1 Kings 3:16-28

## **A Wise Ruling**

<sup>16</sup> Now two prostitutes came to the king and stood before him. <sup>17</sup> One of them said, "Pardon me, my lord. This woman and I live in the same house, and I had a baby while she was there with me. <sup>18</sup> The third day after my child was born, this woman also had a baby. We were alone; there was no one in the house but the two of us.

<sup>19</sup> "During the night this woman's son died because she lay on him. <sup>20</sup> So she got up in the middle of the night and took my son from my side while I your servant was asleep. She put him by her breast and put her dead son by my breast. <sup>21</sup> The next morning, I got up to nurse my son—and he was dead! But when I looked at him closely in the morning light, I saw that it wasn't the son I had borne."

<sup>22</sup> The other woman said, "No! The living one is my son; the dead one is yours."

But the first one insisted, "No! The dead one is yours; the living one is mine." And so, they argued before the king.

<sup>23</sup> The king said, "This one says, 'My son is alive and your son is dead,' while that one says, 'No! Your son is dead and mine is alive.'"

<sup>24</sup> Then the king said, "Bring me a sword." So, they brought a sword for the king. <sup>25</sup> He then gave an order: "Cut the living child in two and give half to one and half to the other."

<sup>26</sup> The woman whose son was alive was deeply moved out of love for her son and said to the king, "Please, my lord, give her the living baby! Don't kill him!"

But the other said, "Neither I nor you shall have him. Cut him in two!"

<sup>27</sup> Then the king gave his ruling: "Give the living baby to the first woman. Do not kill him; she is his mother."

<sup>28</sup> When all Israel heard the verdict the king had given, they held the king in awe, because they saw that he had wisdom from God to administer justice.

#### Colossians 2:1-5

I want you to know how hard I am contending for you and for those at Laodicea, and for all who have not met me personally. <sup>2</sup> My goal is that they may be encouraged in heart and united in love, so that they may have the full riches of complete understanding, in order that they may know the mystery of God, namely, Christ, <sup>3</sup> in whom are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. <sup>4</sup> I tell you this so that no one may deceive you by fine-sounding arguments. <sup>5</sup> For though I am absent from you in body, I am present with you in spirit and delight to see how disciplined you are and how firm your faith in Christ is.

## Sermon: What a discerning heart looks like

We're resuming our series on the OT book of 1 Kings.

It would be great to have your bible turned to 1 Kings 3 - and you may have a sermon outline - if you'd like to take notes.

Let me ask God to grant us understanding this morning Let's pray...

#### <u>Intro</u>

- This morning we going to be <u>looking at how</u> King Solomon showed great wisdom
- What is wisdom anyway?

[PowerPoint 1-wisdom definition]

the ability to make sensible decisions and give good advice because of the experience and knowledge that we have

- So what's the difference between knowledge and wisdom?
- Well for example
  - Knowledge is knowing that a tomato is a fruit wisdom is knowing not
     to include it in a fruit salad
  - Knowledge is knowing that a street is a one-way street wisdom is
     knowing to look both ways before crossing just in case a car has gone
     down the one-way street the wrong way!
- So, <u>wisdom</u> is applying the knowledge and experience you have to situations in life

- Are men wiser than women or are women wiser than men?
- It would be very wise of me to not go any further with that question
- Who is the wisest human being that ever lived?
- Well, it depends in what field we're looking at
  - If we are thinking of America presidents who is the wisest George Washington, Abe Lincoln, JFK, Roosevelt, Clinton, Obama, Trump, Biden?
  - If we're think of Aussie PMs who is the wisest Robert Menzies?
     Gough Whitlam? Bob Hawke? Paul Keating? John Howard? Sco-Mo?
  - o In philosophy is it Socrates or Plato or Aristotle?
  - o In physics is Albert Einstein the wisest?
  - o In Maths and Physics is Isaac Newton the wisest?
  - In Sunday Jaffa and Scripture teaching we'd probably say King Solomon

## Context

- Picking up our story of King Solomon back in chapter 2 of 1 Kings
- In 1 Kings 2:46 we read that:

[PowerPoint 2-1 Kings 2:46]

The kingdom was now established in Solomon's hands.

