The Messiah and His Bride

Psalm 45:1-17

For the director of music. To the tune of "Lilies." Of the Sons of Korah. A *maskil*. A wedding song.

- ¹ My heart is stirred by a noble theme as I recite my verses for the king; my tongue is the pen of a skilful writer.
- ² You are the most excellent of men and your lips have been anointed with grace, since God has blessed you forever.
- ³ Gird your sword on your side, you mighty one; clothe yourself with splendour and majesty.
- ⁴ In your majesty ride forth victoriously in the cause of truth, humility and justice; let your right hand achieve awesome deeds.
- ⁵ Let your sharp arrows pierce the hearts of the king's enemies; let the nations fall beneath your feet.
- ⁶ Your throne, O God, will last for ever and ever; a sceptre of justice will be the sceptre of your kingdom.
- ⁷You love righteousness and hate wickedness; therefore God, your God, has set you above your companions by anointing you with the oil of joy.
- ⁸ All your robes are fragrant with myrrh and aloes and cassia; from palaces adorned with ivory the music of the strings makes you glad.
- Daughters of kings are among your honoured women; at your right hand is the royal bride in gold of Ophir.
- ¹⁰ Listen, daughter, and pay careful attention: Forget your people and your father's house.
- ¹¹ Let the king be enthralled by your beauty; honour him, for he is your lord.

- ¹² The city of Tyre will come with a gift, people of wealth will seek your favour.
- ¹³ All glorious is the princess within her chamber; her gown is interwoven with gold.
- ¹⁴ In embroidered garments she is led to the king; her virgin companions follow her those brought to be with her.
- 15 Led in with joy and gladness, they enter the palace of the king.
- ¹⁶ Your sons will take the place of your fathers; you will make them princes throughout the land.
- ¹⁷ I will perpetuate your memory through all generations; therefore the nations will praise you for ever and ever.

God's Final Word: His Son

1 In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways, ² but in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, and through whom also he made the universe. ³ The Son is the radiance of God's glory and the exact representation of his being, sustaining all things by his powerful word. After he had provided purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty in heaven. ⁴ So he became as much superior to the angels as the name he has inherited is superior to theirs.

The Son Superior to Angels

⁵ For to which of the angels did God ever say,

"You are my Son; today I have become your Father"? Or again,

- "I will be his Father, and he will be my Son"?
- ⁶ And again, when God brings his firstborn into the world, he says,
- "Let all God's angels worship him."
- ⁷ In speaking of the angels he says,
- "He makes his angels spirits, and his servants flames of fire."
- ⁸ But about the Son he says,
- "Your throne, O God, will last for ever and ever; a sceptre of justice will be the sceptre of your kingdom.
- ⁹ You have loved righteousness and hated wickedness; therefore God, your God, has set you above your companions by anointing you with the oil of joy."

Sermon: The Messiah and His Bride

We're continuing our series on Psalms that talk about Jesus – the Messiah.

Please have your **Bibles opened** up at **Psalm 45** –we'll be looking at the Psalm in some detail and we'll reference our NT Bible reading from Hebrews chapter 1 also.

Intro/Context

- If you ever attend a wedding, you'll notice that music plays an important role
- There's <u>usually</u> a **special song** either for
 - 1. Walking down the aisle
 - 2. Or as the newly-weds leave the church
 - 3. Or a special song for the bridal waltz
- There are probably some songs you shouldn't have at your wedding
 - 1. Like Tragedy by the Bee Gees
 - 2. Like **DIVORCE** by Tammie Wynette
 - 3. Like You're so vain by Carly Simon
- In our Bible Passage from Psalm 45 this morning
- We have a Wedding Song

- If we look at the heading [superscription] of the Psalm [and we should never skip over the heading as it gives us some clues about the Psalm]
 - 1. The song is for the music leader or musical director
 - 2. It has a **special** tune called "Lilies"
 - 3. It's written by the sons of Korah from the reign of King David onwards these sons of Korah became great leaders in choral and orchestral music in

the **tabernacle** and then in the **Temple** when Solomon built it – **11 of the Psalms are credited to the Sons of Korah** [Psalm 42; 44-49; 84-85; and 87-88] - https://www.gotquestions.org/sons-of-Korah.html

