² But Samuel said, "How can I go? If Saul hears about it, he will kill me."

Judging Others

7 "Do not judge, or you too will be judged. ² For in the same way you judge others, you will be judged, and with the measure you use, it will be measured to you.

³ "Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own eye? ⁴ How can you say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' when all the time there is a plank in your own eye? ⁵ You hypocrite, first take the plank out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to remove the speck from your brother's eye.

⁶ "Do not give dogs what is sacred; do not throw your pearls to pigs. If you do, they may trample them under their feet, and turn and tear you to pieces.

My **brother in-law** uses this **saying** a lot "when you point a finger at someone else - remember there are three fingers pointing back at <u>you"</u>



- It can be easy to judge people without ever taking a look at ourselves can't
 it?
- And it can be easy to judge people on what they "look" like
- We might see someone carrying a bit of weight and decide they have no self-control when in fact they could have a medical condition that prevents them losing weight or they take medication which causes them to gain weight
- We might see someone who looks sad or grumpy all the time and decide
 they're not worth bothering with when in fact they are struggling with a big
 hurt in their life and would love a friend to talk to

- We might see someone who comes across loud and confident and decide
 they are a big-head or a show-off when in fact they're really insecure and
 their loudness is just a front so people don't know they are hurting
- Or we might look at what people wear and say "not that dress again" or
 "not that shirt again" but we don't know their story.
- As the saying goes you can't judge a book by its cover

Judging outwardly (1 Samuel 16:1-7)

- Which brings us to our OT passage from 1 Samuel 16:1-7 [please turn there]
- God sent the prophet Samuel to a man named Jesse in Bethlehem
- Samuel was to anoint one of Jesse's sons as the new King of Israel to replace King Saul
- When Samuel saw Jesse's eldest son, Eliab, standing before him he seemed
 such a fine specimen of a man that Samuel assumed this would be the one
 God would anoint as the next King
- But God had other ideas

- See v7
- The Lord says to Samuel

The LORD does not look at the things people look at. People look at the outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart



- You see God looks at a person's inside their heart not their outward appearance
- That's what Jesus has been talking about throughout His Sermon on the Mount
- He's been talking about our hearts (our inner-most being) -
- He's continually asking <u>Are our hearts right towards God and towards</u>
 others?

Our Judgement of Ourselves (Matthew 7:1-6)

You see there were <u>a group of religious people in Jesus' time</u> - called the
 Scribes and Pharisees who were self-righteous

- Now remember being righteous means being declared right with God and approved by God
- But these religious guys had declared themselves right with God and approved by God that's what being self-righteous means
- So, because they were self-righteous they played the part of God
- And they judged themselves incorrectly and also judged other people harshly
 and unfairly and they even had a false thinking about God's judgment they
 never for a moment thought God might judge them!
- Which brings us to Matthew 7:1-6
- We should point out <u>before we go any further</u> that <u>sometimes</u> this passage is used incorrectly
 - o It does not mean that we suspend all criticism of others
 - o It does not mean we turn a blind eye to people's faults and sins and pretend to not notice them
 - o It does not mean we stop trying to discern between truth and error
 - o And it does not mean we stop trying to discern between good and evil
- How do we know that Jesus doesn't mean any of that?
- Because if we behave like that we wouldn't be honest or loving- and in fact it would be hypocritical and we would be going against all that Jesus has taught so far in the Sermon on the Mount and our righteousness would be no better than the Pharisees
- So, let's look at what Jesus really means

• In Matthew 7:1-6 - Jesus is saying - true judgment begins with ourselves - and he gives the reasons why

1. We will be judged (v1)

[PowerPoint 4a-we will be judged]

- Firstly true judgment begins with ourselves because we will be judged
 see verse 1
- The tense of the verb "you will be judged" signifies a once and for all final judgment
- Romans 14:10-12 says one day we will all have to stand before God's judgment seat and kneel before Him and give an account of ourselves
- So what Jesus is saying is remember if you judge others don't forget God
 will judge you one day
- So, it's much better if we first judge ourselves then we are preparing for the final judgment when we face God.
- How might we judge ourselves?
- Now clearly, we can't act as the supreme judge of all things only God can
 do that!
- So, it might be helpful to use a different phrase
- The Greek word used for judge here also means to question behaviour
- So, it would be helpful for us to question our own behaviour before questioning anyone else?

- Are there sinful behaviours in our lives that we are ignoring whilst we're pointing the finger at others?
- Jesus illustrated this point in John 8 when some men brought an adulterous woman to him who had been caught in the act of adultery-
- Jesus pointed out to the woman's accusers that they had never thought about the sin in their own lives perhaps some had committed adultery in their hearts and on top of that the accusers didn't bring the man who took part in the adultery with the woman only the poor woman was judged by them the accusers were hypocrites
- When we accuse people of bad behaviour and we haven't repented of our own sinful behaviour we're being a hypocrite
- Don't forget we will be judged

2. We are already being judged (v2)

[PowerPoint 4b-already being judged]

- Secondly true judgment begins with ourselves because we are already
 being judged right now see v2
- <u>Jesus says</u> when we judge others we will be judged in the same way and in the same measure
- Are we okay with that?
- If we harshly questioned others behaviour and get all high and mighty then it
 has a way of boomeranging back to us and people start questioning our
 behaviour just as harshly?


