Psalm 103:1-6

Matthew 8:28-9:8

Jesus Restores Two Demon-Possessed Men

²⁸ When he arrived at the other side in the region of the Gadarenes, two demonpossessed men coming from the tombs met him. They were so violent that no one could pass that way. ²⁹ "What do you want with us, Son of God?" they shouted. "Have you come here to torture us before the appointed time?"

³⁰ Some distance from them a large herd of pigs was feeding. ³¹ The demons begged Jesus, "If you drive us out, send us into the herd of pigs."

³² He said to them, "Go!" So, they came out and went into the pigs, and the whole herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and died in the water. ³³ Those tending the pigs ran off, went into the town and reported all this, including what had happened to the demon-possessed men. ³⁴ Then the whole town went out to meet Jesus. And when they saw him, they pleaded with him to leave their region.

Jesus Forgives and Heals a Paralysed Man

9 Jesus stepped into a boat, crossed over and came to his own town. ² Some men brought to him a paralysed man, lying on a mat. When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the man, "Take heart, son; your sins are forgiven."

³ At this, some of the teachers of the law said to themselves, "This fellow is blaspheming!"

⁴ Knowing their thoughts, Jesus said, "Why do you entertain evil thoughts in your hearts? ⁵ Which is easier: to say, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Get up and walk'? ⁶ But I want you to know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins." So, he said to the paralyzed man, "Get up, take your mat and go home." ⁷ Then the man got up and went home. ⁸ When the crowd saw this, they were filled with awe; and they praised God, who had given such authority to man.

Sermon: Peace for the Disturbed

Today – we're starting a series on Matthew's Gospel – and we're picking up where we left off last year.

So, please have your **Bibles opened** up at **Matthew 8** – starting at **verse 28**. Let me pray for God's guidance and understanding Let's pray...

Intro

A **question** <u>first up</u> – this morning –

What things disturb your peace?


- What about conflict or arguments in our relationships that can disturb our peace – can't it?
- What about someone's poor or angry behaviour that can disturb our peace too
 can't it?
- What about worrying about something we have to face in the future?
- What about **being sick** <u>or</u> having a **disability** <u>or</u> **having to isolate** because of **COVID** <u>that</u> can disturb our peace too can't it?
- What about uncertainty or insecurity that's not very peaceful is it?
- What about the **fear of getting old** and perhaps the **fear of dying** not much peace there either?
- Or what about ruminating on things that happened to us in the past?
- And then of course there's our conscience? Our conscience is: our moral sense of right and wrong which guides our behaviour. What if our conscience is troubled by our wrong decisions and choices? Then our peace is disturbed isn't it?

 (pause)

- In our **NT passage** this morning we have **two stories** <u>where</u> **peace has been disturbed** <u>and</u> **Jesus restores peace**
- In the <u>first story</u> **Peace in the Community is disturbed** <u>and</u> **restored** (Matthew 8:28-34)
- And in the <u>second story</u> Peace of the conscience is disturbed <u>and</u> restored
 (Matthew 9:1-8)

Peace for the Community (Matthew 8:28-34)

[PowerPoint 1-Community]



- <u>In the first story</u> in Matthew 8:28-34 [Please turn there] we see the **peace of a** community disturbed
- We pick up the story in verse 28 Jesus is in the region of Gadarenes on the east side of the Lake Galilee (He's just calmed the storm on the lake earlier in this chapter)
- And Jesus comes across two men possessed by demons
- These men are controlled by Satan and his evil spirits
- Here we see what Satan can do to people
- Satan can rob people of their sanity and self-control, fill them with fear, rob them of the joy of family and friends and even condemn them to an eternity of torment and judgment away from God forever if left unchecked

- We read in v28 that the demon-possessed men were coming from the tombs
- Why the tombs?
 - Well Demon's love death their purpose is to destroy
 - Tombs are a place the demon-possessed men can go knowing people won't follow them – <u>because</u> graveyards and dead people are considered unclean and offensive for the Jews.
 - By the men hanging around the tombs it would encourage superstition in the people of the town - fearing that the men were possessed by the spirits of the dead - in the tombs.
 - o All this made the two men very frightening to the community
- So, not only was the peace of the two men disturbed by their demon-possession
 but the peace of the whole community is disturbed The two men were very violent
 which made it difficult for anyone to pass the area they occupied.
- From the same story in Mark's Gospel we discover that...
- The community had tried to bind one of the men with chains, without any success. He just tore the chains apart and broke the irons on his feet. No one was strong enough to subdue him.
- Here we have a community in uproar peace completely disrupted
- That's what the influence of Satan and his demons can do if unchecked
- There's no peace for the wicked as Isaiah 57:21 says!
- But <u>notice</u> <u>what</u> <u>happens</u> when Jesus turns up
- See v29 The demons possessing the men know that Jesus is the Son of God; and they knew what lay ahead for them, and that ultimately, they would be cast out into everlasting torment (Matt 25:41, 46); they knew their time was limited and so

they wanted to be left alone to do as much damage as they could before the "appointed time" of judgment