- 4. The psalm is a *maskil* which means it's a song or poem of contemplation and that's what we're going to do this morning contemplate on this Psalm
- 5. And of course, it's a wedding song
- Who's wedding is it though?
- Well, v1 tells us the writer of the Psalm is writing verses for the King
- We're not sure which King and who the King is marrying
- Before we go any further though let me point out a general principle that the famous English Author CS Lewis observes about some of the Psalms He says "Some of the Psalms meant two things" he says "Psalm 45 is a good example" "Psalm 45 meant one thing before Jesus came to the Earth and something else after He came"
- From this, we have a general principle that when we look at an OT passage we need to understand what the original readers would get from the passage before we look at what it might mean to us today

- So, Psalm 45 –on the one-hand describes the King of Israel in verses 2 to 9 and then describes the King's bride, the Queen, in verses 10-15
- And <u>on the other hand</u> Psalm 45 **describes King Jesus** the King of Kings in verses 2 to 9 <u>and</u> then **describes King Jesus' bride** which is the **church** that is all Christians (like us)

- As Christians we could simply see Psalm 45 as meaning one thing
- The King in verses 2 to 9 is <u>always</u> God
- And the Queen (Bride) in verses 10 to 15 is always God's people
- God's people were the Jews in the OT and were the Christians in the NT
- The <u>reason</u> we <u>could take this view</u> is <u>because</u> all <u>throughout</u> the **OT marriage** is a
 picture of God as a husband <u>and</u> His people as His wife and <u>throughout</u> the NT
 marriage is a picture of Jesus as the bridegroom <u>and</u> His Church (believers) are
 His bride
- However, I think it's <u>worth reading the Psalm</u> as though we were the original
 readers and then we'll look at the Psalm to see what it means to us today
- First then let's look at how the King is described in verses 2 to 9
- And we'll see that no Earthly King could quite fit this description and ultimately
 the King on view is King Jesus
- Then we'll look at the Queen and see how that might relate to us as the Bride –
 the Church

The King – The Bridegroom – Jesus the Messiah (Psalm 45:2-9)

- As we look at the King's description yes it could rightly describe a great king –
 like King Solomon
- The King is described as
 - The most excellent of men (v2)
 - The King is girded with His sword as a mighty fighting warrior king (v3)

- The King is clothed with splendour and majesty (v3) as any royal king of Israel should be
- The King rides majestically in to town in victory (v4) as any king of Israel
 would do who wins a battle
- The King takes up the cause of ensuring the land is ruled in truth, humility
 and justice and achieves awesome deeds (v4)
- The King defeats Israel's enemies with sharp arrows and the surrounding nations fall beneath the King's feet (v5) – as happened for many of the Kings of Israel
- But we start to struggle with the descriptions of the King when we get to v6
 and v7
- The <u>King is referred to as</u>: *O God* in v6 [and <u>in one sense the King of Israel is like a god small "g"</u>] <u>but v6 also says</u> the *King's throne will last forever* <u>that's a problem</u> <u>we don't even have a King in Israel now</u> the <u>original</u> readers of the Psalm might have thought there would always be a king
- And still in v6 a sceptre of justice will be a hallmark of his Kingdom and again we start to struggle because the Kings of Israel were not always just sometimes they were unfair and cruel
- V7 causes us problems too The King is said to love righteousness and hate
 wickedness Well that was supposed to be the ideal for the King but the
 Kings of Israel didn't follow that perfectly
- And <u>although the end of v7</u> <u>rightly says</u> that **the King** is set above His
 companions and anointed as God's anointed one
- It's <u>hard not to think of God's ultimate anointed one</u> Jesus the Messiah that's what Messiah means God's anointed chosen one