• Then in our last look at Solomon's story [a couple of weeks ago] - we saw in 1 Kings 3:5 that once Solomon's kingdom was established - God appeared to

Solomon in a dream and said "Ask for whatever you want me to give you"

### [PowerPoint 3-2 Kings 3:9]

- And Solomon in verse 9 of chapter 3 asked God for "a discerning heart
  [literally a God-listening heart] so that he could govern God's people
  and so that he could distinguish between right and wrong; because
  who is able to govern this great people of God's without wisdom from
  God?"
- God was very pleased with Solomon's request.
- So God not only gave Solomon a wise and discerning heart (1 Kings 3:12) but He also gave Solomon what he didn't ask for both wealth and honour so that there will be no king like Solomon (1 Kings 3:13)
- As we hit today's passage from 1 Kings 3:16-28
- We see what a discerning heart (a God-listening heart) looks like

# Wise King Solomon (1 Kings 3:16-28)

We pick up the story in verse 16 - 2 prostitutes came before King Solomon
 [PowerPoint 4-2 women]



- The 1<sup>st</sup> woman asked Solomon to judge their case
- The 1<sup>st</sup> woman explained that she had a baby and 3 days later the 2<sup>nd</sup> woman had a baby also. They were the only people living in the house. Therefore, there were no witnesses.
- The 2<sup>nd</sup> woman's baby died because she lay on him during the night; so, she
  got up and took the 1<sup>st</sup> woman's baby from her whist she was asleep and
  swapped the live baby with the dead baby.
- When the 1<sup>st</sup> woman woke up to nurse her baby her baby boy was dead but when she looked closely, she realized that it wasn't her baby
- The 2<sup>nd</sup> woman denied this version of events and said the living baby was hers.
- King Solomon had to decide who was telling the truth.
- The author of 1 Kings wants us to believe the  $1^{st}$  woman whose baby is alive and has been swapped by the  $2^{nd}$  woman.

- Solomon summarizes the dilemma in v23 it's a question of 'the 1<sup>st</sup> woman says A' and 'the 2<sup>nd</sup> woman said B' in other words it's one person's word against another and there were no witnesses.
- We may have faced that same dilemma as a parent when 2 of our children
   both claim to be telling the truth it's difficult to tell who is fair dinkum!

## [PowerPoint 5-Baby]



- So, Solomon decided to take a sword and shock horror, cut the living baby
   in half and give each woman half a baby!
- Don't try this at home folks!
- Solomon's reasoning is that the threat of death to the baby would reveal the real mother's feelings with an urgent appeal to save the child's life.
- The 1<sup>st</sup> woman being the mother of the living baby; and out of love for her son (v26) pleads with King Solomon not to kill the child but give the child to the 2<sup>nd</sup> woman. The 1<sup>st</sup> woman would rather have the child live without her than for the child to die.

- Whereas the 2<sup>nd</sup> woman who is not the real mother of the living baby is totally okay with the King cutting the living baby in two? How callous!
   How bizarre?
- From the 2 women's responses, Solomon was able to determine that the love of the real mother meant she would not want any harm to come to her child and was willing to give up (sacrifice) her child to the other woman. So, Solomon rules that the 1<sup>st</sup> woman is the mother of the living baby (v27).

#### [PowerPoint 6-2 Kings 3:28]

- When the people of Israel heard the King's verdict, look at v28 they held
   Solomon in awe because they saw he had wisdom from God to
   administer justice.
- God had answered Solomon's prayer from 1 Kings 3:9 "So give your servant
  a discerning heart to govern your people and to distinguish between right and
  wrong. For who is able to govern this great people of yours?"

