1 Kings 7:1-14; 40b-51

Solomon Builds His Palace

7 It took Solomon thirteen years, however, to complete the construction of his palace. ² He built the Palace of the Forest of Lebanon a hundred cubits long, fifty wide and thirty high, with four rows of cedar columns supporting trimmed cedar beams. ³ It was roofed with cedar above the beams that rested on the columns—forty-five beams, fifteen to a row. ⁴ Its windows were placed high in sets of three, facing each other. ⁵ All the doorways had rectangular frames; they were in the front part in sets of three, facing each other.

⁶ He made a colonnade fifty cubits long and thirty wide. In front of it was a portico, and in front of that were pillars and an overhanging roof.

⁷He built the throne hall, the Hall of Justice, where he was to judge, and he covered it with cedar from floor to ceiling. ⁸ And the palace in which he was to live, set farther back, was similar in design. Solomon also made a palace like this hall for Pharaoh's daughter, whom he had married.

⁹ All these structures, from the outside to the great courtyard and from foundation to eaves, were made of blocks of high-grade stone cut to size and smoothed on their inner and outer faces. ¹⁰ The foundations were laid with large stones of good quality, some measuring ten cubits and some eight. ¹¹ Above were high-grade stones, cut to size, and cedar beams. ¹² The great courtyard was surrounded by a wall of three courses of dressed stone and one course of trimmed cedar beams, as was the inner courtyard of the temple of the LORD with its portico.

The Temple's Furnishings

¹³ King Solomon sent to Tyre and brought Huram, ¹⁴ whose mother was a widow from the tribe of Naphtali and whose father was from Tyre and a skilled craftsman in bronze. Huram was filled with wisdom, with understanding and with knowledge to do all kinds of bronze work. He came to King Solomon and did all the work assigned to him.

^{40b} So Huram finished all the work he had undertaken for King Solomon in the temple of the LORD:

⁴¹ the two pillars;

the two bowl-shaped capitals on top of the pillars;

the two sets of network decorating the two bowl-shaped capitals on top of the pillars;

- ⁴² the four hundred pomegranates for the two sets of network (two rows of pomegranates for each network decorating the bowl-shaped capitals on top of the pillars);
- ⁴³ the ten stands with their ten basins;
- 44 the Sea and the twelve bulls under it;
- ⁴⁵ the pots, shovels and sprinkling bowls.

All these objects that Huram made for King Solomon for the temple of the LORD were of burnished bronze. ⁴⁶ The king had them cast in clay moulds in the plain of the Jordan between Sukkoth and Zarethan. ⁴⁷ Solomon left all these things unweighed, because there were so many; the weight of the bronze was not determined.

⁴⁸ Solomon also made all the furnishings that were in the LORD's temple:

the golden altar;

the golden table on which was the bread of the Presence;

⁴⁹ the lampstands of pure gold (five on the right and five on the left, in front of the inner sanctuary);

the gold floral work and lamps and tongs;

- ⁵⁰ the pure gold basins, wick trimmers, sprinkling bowls, dishes and censers;
- and the gold sockets for the doors of the innermost room, the Most Holy Place, and also for the doors of the main hall of the temple.

⁵¹ When all the work King Solomon had done for the temple of the LORD was finished, he brought in the things his father David had dedicated—the silver and gold and the furnishings—and he placed them in the treasuries of the LORD's temple.

The Fellowship of the Believers

⁴² They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. ⁴³ Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. ⁴⁴ All the believers were together and had everything in common. ⁴⁵ They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. ⁴⁶ Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, ⁴⁷ praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. Sermon: Interior Decorating

We're continuing our series on the OT book of 1 Kings.

It would be great to have your **bible opened at 1 Kings 7** – starting at verse 1. You may have a sermon **outline** - if you'd like to **take notes**.

Let me **ask God** to grant us **understanding** this morning

Let's pray...