- It's <u>ironic</u> that the demons know who Jesus is <u>whereas</u> <u>His disciples back in v27</u>
 <u>even tough</u> <u>when Jesus calms the storm</u> ask themselves "What kind of man is this?"
 they are unsure of who Jesus is?
- Meanwhile there are a herd of pigs at a distance (v30)
 - We need to understand that pigs were unclean to Jews
 - But the story is happening in a Gentile (non-Jew) area
 - However, <u>if there were any Jews living in this town</u> the <u>pigs should not have</u>
 been there
- In **V31** the **demons beg** for **Jesus** to <u>drive them out of the men and into the pigs</u>

 <u>nearby</u> **so that they can at least continue their evil work**
- The demons knew that Jesus as the Son of God had power of them as James 2:19 says: You believe in one God. Good! Even demons believe that and shudder!
- Jesus has no qualms in answering their request v32 –
- Animal lovers might get upset that the demons went into the pigs!
- But <u>remember</u> Jesus <u>is</u> God and as such He has <u>ownership</u> over <u>all</u> creatures.
 And <u>humans</u> <u>who are made in God's image</u> are God's <u>most importance</u> creatures
- So the fact that the demons destroyed a herd of pigs is nothing compared to saving two men from the grips of Satan (as Jesus says in Matt 12:12 says How much more valuable is a person than a sheep [or a pig for that matter]!)
- Jesus came to overcome evil and that's what He does here
- And <u>notice</u> <u>how</u> Jesus casts out the demons <u>with just one word</u> <u>Go</u>!
- So what did Jesus do for the men and for the community?

- For the men: Jesus restored peace to them, by removing the demons from their bodies! And by allowing the demons to enter the herd of pigs this was physical evidence to the men and all watching that the demons had been removed. Seeing is believing!
- For the community: **Jesus restored peace to the town**; the community no longer had to fear what these demon-possessed men would do.
- But <u>look how</u> the community responded?
- Those tending the pigs ran off and reported what had happened to their pigs and what had happened to the demon-possessed men. The whole community went out to meet Jesus and sadly and surprisingly, rather than being grateful for what Jesus had done they pleaded with Jesus to leave their region.
- <u>Isn't that typical of how many people today respond to Jesus</u>— they don't want

 Jesus in their lives and they completely miss how He has brought peace between

 God and humans <u>through His death on the cross to forgive sin</u> <u>and they'd rather live</u>

 their lives without Jesus they'd rather live without peace in their lives!

Peace for the Conscience (Matthew 9:9-8)

- In the <u>second story</u> **Matthew 9:1-8** we <u>see how</u> **Jesus restores peace to a** disturbed conscience
- Picking up the story from v1 Jesus has **crossed over to the other side of the Sea of Galilee** to the western side and He comes to his home town of **Capernaum** (Matt 4:13)

[PowerPoint 2-Paralysed Man]



- The man in the story is paralysed (literally the man has palsy). He is unable to walk and he is lying on a mat.
- His friends are determined to take their paralysed friend to Jesus. In the same story in Mark's Gospel we discover that the paralysed man's friends could not get near Jesus so they dug and opening in the roof and lowered their paralysed friend down to Jesus.
- His friends showed great faith!
- Jesus is so impressed with their faith in v2
- But notice Jesus addressed the most important sickness that we all need
 healing from. That's our sickness of sin. Our conscience is disturbed by our sin and has
 no peace until our sin is dealt with
- Jesus recognized the man had a greater problem than being paralysed
- We don't know whether the man's conscience was troubling him wondering if
 he was paralysed because of any sin in his life
- <u>We don't know if</u> the <u>man's friends' consciences were troubled about the same</u>

 <u>thing</u> but <u>we should note though</u> that **in the Jewish culture of the time** <u>there was a</u>

 <u>universal belief that all sickness was the result of sin</u> <u>and</u> that <u>no sickness could ever</u>

