Psalm 145

A psalm of praise. Of David.

- ¹ I will exalt you, my God the King; I will praise your name for ever and ever.
- ² Every day I will praise you and extol your name for ever and ever.
- ³ Great is the LORD and most worthy of praise; his greatness no one can fathom.
- ⁴One generation commends your works to another; they tell of your mighty acts.
- ⁵ They speak of the glorious splendour of your majesty—and I will meditate on your wonderful works.
- ⁶ They tell of the power of your awesome works—and I will proclaim your great deeds.
- ⁷ They celebrate your abundant goodness and joyfully sing of your righteousness.
- ⁸ The LORD is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and rich in love.
- ⁹ The LORD is good to all; he has compassion on all he has made.
- ¹⁰ All your works praise you, LORD; your faithful people extol you.
- 11 They tell of the glory of your kingdom and speak of your might,
- ¹² so that all people may know of your mighty acts and the glorious splendour of your kingdom.
- ¹³ Your kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and your dominion endures through all generations.
- The LORD is trustworthy in all he promises and faithful in all he does.

- 14 The LORD upholds all who fall and lifts up all who are bowed down.
- ¹⁵ The eyes of all look to you, and you give them their food at the proper time.
- ¹⁶ You open your hand and satisfy the desires of every living thing.
- ¹⁷ The LORD is righteous in all his ways and faithful in all he does.
- ¹⁸ The LORD is near to all who call on him, to all who call on him in truth.
- ¹⁹ He fulfills the desires of those who fear him; he hears their cry and saves them.


Let me ask *God* for His *help* and *guidance* first – let's *pray*...

Intro

This is the first of a **5-part series** on The **Church**

The Church in Greek it is Ekklesia

[Slide 1-Ekklesia definition]



Ekklesia - the church - is <u>not</u> a **building** – Ekklesia the **church is**:

A gathering of people "called out" from their homes into some public place – or assembly.

The **Ekklesia** – the **Church** is:

- An <u>assembly</u> of Christians gathered together to worship God and <u>who</u> believe in our Lord Jesus = for the forgiveness of sins and for eternal life
- The <u>Ekklesia</u> the <u>Church</u> is the <u>whole body of Christians</u> <u>scattered</u> <u>throughout the world</u> – aka - the <u>universal church</u>


[Slide 2-Called out ones]



In essence the **Ekklesia** – the **church** – are the "**called out ones**" – 'called out' to worship God and follow Jesus.

In our **5-part series** – <u>over the next 5 Sundays</u> - we're going to see <u>what</u> the Church <u>IS</u> and what the Church <u>DOES</u>

[Slide 2a-5 e's]



This 5-part series will show how the Church - exalts, edifies, encourages, equips and evangelizes.

So, in Part 1 – The Church – EXALTS

From our 1st reading from Psalm 145 – King David says I will exalt my God the King

[Slide 3-exalt v1]



And the word **exalt** - in **Hebrew** means – *lift up high or raise up as high as one can*.

In other words, David wants to **put God on the <u>highest pedestal</u>** – and <u>speak</u> <u>as</u> **highly as he can about God**

So, <u>let's look briefly at the Psalm</u> and **see** – <u>WHEN</u> **David <u>exalts</u> God** – <u>WHY</u> **David <u>exalts</u> God** – <u>and</u> - <u>HOW</u> **David** exalts God

David Exalts God (Psalm 145:1-21)

When?

WHEN does David exalt God?

[Slide 4-vv1-2]



Look at V1 – David praises God's name forever and ever

And V2 – <u>Every day</u> David will praise God – and <u>extol God's name</u> – that is praise God's name <u>enthusiastically</u> - <u>forever</u> and <u>ever</u>

And then in V21 – the <u>last</u> verse – **David concludes** that **his mouth will speak in**praise of the Lord – and he urges every creature on Earth to praise the Lord's

holy name forever!

Why?

WHY does David exalt God – every day and forever?

[Slide 5-Why?]