- In other words, we reap what we sow
- If we sow a harsh, arrogant, superior, condemning attitude to others then we can expect the same in return
- <u>Perhaps it's worth us questioning</u> the <u>way</u> we approach people <u>who we consider</u> are behaving badly?

3. We must see clearly to help others (vv3-5)

[PowerPoint 4c-See clearly]

- Thirdly true judgment begins with ourselves because we need to see
 clearly to help others
- The <u>aim</u> of <u>judging</u> <u>or questioning someone else's behaviour is to "help" them
 and <u>not to</u> "<u>destroy</u>" <u>them</u>
 </u>
- Jesus gives a brilliant illustration in verses 3 to 5

[PowerPoint 5-plank/speck]



- The exaggerated humorous picture of a man with a two-by-four plank stuck
 in his eye trying to remove a speck from another man's eye is ridiculous but it makes a great point
- Jesus' point is if we don't honestly face up to our own sins and confess
 them, we become blind to ourselves and our behaviour and then we can't see
 clearly to help others
- The Scribes and Pharisees saw the sins of other people, but they would not look at their own sins no wonder Jesus calls them blind guides in Matt 23.
- For us we need to be looking in the mirror (James 1:23-24) and taking a
 good hard look at ourselves and our behaviour before questioning anyone
 else's behaviour
- As we do this self-examination we must avoid 2 extremes
 - 1st extreme We must not do a shallow examination and fail to examine our hearts honestly and thoroughly - a quick glance in the mirror will not do
 - 2nd extreme we must avoid a perpetual autopsy of ourselves and become so discouraged and defeated we can't function. Instead bring our concerns about our behaviour to Jesus in prayer (Phil 4:5-9)
- After we have judged ourselves honestly before God, and removed the things
 that are blinding our judgment then we can help others and properly question
 their behaviour
- There's also another point here with Jesus' illustration of the eye

- Eyes are really sensitive
- I don't know about you but I hate anyone or anything touching my eye
- So, as we point out a person's behaviour we must do it sensitively as though operating on an eye using tender loving care we're trying to help people not make them feel crushed and defeated

4. We must judge correctly to share the Gospel (v6) [PowerPoint 6-4 points]

- Fourthly true judgment begins with ourselves because we must judge
 correctly to share the Gospel see v6
- As God's people we are in the privileged position to handle the "holy things" of
 the Lord these are the pearls Jesus is referring to in this verse
- God has entrusted us with sharing the Good News of Jesus (the Gospel)
- And we must treasure the Gospel carefully
- Jesus is saying no dedicated priest in His day would throw meat from the altar to a filthy dog and only a fool would give pearls to a pig
- Whilst it's true we must carry the Gospel to everyone (Mark 16:15) it's also true we must not cheapen the Gospel by not having any discernment
- Even Jesus refused to talk to King Herod (Luke 23:9) and the Apostle Paul refused to argue with people who resisted the Word (Acts 13:44-49)
- Remember the reason for judging is not to condemn others but to help them
- When Jesus dealt with people He dealt with them according to their needs and their spiritual condition

- He did not use the same spiel with each person He came across
- He talked about being born again with Nicodemus
- He spoke of living water to the Samaritan woman
- When the religious leaders tried to trap Him, He refused to answer their question until they answered His question (Matt 21:23-27)
- Jesus is saying here when we share the Gospel we need to judge each situation if we're getting abused or ridiculed or disrespected or if the person we are sharing the Gospel is openly hostile and defiantly rejects God's Word then it's okay for us to decide against going any further with sharing Jesus with them
- We can leave the door open for future conversations but for this occasion we shake the dust off our feet (Matt 10:14) and move on!

Helping Others

- Now that we've judged ourselves how can we help others
 [PowerPoint 7-Heading]
- Before we look at helping others here's some things that are not helpful
- We shouldn't be judging people on things that are a matter of taste or preference or things that are subjective. For example:
 - If someone has the occasional glass of wine or beer and we don't let's
 not judge them
 - If someone is not wearing a face mask this morning we don't know their
 situation they may have a medical reason let's not judge them

- If someone decides to not to have the flu vaccine or the covid19 vaccine
 that's their choice and if we think differently that's our choice
- If we judge people on their tastes and preferences and we get quite pushy about it don't be surprised if they push back hard!
- The <u>real reason</u> for judging is to <u>help others</u>

1. The Bible is as our moral compass. The Bible is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness (2 Tim 3:15-17). It's God's Word that shows us where wrong choices are being made - not our opinions - not our gut feelings - nor our own preferences

2. If we consider someone's behaviour is contrary to God's Word -We don't hit them with a sledgehammer - Eph 4:32 says: Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.

4. To help people - we **must restore them gently** - as *G*al 6:1 says - Brothers and sisters, if someone is caught in a sin, you who live by the Spirit should restore that person gently. But watch yourselves, or you also may be tempted.