 be cured until sin was forgiven

- Jesus knew what the paralysed man's greatest need was
- <u>As bad as it is to be paralysed</u>, it's <u>infinitely worse</u> to be bound and lost in our sins!
- <u>We can't be sure</u> that the **man was paralysed because of his sin**. <u>This may or may</u> not be the case
- But we <u>can say</u> <u>in general terms</u> **people are paralysed, disabled and sick** <u>because</u> - **we live in a broken and fallen world**
- One thing for certain is we all need to have our sin dealt with
- There are several reasons why Jesus dealt with the man's sin first:
 - To show that sin is the root from which all evil comes it disturbs peace!
 - To <u>show forgiveness</u> is <u>more important</u> than bodily healing
 - To <u>show</u> that the <u>most important</u> thing Jesus came to do was to <u>deal with</u>
 <u>sin</u> (Luke 19:10)
 - To show that when a person is forgiven they become a child/son of God
 - <u>To show that</u> **the response to an expression of faith** (like the faith expressed by the paralysed man and his friends) <u>the response to faith in Jesus</u> **is the forgiveness of sins**
 - And Jesus dealt with sin first so that He could begin a conversation with
 the teachers of the law and the Pharisees and teach them something!
 - <u>Unfortunately</u>, we see another poor response to Jesus see v3 the teachers of the law think Jesus is blaspheming <u>Blaspheming is:</u> to say God's name in vain or to speak irreverently about God.
 - By Jesus telling the man that his sins were forgiven Jesus was actually inferring that He is God, because God is the only one who can forgive sins; therefore, in the eyes of the teachers of the law, Jesus was speaking irreverently

- <u>about God and therefore blaspheming</u>. **What they didn't realize is that Jesus is God.**
- But <u>look at Jesus' response in verse 4</u> **Jesus <u>even</u> know what the teachers**of the law are <u>thinking!</u> [See Psalm 139:2 "you [God] perceive my thoughts from afar"] <u>Only God can do that!</u>
- Then Jesus bamboozles them with his question in verse 5 "Which is easier: to say, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Get up and walk'?" what does Jesus mean by that?
- Well Jesus' point here is it's obviously easier to say "your sins are forgiven" but not so easy to prove. Whereas people could see if the man was healed if he could get up and walk. Jesus is able to both heal the man and forgive his sins! And if Jesus proved the man could walk then they might believe Jesus can forgive sins too.
- Jesus action here seems to be an outworking of our OT reading from Psalm 103:3 which says [God is a God] who forgives all your sins and heals all your diseases
- That's precisely what Jesus does for the paralysed man here Jesus forgives his sins and then heals his paralysis
- Jesus restores peace to the man's conscience I'm sure the man wondered if he was paralysed because of his sin? But now the man's conscience is no longer disturbed and his body is no longer disturbed either
- <u>As we said earlier</u> **not all sickness is caused by sin. We live in a broken world since the Fall of Adam and Eve.** <u>Sickness and death are a result/consequence of that Fall.</u> There is **not a one-to-one relationship between sin and sickness.** <u>Sin A does not equal Sickness A; Sin B does not equal Sickness B.</u>

- However we should certainly be examining ourselves for any unrepented sin
- And notice also forgiveness of our sins does not necessarily mean bodily healing.

 Jesus could simply have forgiven the man's sins and left him paralysed; but Jesus showed compassion and mercy. Jesus' point to the teachers of the law, is that it's more important to be spiritually healed than physically healed.
- Just one more thing to note here
- If we think back to when God created everything in the beginning **He simply**spoke to create everything!
- In Matthew 8:26 Jesus simply spoke to stop the waves and storm!
- In Matthew 8:32 Jesus simply spoke "Go!" to the demons and they left!
- In Matthew 9:6 **Jesus** simply **spoke** to the paralysed man "Get up, take your mat and go home"
- This tell us Jesus is God and has God's power and can simply speak to creation and it obeys
- It also says Jesus is in the business of <u>restoration</u> and <u>recreation</u>! (Rev 21:5)
- As we come to believe in Him we are a new creation and born again because
 of Him (2 Cor 5:17 and John 3:3)

Applications

<u>Let me leave us with</u> - **3 take home applications this morning**:

1. We need to have faith in Jesus <u>like the paralysed man and his friends</u>. The friends' faith drove them to get the paralysed man to Jesus <u>because</u> they knew Jesus was the only one who could fix him. We need to show that same faith in bringing people we

know to Jesus - knowing Jesus is the <u>only one</u> who can fix their sickness of sin and give them forgiveness and eternal life.

- 2. How do we respond to Jesus' power? Do we respond like the community in Gadarenes who asked Him to leave and thought more of their pigs than they did of Jesus? Do we respond like the teachers of the law who were outraged by Jesus and doubted Jesus' credentials as God? Or do we respond like the crowd in Capernaum who were amazed at Jesus' miraculous healing and praised God!
- 3. We began by asking what things disturb our peace? The Apostle Paul tells us how to get peace in our lives it's in Philippians 4:6-7 which I will finish with

 Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

The Bottom line is – **Jesus brings peace to all who are disturbed!**

Let's pray...

Father God, thank you that in your grace and mercy, you sent Jesus – to bring peace between You and humankind – by allowing Him to die for the sin of the world. Thank you that by having a relationship with Jesus, we can get real inner peace – a peace that surpasses all understanding – a peace that leads to eternal life – where we can live with you forever. Help us to have faith like the friends of the paralysed man – a faith that believes and knows that Jesus is the only one who can fix the sickness of sin. In Jesus' Name, we pray, Amen