There are 3 reasons why David wants to exalt God

[Slide 5a-greatness]

<u>The first reason</u> why <u>David exalts God is</u> <u>because of</u> - **God's greatness – that's** verses 3 to 7

Look at V3 –David says - *The Lord is worthy of praise – because no one can fathom His greatness*

And V4 – God has done one mighty work after another – and v5 – God has done wonderful works – and v6 – God has done awesome works – and great deeds – and v7 - God has shown abundant goodness and is always righteous.

What we have here is a <u>summary</u> of how great God is

If we just stop and think of how God created everything – the sun, the planets,
the stars, the moon and this Earth and all creatures and even humankind – <u>isn't</u>
that why we can sing "How great thou art" - to God?

If we stop and think that God loved us so much — He sent His Son — to bleed and die to take away our sin — isn't that why we can sing "How great thou art" - to God?

[Slide 5b-graciousness and kindness]

The second reason why David exalts God is –because of - God's graciousness and kindness – that's verses 8 to 16

See V8 – God is gracious and compassionate - slow to anger and rich in love

Even though humankind - sin and rebel against God – God showed his grace

and compassion – by sending His Son – to deal with sin and death – for us.

That's because – God does not treat us as our sin deserves – but instead - God is

gracious – slow to anger - and rich in love for us!

And V9 – the Lord God is good to all – In His graciousness and kindness - He

has compassion on all He has made – He provides food and shelter - to those

who accept Him and to those who reject Him – As Jesus Himself says – God

causes His sun to rise on the evil and the good – and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous (Matt 5:45)

God's graciousness and kindness is spoken about by His people – see V10

And His people speak of His kingdom (vv11-13) which He promises will last

forever – and His people know that He always keeps His promises and He is

faithful and trustworthy in all things (v13)

And God is *gracious and kind to all who fall and who bow down to Him* (v14) – and *supplies, all who look to Him, with their daily needs* (vv15-16) **God is gracious and kind** – that's why **David exalts God!**

[Slide 5c-righteousness and justice]

<u>The third reason why David exalts God is –because of - God's righteousness and justice – that's verses 17 to 20</u>

Look at v17 – *The Lord is righteous in all His ways* – *and faithful in all He does*.

God can <u>NEVER</u> do the <u>wrong</u> thing – He <u>must always</u> do the <u>right</u> thing.

He <u>cannot look upon sin</u> (Hab 1:13) – <u>but at the same time</u> He <u>wants to save</u>

people – from the punishment of their sins.

In the Lord God – His **justice** <u>lives alongside</u> His **righteousness**.

He <u>balances</u> <u>His desire for grace</u> <u>with</u> <u>His need to be just and deal with evil</u>.

And so <u>those who genuinely fear Him</u> – and <u>love Him</u> - <u>and in their belief call out</u>

<u>to Him</u> – **He saves** (v18-20) – <u>but those who reject Him</u> – the <u>wicked</u> – **He destroys.**

God is <u>righteous</u> and <u>just</u> – <u>that's why</u> David <u>exalts</u> God!

How?

[Slide 6-How?]

Next - <u>HOW</u> <u>does David say</u> **God is exalted**?

[Slide 6a-pass it on]

People pass on to each other – what God is like...

Look at V4 – One generation commends God's works to the next generation – and they tell of God's mighty acts

And V5 – They speak of the glorious splendour of God's majesty – and meditate on His wonderful works

And V6 – They tell of the power of God's awesome work – and proclaim His great deeds

[Slide 6b-celebrate]

And people **celebrate God's goodness by singing about it** and **praising Him** – and can't stop **talking about How great God is**!

Look at V7 – They celebrate God's abundant goodness and joyfully sing of His righteousness

And V10 – All God's works praise Him and His faithful people extol Him

And V11 – They tell of the glory of God's kingdom and speak of His might

[Slide 7-Application]

Application:

As we look at David's psalm this morning - how does it apply to us today?

<u>Given what God has done for us</u> – <u>can we join King David</u> – **and exalt and praise God's name and God's greatness** – <u>EVERY DAY</u> – <u>and FOREVER</u> – <u>and</u>

shouldn't we do that – **to thank Him**?