• Let me take a little diversion just for a minute and talk about the Greek Philosopher - Socrates [470BC-399BC]

- After his service in the army, Socrates devoted himself to his favourite
   pastime the pursuit of truth and the meaning of life
- His reputation as a philosopher, literally "a lover of wisdom" soon spread all over Athens and beyond. When Socrates was told that the Oracle of Delphi [a priestess called Pythia] had said to one of Socrates friends that Socrates was the wisest man in Athens, Socrates didn't respond by boasting or celebrating but instead he tried to prove the Oracle was wrong
- Socrates decided to find out if anyone knew what was truly worthwhile
  knowing in life, because anyone who knew that would surely be wiser than
  him. He set about questioning everyone he could find; but no one could give
  him a satisfactory answer. Instead, everyone he talked to pretended to
  know something they clearly didn't know.
- Finally, Socrates realized that the Oracle might be right after all.
   Perhaps he, Socrates, was the wisest man in Athens because he alone was prepared to admit his ignorance rather than pretend to know something he did not!
- Those other philosophers believed their own hype that they were the
   wiser than they really were
- Back to Solomon then what about his wisdom?
- Solomon began his reign very well in 1 Kings 3 and the wisdom he received from God in dealing with the two prostitutes was remarkable indeed.

- But it didn't occur to Solomon that he must maintain his faithful and obedient relationship with God or risk becoming unwise -even foolish
- By that I mean by the time we get to 1 Kings chapter 11 we see Solomon's wisdom is not maintained. And we read in 1 Kings 11:4 that Solomon intermarried with many foreign wives who turned his heart after other gods, and his heart was not devoted to the Lord God (1 Kings 11:4)
- So, the point for us is Solomon began well he certainly made the most amazingly wise decision with the 2 prostitutes - but then we Fast forward to 1 Kings 11:1-5
- It's an epic fail.
- All he has been blessed with has gone to his head and he's forgotten his first love - he's forgotten God
- So, let's not be like Solomon
- As wise as Solomon is he is a type and shadow of a greater one to come after him- who has the ultimate discerning heart [God-listening heart].
- That's **Jesus** of course!
- In **Jesus we have the ultimate wise King** <u>someone greater than Solomon</u> (Matthew 12:42)

# Wiser King Jesus (Colossians 2:1-5)

- Which brings us to our NT passage from Colossians 2:1-5
- [Please turn there now]
- And it brings us to wise King Jesus

### [PowerPoint 8-Colossians 2]

- <u>In this passage</u> Paul prays for the Colossians to have the full riches of complete understanding, in order to know the mystery of God (v2)
- What's the mystery of God?
- The mystery of God is Jesus see v3
- And in Jesus are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge
- In other words Jesus is the ultimate source of God's wisdom
- If we tap into Jesus' wisdom it's like opening a treasure chest of infinite wisdom
- Paul wants the Colossians to tap into Jesus' wisdom so that in v4 they are not deceived by fancy talk and fine-sounding arguments
- And <u>that's what we must do too</u> tap into Jesus' wisdom <u>so that we are</u>
   <u>not fooled by the world's wisdom</u> <u>especially in an age of misinformation and conspiracy theories!</u>
- Let's consider some examples of Jesus' wisdom

## Examples of Jesus' wisdom

- At age 12 Jesus and his family went to Jerusalem for Passover Jesus was accidently left behind at the temple they found him sitting among the teachers listening to them and asking them questions. Everyone who heard Him was amazed at his understanding and his answers (Luke 2:41-52)
- 2. In John 4 when Jesus spoke with the Samaritan woman at the well He treated her with compassion and kindness and with incredible insight -

- and He knew all about her previous marriages and her current lifestyle.