Context

- Last week we saw King Solomon build the temple for the Lord God of Israel
- <u>This week</u> we see King **Solomon build a palace** for himself and then the <u>writer of kings</u>
 <u>focuses</u> on the **interior of the temple**
- So, we pick up the story from 1 Kings chapter 7 from verse 1

Solomon's House (1 Kings 7:1-12)

- And we see in v1 that Solomon took thirteen years to build himself a palace
- If we look back to the last verse of chapter 6 we see it took Solomon <u>seven</u> years to build the Temple for the Lord
- The writer of Kings wants us to see that **Solomon took almost twice as long** to build his palace compared to the Temple of the Lord

[PowerPoint 1-Palace]



 We also see from the dimensions of the palace in v2 that the palace is twice as long and twice as wide as the Temple of the Lord

- Solomon's <u>palace also included</u> a <u>colonnade</u>, a <u>portico</u>, a <u>Hall of Justice</u> and a <u>great</u>
 courtyard (vv6, 7, & 9)
- As well as that Solomon built a palace for his wife Pharoah's daughter too (v8)
- Application
- The writer wants us to question Solomon's priority and focus here.
- Solomon has spent twice as long on his own buildings and his own buildings are bigger than God's Temple!
- For us we have to ask ourselves where is our focus and our heart is God first in our
 lives or not quite first?
- I mentioned at Bible Study on Wednesday night—I'm personally convicted in this area —
 I regularly get up at 2-3 in the morning to watch a soccer game live from the UK but
 would I get up at 2-3 in the morning to read my Bible or to pray?
- Maybe for you it's <u>Wimbledon</u> or <u>Formula 1</u> or <u>the Olympics</u>?
- Or maybe you have a hobby or interest that you devote so much of your time to and
 it's beginning to replace God as your priority?
- As Jesus reminds us in the Sermon on the Mount "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also"

Inside God's House (1 Kings 7:13-51)


- The writer of 1 Kings devotes all of chapter 6 and all of chapter 7 to describing God's

 Temple– except for those first 12 verses of chapter 7 describing Solomon's Palace
- The writer wants <u>us</u> to see <u>what his priority</u> and <u>God's priority is</u>
- It's the **Temple**
- And we can learn so much from the interior of the Temple

• So, we're going to look at some of the key elements of the interior of the Temple – and see how they relate to the people of Israel – and how they relate to Jesus – and how they relate to us

Two Pillars (vv15-22)

• <u>Firstly</u>, there are **Two bronze pillars** at the front of the Temple – verses 15 to 22 [PowerPoint 2-Pillars]



- Solomon hired a guy called Huram skilled in bronze work to do all the bronze interior décor of the temple
- These bronze pillars were 18 cubits high (27ft or 8m) and circumference of 12 cubits
 (18ft or 5.5m) 3 ½ times the height of the average ceiling in a house.
- The pillars were decorated with bronze pomegranates <u>pomegranates</u> were a sign of prosperity and posterity <u>ensuring blessings for Israel for future generations</u> <u>pomegranates</u> were <u>also</u> used on the <u>hem of the priests' robes</u>.
- The names of these pillars are super important –
- One was called Jachin (Jakin) which means "God will establish"
- And the other was called **Boaz** which means "In God's strength"

- It was a <u>reminder to each reigning King</u> that the **King was ruling by God's appointment** <u>and</u> <u>in God's grace the King's kingdom and reign <u>would be established</u> and the <u>King must reign in God's strength</u> <u>not his own</u></u>
- For the people of Israel it was a reminder of the 2 pillars that the ancient Israelites
 followed during their Exodus journey from Egypt God provided them with a pillar of
 fire by night and a pillar of cloud by day, so that they could follow the way God had
 prepared for them
- These pillars were a <u>constant reminder</u> of **God's presence**
- Application
- For us today these pillars <u>remind us</u> of God's constant presence and that it is God who establishes <u>our paths</u> and <u>we can only do anything in God's strength</u> not our own
- As Jesus reminds us in John 15:5 "apart from Me you can do nothing"
- Also, the <u>use of pomegranates throughout the interior of the temple</u> <u>reminds us of</u>
 our blessings from God and the blessing of eternal life we have <u>through Jesus</u>

The Sea (vv23-26)

• Second – there is a huge bronze water basin called a Sea – in verses 23-26

[PowerPoint 3-Sea]