<u>Isn't that the main reason to come to church</u> – **to thank and praise God** – **to**<u>exalt Him</u> – <u>for what He has done for us</u> – in <u>creating us</u> – in <u>sending Jesus</u> – in

<u>supplying our daily needs</u> – in <u>being both righteous and just</u> – and <u>offering</u>

salvation to all who believe in Him?

Can we be like David and the people of Israel – and pass on what God has done – to the next generation? Shouldn't we be doing that?

<u>Can we celebrate God's goodness</u> – **sing about it** – **praise His name** – <u>and never stop talking about how great God is?</u>

(pause)

The Church Exalts (Acts 2:42-47)

<u>In the Old Testament</u> – **God's people** were the **Israelites** <u>and</u> **those who cared to join them** <u>in worshipping the one true God</u>.

<u>In the New Testament</u> – **Jesus established the <u>Ekklesia</u>** – the <u>Church</u> – to be **God's people** – and to be the <u>vehicle</u> to: *exalt, edify, encourage, equip and evangelize* people to become believers and followers of Jesus!

From our NT reading from Acts 2:42-47 – we're just going to focus on the parts
that exalt God – this morning
[Slide 8]

See V42 – they devoted themselves - *to the breaking of bread* and *to prayer* – and v47 – they devoted themselves – to *praising God*.

<u>These verses tell us how we the Ekklesia – the Church – exalt God</u>

The <u>early church</u> – <u>met together</u> – and **broke bread** – they <u>shared the Lord's Supper together</u> – <u>remembering Jesus' last meal with His disciples</u> – and <u>remembering</u> the **bread represented Jesus' body broken on the cross** – and <u>remembering</u> the **wine/juice represented Jesus' blood poured out on the cross**.

They never forgot Jesus' great sacrifice for the forgiveness of their sins!

And we as the church exalt God – when we share in the Lord's Supper here at

St. David's – we lift up God's Son high and exalt Him – as we remember how

Jesus was lifted up on the cross for us!

The early church also devoted themselves to prayer.

<u>Prayer</u> is **God's means for us to <u>communicate</u> with Him**.

We <u>can only have a meaningful and loving relationship</u> <u>with someone</u> - <u>if we</u> actually talk to them.

So, in our worship <u>each Sunday</u> – we have **4 types of prayers**

Adoration – where we praise God for how great He is [exalt]

Confession – where we say sorry to God for what we have done wrong.

Thanksgiving – where we thank God for all He has done for us

And **Supplication** – where we ask God for His help and pray for others

Prayer is part of exalting God – and recalling how He uses our prayers to fulfil His will and purposes.

The Early church also devoted themselves to praising God. David's Psalm – Psalm 145 – like many of the psalms – is a great example of praising God for who He is.

<u>Praising God can also be</u> in the form of <u>singing</u> – <u>all our hymns this morning are</u> full of praise for God – for what He has done for us!

And it's because of what God has done for us – for His daily provision and daily blessings – for His answered prayers – and especially His grace and mercy to us in sending Jesus – that we should WANT to come to church and worship Him and exalt Him – not HAVE to come to church but WANT to!

But I want to suggest this morning

That from David's Psalm and from our NT reading from Acts 2:42-47

That - <u>exalting God</u> – is <u>not just something we do</u> <u>once a week here on a</u>

Sunday

It should be something we do EVERY DAY and FOREVER as David said.

You see David refers to God as - MY God, the King

He is a <u>personal</u> God – and so there needs to be <u>personal</u> worship and <u>personal</u> <u>exalting</u> of God – <u>as well as corporate</u>. So perhaps a challenge or New Year's resolution - to leave ourselves with this morning is – how are we personally exalting God – do we thank Him daily – do we talk to Him daily [refer to the new Prayer News sheet emailed/printed and prayer points printed next to the sermon outline] – do we sing His praises daily – do we talk about how great He is daily?

(pause)

Let's pray...

Father God, we lift your name up high and thank and praise you this morning for all that you have done and continue to do for us.

We praise you for your greatness; that you are gracious and kind; and that you are righteous and just.

Thank you for sending Jesus to lay down His life for the forgiveness of sins.

Help us through the power of your Spirit and your Word to pass on how mighty you are to the next generation; and to praise you daily and forever.

In Jesus name, we pray. Amen!
