⁴² They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. ⁴³ Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. ⁴⁴ All the believers were together and had everything in common. ⁴⁵ They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. ⁴⁶ Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, ⁴⁷ praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.


Intro

This is the third part of 5-part series on The Church

The Church

In <u>Greek</u> it is ἐκκλησία

[Slide 1-Ekklesia definition]



Ekklesia the church is <u>not</u> a **building** – Ekklesia the **church is**:

A gathering of people "called out" from their homes into some public place – or assembly.

The Ekklesia – the Church is:

- An <u>assembly</u> of Christians gathered together to worship God and who believe in our Lord Jesus for the forgiveness of sins and for eternal life
- The Ekklesia the Church is the whole body of Christians scattered
 throughout the world aka the universal church

[Slide 2-Called out ones]



In essence the **Ekklesia** – the **church** – are the "called out ones" – called to worship God and follow Jesus.

[Slide 2a-5 e's]



<u>In this 5-part series we will see how</u> the Church - <u>exalts</u>, <u>edifies</u>, <u>encourages</u>, <u>equips</u> and <u>evangelizes</u>.

In Part 1 – we saw that - The Church – <u>EXALTS</u> God –
In other words, we as the Church – should be putting God on the <u>highest</u>
pedestal – and <u>speaking as highly as we can</u> about God

And we left ourselves - - - with the challenge or new year resolution

To personally exalt God - thanking Him daily - talking to Him daily - singing His praises daily - and talking about how great He is daily?

(pause)

In Part 2 – last week – we saw how - The Church –the Ekklesia - EDIFIES – the family of God – the Church Family

In New Testament Greek – edify – [οἰκοδομέω]

<u>Literally means</u> to **build a house**

And we said - just like building a house – needs a strong foundation – The house of Christian believers **needs a strong foundation** too

And we concluded last week that – that <u>this</u> strong foundation was <u>God's Word</u> – the **Bible** – and that here at **St. David's** the church has several different Bible study groups – <u>where we can be edified by God's Word</u>.

And <u>by being edified by God's Word</u> - we **can** then **perform the remaining 3 functions of the church** – to **encourage, equip** and **evangelize** people.

Which brings us to this week – and Part 3 – and we're looking at how the church encourages people

For the church to be able to encourage people – it might seem pretty obvious – but people have to be - together – and they have to have - fellowship.


In the <u>New Testament the Greek words used for together</u> – literally means – "people being on top of themselves" – it <u>suggests</u> a <u>very close relationship</u> – and togetherness!

Old Testament Example of Friendship - Jonathan & David (1 Samuel 18:1-4)

An example of this very close relationship and togetherness – can be seen in our Old Testament Reading – from 1 Samuel 18:1-4 [Please turn there now]

Here we have the friendship between Jonathan and David.

[Slide 3-Jonathan and David]



Jonathan was the son of the first King of Israel - King Saul

Jonathan was a lot like David. They were approximately the same age. They both were bold, both were men of great trust in God, and both were men of action. Most of all, both had a real relationship with God.

At the same time, **Jonathan** and **David** were <u>different</u>.

Jonathan was the <u>first-born</u> son of a king (1 Chronicles 9:39) and **David** was the <u>last-born</u> son of a farmer.

<u>Being first born</u> - Jonathan was **more than a prince**, he was the **crown prince**. By everyone's expectation **Jonathan** would be the next king of Israel.

The **context** is **– David** has <u>just</u> **defeated** the giant **Goliath** – <u>and</u> has **impressed King Saul**.

Jonathan witnessed how David defeated Goliath – and heard how David

attributed his success in defeating Goliath – down to God – God won the battle

for him.

So - <u>Jonathan knew David</u> had the **same heart for God** — as Jonathan himself had.

That's why v1 says – *Jonathan became <u>one in spirit</u> with David.* – "one spirit" here – literally means "knitted or sewn together"

<u>Their friendship</u> – had the **foundation** of their love for God – and **bridged** their **different family backgrounds** and their **different circumstances**.