- As we hit v8 we see the King is dressed in royal robes with wonderful fragrances and perfumes – and his palace is adorned with ivory and full of chamber music
- And v9 his whole palace is full of King's daughters [from other nations]
 who are maids in the King's court
- And <u>next to him on his right-hand</u> is his glorious beautiful Bride dripping in gold
- As we can see not too many surprises that a royal king would be described like
 this
- But as we've seen some of these descriptions don't quite fit any King of Israel
- If we were to read verses 2 to 9 as though the King was King Jesus we'd see
 something amazing
 - V2 Your lips have been anointed with grace ultimately, it's King Jesus who has been anointed with the job of administering God's grace (God's undeserved favour on us) Jesus administers grace to us through His actions [His death and resurrection] and through His Word [God's Word the Bible]
 - End of v2 God has blessed you forever again only Jesus can be referred
 to in the sense of forever because He's the forever King
 - Then v3 gird your sword King Jesus has a different type of sword His
 Word God's Word is sharper than any double-edged sword, penetrating
 to divide soul and spirit, joints and marrow Jesus' sword which is God's
 Word even judges people's thoughts and attitudes (Heb 4:12)
 - V4 In your majesty ride forth victoriously remember King Jesus rode
 into Jerusalem victoriously a week before His death knowing He was about

to have victory over sin and death – through His own death and resurrection

- V4 in the cause of truth, humility and justice, let your right hand achieve awesome deeds again ultimately King Jesus is the only one who is the source of absolute truth and He showed humility in leaving the glorious majesty of Heaven to become a human and humbled himself on a cross to achieve God's justice on sin and take our punishment for our sins and grant forgiveness of our sins
- And of course, Jesus' deeds were <u>truly</u> awesome <u>miracle upon miracle</u> –
 <u>even</u> raising people from the dead <u>and</u> controlling nature
- V5 let your sharp arrows pierce the hearts of the king's enemies King
 Jesus the Messiah's sharp arrows of His Word God's Word cut the
 enemies of God to the heart and over the centuries His Word has
 transformed and reformed people even Kings
- And where we struggled to see how any earthly king fits the bill in v6 and v7
 we don't have the same trouble seeing how v6 and v7 apply to King Jesus
 the Messiah
- Even the writer of our NT passage from Hebrews 1 says the same thing
- To summarise our NT reading
- The writer of Hebrews says in the past God spoke through His prophets –
 but in these last days (last days=from Jesus' death and resurrection until
 now) in these last days God speaks through His Son Jesus
- The writer of Hebrews says -Jesus is no ordinary guy
- The writer says <u>Jesus is</u> <u>superior</u> to the prophets and <u>superior</u> to angels
- He says No one ever called an angel God's Son
- Yet God calls Jesus His Son and the angels in Heaven even worship Jesus

- And then <u>amazingly the writer of Hebrews</u> in Hebrews 1:8-9 quotes
 directly from our Psalm Psalm 45 and the writer says that verses 6 and
 7 in Psalm 45 that we're having trouble attributing to any earthly King –
 the writer says verse 6 and 7 are <u>actually</u> about God's Son <u>Jesus</u> the
 Messiah –
- So, if we look at v6 of Psalm 45 again King Jesus is God and His throne will last forever and ever and His throne and His Kingdom will be ruled with a sceptre of Justice because God the Father sent Jesus to administer His justice on sin by dying for sin to be forgiven by rising from the dead to defeat death and give eternal life AND God the Father has appointed Jesus the Son as the judge when He returns one day to judge everyone
- And in v7 <u>only Jesus</u> can truly love righteousness and hate wickedness
 <u>because</u> Jesus is the <u>only one</u> who is <u>perfect</u> and <u>fully righteous</u> <u>because</u>
 He's both God and human and He is sinless
- And so, the end of v7 God has chosen King Jesus the Messiah and anointed Him as the Chosen One - to bring about His Kingdom which lasts forever
- As glorious as the King of Israel might be clothed in v8 Jesus is clothed in righteousness and full of God's glory
- As glorious as the King of Israel's palace is Jesus' home in Heaven is way
 more glorious
- And as glorious as it is that there are daughters of King's serving in the King of Israel's courts and as glorious as the palace is all prepared for the King's bride to marry the King King Jesus the Messiah has gone to prepare a place in Heaven for His bride and Heaven is way more glorious

The Queen – The Bride – The Church (Psalm 45:10-15)