  And He told her she needed spiritual water that gave eternal life!
- 3. And in Matthew 13:53-55 When Jesus taught in the synagogue in his hometown those who heard Him were amazed and said "Where did this man get this wisdom and miraculous powers?"
- Let's also consider some examples of how Jesus administers justice because in the case of Solomon Solomon used his wisdom to administer justice

# Examples of Jesus' justice

- Jesus treated the afflicted the outcasts-the lepers-the lame-the tax collectors - the vulnerable of society - with amazing compassion and gentleness
- 2. At the same time, he treated the arrogant, the puffed up, the know it all's -the ones who thought they'd arrived by challenging their views answering their questions with his own questions and challenging them to look at their own hearts before pointing the finger at others like the case of the woman caught in adultery and her accusers wanting to stone her Jesus remined them "let him without sin cast the first stone" (John 8)
- So, what can we take home with us this morning then as we look at the wisdom shown by Solomon and the wisdom of our Lord Jesus?

## Applications for us:

[PowerPoint 9-Applications]

- 1. #1 Solomon's judgement in this case of the 2 prostitutes is outrageous and shocking. Isn't it? Who would have thought of chopping a baby in two! In the same way, God's judgment on our sin is outrageous and shocking too. Who would have thought of allowing His perfect/sinless Only Son to take the punishment of our sins? The ways, the works and even the judgments of God can often at first seem strange, dangerous or even foolish to us. But time shows them to be perfect wisdom. As Isaiah 55:9 says "My ways are higher than your ways and my thoughts are higher than your thoughts, says the Lord". In His wisdom, God can bring good out of bad situations - like the case of the two prostitutes - and like in the case of Jesus being crucified. Just like the prostitutes brought their problem to Solomon - we can bring our cases of injustice to God - Ultimately, God knows the truth - ultimately, He is the source of all wisdom. You see, in God's wisdom He doesn't just act on what He sees and hears - He looks at the <u>hearts</u> of people.
- 2. #2 We see in these two women the result of The Fall when sin first came into the world through Adam and Eve and people and creation became broken. We see this in the women's profession as prostitutes which meant they were mistreated by men and considered outcasts of society; we see it in the way one woman swaps her dead baby for a living one; we see it in the lies the one woman tells to try to get the baby which is not hers; and we see it her willingness because of her own loss, to callously let the baby even die rather than the real mother keeping her baby! One lie leads to another and

- then to deceit and then to evil people will go to any lengths rather than be exposed. Even today, our lives are messy and God's wisdom is needed as we live out our lives.
- 3. #3 This case of Solomon is the ultimate example of wisdom from God.

  The wisdom of God is to be prized above all worldly wisdom. Therefore, we must keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ...may give us the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that we may know Him better as Paul prayed in Ephesians 1:17. [We must ask, seek and knock for wisdom] We must pray we have the same mindset as Jesus (Phil 2:5); so that we can make decisions for our nation, for our church, for our families and in our relationships. And boy don't we need wisdom when it comes to COVID19 and lockdowns and vaccines and border closures! And boy don't we need wisdom when it comes to Afghanistan! And when ask for wisdom we are not to doubt that God will give it to us (as James 1:6 tells us)
- 4. #4 In the action of the real mother, we see the love, kindness and mercy that God has built into His world, so that a mother loves her child unconditionally even to the point of self-sacrifice. But in far greater way we see the love and grace and mercy of God in sacrificing His Son so we can have forgiveness and eternal life. We too can model that sacrificial love in our lives can't we?
- 5. #5 Solomon judges between sinful women in this case. The wisdom and justice that Solomon applied in the case of the two prostitutes foreshadows the wisdom and justice that Jesus brings to our lives. It is a picture of

the judgment to come, where the only truly wise one, King Jesus, will judge all humankind. On that judgment day - Jesus will sit on His glorious throne (Matt 25:31) and He will separate the sheep [the believers] and the goats [the unbelievers] (Matt 25:32-33). No one can avoid that judgment - and it's imperative that we are His sheep and not one of the goats!