Even when later – David was anointed to be the next King – rather than

Jonathan – and even when Jonathan's father Saul – tried to kill David several

times – and David had to go on the run – Jonathan and David's friendship – was

able to survive all of that – because they were one in the Lord

And as v3 says – Jonathan made a covenant with David because he loved him as himself.

Jonathan and David shared a <u>brotherly love</u> with each other – and <u>Jonathan</u> even shared his clothing and weapons with David – see v4.

[Slide 4-Church Family]



Jesus says:

Whoever does God's will is my brother and sister and mother.
(Mark 34:35)

Jesus says:

My Father's will is that everyone who looks to the Son and believes in him shall have eternal life. (John 6:40) <u>Application</u> – <u>Here in our church family</u> – **we are "knitted or sewn together" in our common bond of loving our Lord Jesus** – and so <u>we are</u> **one in Spirit too**. Here at St. David's – we major on this idea of our Church – **being a Church**

Family – that's not my idea – it's actually what Jesus Himself says

In Mark 3 – Jesus was informed that his mother and brothers were looking for Him (Mark 3:32)

Jesus asked a rhetorical question – *Who are my mother and my brothers?* (Mark 3:33)

Then Jesus answered His own question — and pointed to all the people listening to Him — and said - "Here are my mother and my brothers! ³⁵ Whoever does God's will is my brother and sister and mother." (Mark 3:34-35)

And what is God's will for people?

Jesus tells us in John 6:40 – "For my Father's will is that <u>everyone who looks to</u> <u>the Son and believes in him shall have eternal life</u>, and I will raise them up at the last day."

That common bond of believing in Jesus' death for the forgiveness of our sins and believing in Jesus' resurrection for eternal life – is the common bond – we share – and means we are FAMILY – and we can show that same love Jesus has shown us – we can show that same love - to each other in our church family.

Just like Jonathan and David – our love for each other – can transcend our backgrounds, our circumstances and our problems.

The Church - The Ekklesia - Encourages (Acts 2:42-47)

Which brings us to our NT reading from **Acts 2:42-47** [Please turn there now] It's the <u>same reading</u> we have had <u>for the last 3 weeks</u>.

[Slide 5-Acts 2:42-47]

And we are <u>only looking at the parts of this passage</u> <u>which talk about how</u> **the**Church encourages

See v42 – They devoted themselves to fellowship

And v44 & 46 - ⁴⁴ All the believers were <u>together</u> ... ⁴⁶ ... They broke bread in their homes and <u>ate together</u> with glad and sincere hearts, ...

(pause)

The Greek Word for fellowship is koi-no-nia

[Slide 6-Koinonia]



Koi-no-nia - means a **shared community** – and involves **deep, close-knit participation** among people.

It's <u>far deeper than</u> our <u>English</u> <u>Word</u> – **fellowship**.

<u>no-nia</u> is <u>intimate holy unity</u> with each other – at a <u>spiritual</u> and <u>emotional</u>

<u>level – just like</u> <u>Jonathan and David were knitted together</u>.

Our passage from Acts 2 says the Church – the Ekklesia – were <u>together</u> in v44 – AND – they had <u>a meal together</u> and <u>ate together with glad and sincere hearts</u> – v46.

If we think about it – isn't that what families do?

The <u>most intimate and happy times in my own family</u> – are <u>when we get</u> together for a **BBQ** or a **meal** or a **picnic** – and **we have deep and loving** conversations!

How can we at St. David's be encouraged?