- The capacity of this basin was 3000 baths (18,000 gallons or 66,000L)
- The basin (sea) was 10 cubits (15ft or 5m) across and 5 cubits (7.5ft or 2.3m) high
- And supported by 12 bulls (12 representing 12 tribes) and symbolising animal sacrifice
- The purpose of this Basin (Sea) was for the priests to wash themselves ceremonially clean (2 Chronicles 4:6) before making sacrifices for the people. The priest had to be ceremonially clean before they could come before a Holy God to make sacrifices.
- Application
- The priests and the water for cleansing <u>should remind us</u> that Jesus <u>washes us clean of our sins</u> and <u>should also remind us of baptism as a symbol of washing away our sins through Jesus' death on the Cross</u>
- It should also remind us that we need be constantly confessing our sins to God so we can approach Him ceremonially clean
- The <u>water used</u> should also remind <u>us</u> that **Jesus gives us living water that becomes a spring of water that wells up into eternal life** (John 4:14) **living water** <u>that represents</u>

 <u>the Holy Spirit living inside believers</u> (John 7:38-39)

The Ten Stands and Basins (vv27-39)

• <u>Third</u> – the bronze worker, Huram, made **10 bronze stands** and **10 bronze basins** – that's in verses 27 to 39

[PowerPoint 4-Stands and Basins]



- These stands were on wheels so that they could be moved around the temple courtyard when sacrifices were made
- These **basins** were **used to wash the implements** <u>used in the burnt offering sacrifices</u> (2 Chronicles 4:6)
- Application
- Again, <u>for us</u> there is the <u>reminder</u> of the fact that Jesus is the once and for all sacrifice
 for sins <u>and we do not have to go through this constant sacrifice and washing process</u>—
 like the priests and the people in ancient Israel did. Praise God for that!

As well as all that bronze work – there were other furnishings in the Temple

The Golden Altar of Incense (v48)

• See v48 – the Golden Altar of incense

[PowerPoint 5-Altar]



- According to Exodus 30:7-8 the High Priest was to burn a fragrant incense in the
 morning and twilight as an offering to the Lord this was a pleasing aroma to God
- The incense was a reminder that the priest was interceding for the people
- Application for us it's a reminder that Jesus intercedes for us (Romans 8:34)
- Also, in the Bible incense is a symbol of <u>prayer</u>. As King David says in Psalm 141:2 May my prayer be set before you like incense
- Also, in Rev 5:8 describes bowls of incense representing the prayers of the saints (see also Rev 8:3)
- It is wonderful to know that God considers our prayers to be like the sweet smell of incense
- This should encourage us to pray knowing we can now enter God's holy presence by
 our faith in Jesus our eternal, perfect and faithful High Priest (Hebrews 10:19-23)

Table of the Bread of Presence (v48)

Also in the temple was the Table of the Bread of Presence – see v48

[PowerPoint 6-Bread]



- This table had special bread (12 loaves for 12 tribes) ALWAYS present on the table inside the tabernacle it represented God always being present with His people and showed that God is the source of Israel's life and nourishment their daily bread if you like! Just like the manna in the wilderness
- Application for us the bread reminds us that Jesus is the Bread of Life (John 6:35) –
 and that Jesus is the bread that came down from Heaven (John 6:38) (like the manna) –
 to give not just life on Earth but eternal life to all who believe in Him

Ten Lampstands (v49)

• Also in the temple were the ten lampstands (menorah) – see v49

[PowerPoint 7-Lampstands]



• The lampstand in the tabernacle was to be kept burning day and night (Exodus 27:20)

- The <u>light represented</u> the life and light that God gives to His people
- Application for us it reminds us that Jesus is the Light of the world (John 8:12; 9:5)
- And that Jesus calls His church those who believe in Him the lights of the world
 (Matt 5:14)- those who believe in Jesus are to be lights who call people out of the
 darkness of their sin and into Jesus' glorious light to receive forgiveness and eternal
 life (1 Peter 2:9). It is only possible for believers to be lights of the world if they remain
 connected to Jesus as their light source

(pause)

So, everything about the interior of the Temple points us to Jesus — Jesus IS the ultimate temple (that can be rebuilt in 3 days); Jesus IS the ultimate High Priest; Jesus is the Ultimate once and for all sacrifice for sins to be forgiven; Jesus IS the bread of life that gives eternal life; JESUS is the Living Water that gives eternal life - and Jesus IS the light of the world

<u>Jesus can only be all these things</u> - <u>because in God's grace and mercy</u> **He allowed His Son Jesus to come down from Heaven to Earth** – <u>on a rescue mission</u> - <u>to save people from sin</u> and death.