- And so, the Psalm turns to the Queen the King's bride in verses 10 to 15 and
 the Bride is described
 - V10 The <u>writer of the Psalm tells the Bride</u> to **listen and pay careful** attention and to forget her people and her father's house
 - o That's consistent with God's definition of marriage given to Adam and Eve
 - Didn't God say to Adam a man leaves his father and mother and is united to his wife and they become one flesh (Gen 2:12) it's the same advice to the Bride here you need to leave your family now because your husband the King is the priority now
 - \circ The <u>Bride is told in v11</u> to enthral the king with her beauty and honour him as He is the lord, the King
 - And <u>like any wedding</u> wedding gifts pour in from the city of Tyre and rich guests shower the bride with presents
 - And so <u>now the bride is ready to proceed to marriage</u> v13 & 14 her
 wedding dress is dazzling interwoven and embroidered with gold
 - And she's led to the King for the ceremony
 - She glides down the aisle v15 <u>led in with joy and gladness to marry the</u>
 King
- As much as the description of the Bride fits the description of a bride worthy of marrying the King of Israel
- If we look at verses 10 to 15 knowing that <u>King Jesus</u> the Messiah is the
 Bridegroom and His Church (the people who believe in Jesus) is the Bride
- We can look at verses 10 to 15 in a different way

- Each one of us as part of the Church are Jesus' spiritual bride so in v10 –
 we must listen to Jesus and pay careful attention to Him He has the
 knowledge and wisdom of God and He has the rules for living a life that
 pleases God
- Still v10 we have to in some sense forget about our family and make
 King Jesus our spiritual husband our 1st priority
- When we commit to putting Jesus first in our lives We will be showered with gifts like the bride in verses 12 & 13 Gifts like forgiveness and eternal life gifts like the spiritual gifts we are given as Christians and gifts like the fruit of the Spirit
- If you think this all sounds like a bit of a stretch The Apostle Paul says the
 same thing
- In Ephesians chapter 5 the Apostle Paul picks up on the theme of marriage – and how a marriage between a man and woman is like the marriage of Jesus and His church
- Here's how Paul describes marriage in Ephesians 5:22-27
- ²² Wives, submit yourselves to your own husbands as you do to the Lord. ²³ For the husband is the head of the wife as Christ is the head of the church, his body, of which he is the Saviour. ²⁴ Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit to their husbands in everything.
- ²⁵ Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her ²⁶ to make her holy, cleansing her by the washing with water through the word, ²⁷ and to present her to himself as a radiant church, without stain or wrinkle or any other blemish, but holy and blameless.
- I pray we can see what Jesus does in His marriage to His church in His spiritual marriage to each one of us

- He loved us so much He gave Himself to death on a cross He died for His
 bride the Church the ultimate sacrificial love
- And <u>what did He achieve</u>? He made us holy he cleansed us and present <u>us</u> like a bride radiant <u>without</u> stain <u>without</u> wrinkle <u>without</u> blemish –<u>instead</u> we are holy and blameless
- What a bridegroom what a spiritual husband King Jesus the Messiah
 is

Our Response (Psalm 45:16-17)

- As always there must be a response from us to Jesus our spiritual husband
 - 1. 1st response like in any marriage there must be faithfulness. As Jesus' spiritual bride [believers in the church] we must be faithful to our spiritual husband, Jesus we need to talk to Him spend time with Him have a loving relationship with Him read His Word [that's how God speaks to us in these last days Heb 1:2] and submit to Him not chase after other things we fall in love with instead of Him
 - 2. 2nd response is at the end of the Psalm where the writer gives his wish for the King

He wishes – that the *Kings children (sons) will go throughout the land* – literally throughout the Earth (v16)

And the writer promises (v17) to *perpetuate the King's memory* – *throughout all generations*

For us that means – as God's children we go throughout the earth - sharing the Good News of our King – King Jesus – and perpetuating Jesus' memory.

And the aim of perpetuating the King Jesus' memory in v17b – is so that all nations will praise King Jesus for ever and ever!

Father God, we thank you for your Son, Jesus, the Messiah, the Bridegroom – who shows His love for His Bride, the Church, by sacrificially laying down His life for us.