So, <u>if the early church</u> – the Ekklesia – **encouraged each other** <u>by enjoying koi-no-nia fellowship</u> together – <u>and</u> <u>Jesus says we're family</u>

<u>How can our **Church Family** here at **St. David's** <u>be encouraged</u>?</u>

There are **several ways** we can be **encouraged**:

[Slide-7- St. David's]

<u>1st</u> – <u>By making St. David's</u> <u>OUR</u> <u>church family</u> – by <u>committing to being part of</u> <u>this Church Family</u>. Here at St. David's, we run regular <u>Membership classes</u> – <u>where we talk about our common bond and love for Jesus</u> – <u>and talk about how</u> the Presbyterian Church is governed.

If you haven't already done so – how about committing to become a member of our church family – and making St. David's your permanent Church Family. There's a sign-up sheet in the foyer if you'd like to attend the next membership class.

<u>I visited Joan Golding in hospital the other day</u> – <u>she said attending Church</u> – <u>for</u> her - **is like coming home!** It's her spiritual home and family.

2nd – <u>We can be encouraged</u> as we **join together each Sunday for worship**. We certainly are encouraged by God's Word, by the prayers, by the hymns and the Page 9 of 12

testimonies we've heard. But worship is only the 1st part of our time together

– as I often say – part 2 of our time together – is morning tea in the Hall –

where we can be just like the early church – and have a meal together – and

have healthy loving sincere and caring conversations together. Get to know

each other better as a family. Sharing our concerns and trials with one another –

and spurring one another on!

[There's no better sound on Sunday – that sitting outside the Church Hall – listening to people chatting away and laughing]

<u>3rd</u> – <u>We can also be encouraged by our **communal lunches** we have – 3 times a year in –on the 1st Sunday of April, August and December – on the <u>same day</u> we also have the **Lord's Supper**. <u>Which in itself</u> is a **great encouragement** as it <u>reminds us</u> of <u>what</u> **our Lord Jesus has done for <u>us</u>!**</u>

4th – **Encouragement** does <u>not</u> have to be **confined** <u>to Sundays</u>

There are a **number of other activities** we do **on other days of the week** <u>which</u> can be an encouragement to us.

- Prayer and Prayer Chain [looked after by Christine Warrell)
- Growth Groups/Bible Studies that we mentioned last week sign-up sheets in the foyer.
- Phone calls
- Home visits
- Hospital visits
- Aged Care visits

- Men's fellowship 1st Friday of every month (Feb-Dec) see Ian Warrell
- P.W.A. 1st Friday of every month (Feb-Dec) various events calendar available – see notice board in the hall with all the events!
- COM 2nd Friday of every month (Feb-Dec) nomination forms in the foyer
- Working Bee 1st Tuesday of every month (Feb- Dec) see Zelka
- Craft and Card Group Every Wednesday (Feb-Dec) see Heather
- Friendship Group 4th Friday of every month (Feb-Dec) see Judy Roberts
- Saturday Movies 1st Saturday of every month see Malcolm
- St. David's Choir Thursday choir practice (Feb-Dec) talk to Chris Smillie
- Church events throughout the year see calendar in foyer
- And Pastoral Care [more about this next week]

All of these activities foster and nurture <u>friendships</u> and are a constant source of <u>encouragement</u> – and help us to feel we <u>belong</u> to a Church <u>Family</u> that has the common bond of Jesus.

Conclusion (Hebrews 10:24-25)

To finish up then ...

We can only feel like we belong

We can only feel like we are part of a church family

We can only feel encouraged

If we actually - turn up and participate - in what our church has to offer

So let me leave us with a reminder from the writer of Hebrews

[Slide 8-Hebrews 10:24-25]



From Hebrews 10:24-25

²⁴ And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, ²⁵ not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching. Let's pray...

Heavenly Father, thank you that because of our Lord Jesus, we are part of His Church and we are part of a Church Family.

Thank you that Jesus has established His Church as a means of encouraging one another – as we wait for Jesus to return.

Help us to be diligent and intentional in meeting together — in the many different ways — our church offers — so that we can spur one another on towards love and good deeds — so that we can show the love of Jesus to others.

Help us to continue to meet up and encourage each other – in the name of Jesus.