Our True and Proper Worship (Romans 12:1-2; Acts 2:42-47)

- Because God allowed Jesus to come on a rescue mission...
- We need to respond with our true and proper worship which is going to be different
 to the ancient Israelites we don't have to bring animal sacrifices and offerings to a
 temple anymore
- But we do have a response
- Which is where our NT passage comes in
- Please turn to ROMANS 12:1-2

[PowerPoint 8-Romans 12:1-2]

THEREFORE, I URGE YOU, BROTHERS AND SISTERS, IN VIEW OF GOD'S MERCY, TO OFFER YOUR BODIES AS A LIVING SACRIFICE, HOLY AND PLEASING TO GOD—THIS IS YOUR TRUE AND PROPER WORSHIP. DO NOT CONFORM TO THE PATTERN OF THIS WORLD, BUT BE TRANSFORMED BY THE RENEWING OF YOUR MIND. THEN YOU WILL BE ABLE TO TEST AND APPROVE WHAT GOD'S WILL IS—HIS GOOD, PLEASING AND PERFECT WILL. ROMANS 12:1-2

- The Apostle Paul says in v1 in view of God's mercy
- What's God's mercy
- That He sent Jesus to die a cruel death on a cross to take our punishment for our sins
 upon Himself so we could go free of any punishment for our sins and be given
 forgiveness
- <u>In view of that</u> mercy
- We are to offer our bodies as "living sacrifices" not dead animal sacrifices like in the
 Temple
- Instead of us "working to get mercy from God" we are "to serve God <u>BECAUSE</u> of His mercy"
- What does our living sacrifice look like?
- It's like spiritually speaking we bring our bodies to God's altar and say whatever can we do to thank you for such mercy, God?
- And <u>v2 tells us</u> <u>what</u> <u>we are to do</u>
- It says <u>don't think</u> the way the ungodly in the world think <u>don't rebel against God</u> the
 way non-believers do don't' follow their rebellious behaviour
- <u>Instead</u>, the <u>Apostle Paul says</u> <u>be transformed</u> <u>by renewing our minds</u>

- The Greek word <u>used for transformed is where we get metamorphosis from</u> <u>it means</u>
 taking a higher form <u>so Paul's saying we need to become more like Jesus</u> <u>as we</u>
 renew our minds <u>through the Holy Spirit</u> and <u>through following God's Word</u>
 (pause)
 - Now we're practical human beings so we need to understand what being transformed by the renewing of minds looks like practically
 - To understand that we can look at what the early Christian Church was like
 - Which is where our 2nd NT passage comes in
 - Please turn to Acts 2:42-47

[PowerPoint 9-Acts 2:42-47]

Acts 2:42-47

⁴² They devoted themselves to theapostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. ⁴³ Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. ⁴⁴ All the believers were togetherand had everything in common. ⁴⁵ They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need ⁴⁶ Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, ⁴⁷ praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. *And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.*

- Practically speaking our true and proper worship looks like:
 - See v42
 - o It looks like being devoted to the teaching in the Bible (not the world's teaching)
 - It looks like fellowship with fellow Christians (oh how we are missing that!)
 - It looks like sharing a meal together and sharing in the Lord's Supper
 together to remember Jesus' body and blood shed for us and never forgetting
 it!
 - And it looks like being devoted to prayer Adoration Confession Thanks and Supplication

- See v44 and v45
- It <u>also looks like</u> being together and sharing everything with one another the attitude should be my home is your home my car is your car my food and clothes are your food and clothes after all we only have <u>anything because God</u> blessed us with it in the first place
- It looks like sharing the same love for Jesus the same love for God the Father –
 the same desire to worship God sharing the same struggles together sharing
 in the same blessings and sharing in the same joy of telling others about Jesus!
- And the result of this true and proper worship is given in v47
- The Lord added to the number of people saved in His Church!

Conclusion


<u>To finish up then</u> – <u>the writer of Kings wants us</u> **to realize that the Lord and the worship of Him** is the number one priority for God's people

The Early Church also recognized that the Lord and the worship of Him was their number one priority

And so, we are called to make the Lord our number one priority

So let me <u>finish</u> with the **words of the Apostle Paul** from **Galatians 2:20**:
