King David or his descendants, we have 2 problems: Firstly, the kings of Israel and Judah come to an end at the exile to Babylon in 586 BC, and Secondly, no king of Israel or Judah ever had control of all nations to the ends of the earth.
- So, this verse <u>CANNOT</u> have its fulfilment in <u>any earthly</u> king. We must look elsewhere.
- We <u>find the answer of course in Jesus</u>, let me read **Matthew 28:18**:
 Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me"
- Jesus is claiming He has authority over all nations in the world!
- However, if we look around our world, we see <u>countries like</u>: North Korea,
 Russia and China and we see <u>tumultuous leaders</u> who are hardly under the authority of Jesus!

- So, we have to have a perspective. When Jesus came, he truly
 ESTABLISHED his kingdom, but the climax to His kingdom remains a

 FUTURE reality. The book of Revelation contains many references to Psalm 2 and anticipates the ultimate rule and triumph of Jesus as described in Psalm 2.
- Revelation 1:5 describes Jesus as the firstborn from the dead, and the ruler of the kings of the earth.
- But why the delay? Why don't we see Jesus as ruler of the kings of the earth today?
- Well, the delay is to give us time, as grateful subjects of the King of Kings
 to make Jesus' name known among all nations, so everyone has a chance
 to believe in King Jesus
- And verse 9 of Psalm 2 tells how this will happen, it reads: You will rule
 them with an iron sceptre; you will dash them to pieces like pottery."
 Jesus is going to rule with an iron rod and smash all the rebellious people
 to pieces, like a crazy bull in a china shop!
- Hang on though? Jesus being crucified on a cross, hardly seems like a king ruling with an iron rod?
- Remember though, God's ways are not our ways.
- Jesus' iron rod is God's Word which is the Gospel of Jesus.
- The author of Hebrews describes God's Word as sharper than a doubleedged sword that penetrates and divides soul and spirit, joints and marrow, and judges thoughts and attitudes of the heart (Heb 4:12)

The <u>apostle Paul says of his ministry of the Gospel</u>, the weapons we fight
with are not the weapons of the world - on the contrary they have divine
power to demolish strongholds (2 Cor 10:4)

 It is the Gospel message that will destroy sin and rebellion - and change hard stubborn hearts.

Ultimatum (Psalm 2:10-12)

- And so, we reach the climax of the Psalm. The kings of the earth who are rebelling in verses 1-3 are told to be wise and think about their actions.
 Verses 10 and 11 read: Therefore, you kings, be wise; be warned, you rulers of the earth. Serve the LORD with fear and rejoice with trembling.
- There is an opportunity to <u>repent</u> for those kings and rulers who have rebelled against God.
- If you are here today, and still in rebellion against God still thinking your way is better than God's way like these rebellious kings there is still time to repent [explain]
- And verse 12 is where the rubber hits the road.
- Let me read it: Kiss the Son, lest he be angry and you be destroyed in your way, for his wrath can flare up in a moment. Blessed are all who take refuge in him.

[PowerPoint 6]

- Those rebelling are told to Kiss the Son, lest he be angry.
- Kissing someone in authority is seen as an act of respect, honour and
 gratitude. Mary Magdalene kissed Jesus' feet and washed them with her
 tears. She loved much and was forgiven much, and was truly grateful for
 her forgiveness.
- In the same way, those who are not right with God, are asked to throw themselves at Jesus and Kiss him in repentance and honour. The alternative is to face His anger and judgement and to be destroyed.

Conclusion

- <u>So, in Psalm</u> 2, we see that the **rebellious nations are told to Kiss the Son**, otherwise **face a final fierce destruction**.
- We must make sure we are not among them.
- The <u>rulers of many nations and many people in the world</u> rage against the Son Jesus <u>and</u> against the Father's will. <u>We must not!</u>
- The hands that Jesus holds out for us to kiss are pierced by nails when he was crucified in our place.
- One day he is coming as the great judge of all.
- On that day the wicked will be punished, but today is the day of grace. He invites anyone who hasn't come to him to come to him.

• The final verse says

[PowerPoint 7]

- "Blessed (or Happy) are all who take refuge in him".
- If you have already kissed and embraced the Son, it is a <u>reminder</u> that the
 ONLY refuge from the wrath of God is God's mercy unfolded at the cross
 of Jesus Christ.
- It's a <u>reminder</u> to tell OTHERS that <u>they need to Embrace and Kiss the</u>
 Son Jesus Christ <u>BEFORE it's too late</u>.
