#### Psalm 98

# A psalm.

- <sup>1</sup> Sing to the LORD a new song, for he has done marvelous things;
- his right hand and his holy arm have worked salvation for him.
- <sup>2</sup> The LORD has made his salvation known and revealed his righteousness to the nations.
- <sup>3</sup> He has remembered his love and his faithfulness to Israel;
- all the ends of the earth have seen the salvation of our God.
- Shout for joy to the LORD, all the earth, burst into jubilant song with music;
- 5 make music to the LORD with the harp, with the harp and the sound of singing,
- <sup>6</sup> with trumpets and the blast of the ram's horn—shout for joy before the LORD, the King.
- <sup>7</sup> Let the sea resound, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it.
- <sup>8</sup> Let the rivers clap their hands, let the mountains sing together for joy;
- <sup>9</sup> let them sing before the LORD, for he comes to judge the earth.
- He will judge the world in righteousness and the peoples with equity.

## Luke 2:1-12

#### The Birth of Jesus

**2** In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. <sup>2</sup> (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) <sup>3</sup> And everyone went to their own town to register.

<sup>4</sup> So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. <sup>5</sup> He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. <sup>6</sup> While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, <sup>7</sup> and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.

<sup>8</sup> And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. <sup>9</sup> An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. <sup>10</sup> But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. <sup>11</sup> Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. <sup>12</sup> This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger."

# **Sermon: Joy**

Please have your Bibles open at Psalm 98 – then we'll look at Luke chapter 2.

There's an **outline** – if you'd like to take some notes. Let me **pray** first...

### **Context**

In our build up to Christmas

### [Slide 1-Context]

<u>Two weeks ago</u>, we concluded that no matter what's going on in our lives and in this dark and gloomy world – we have the <u>certain hope</u> of the Messiah – <u>because</u> <u>God promised to send King Jesus the Son of God</u> – who saves us for Heaven

<u>Last week we asked ourselves</u> – how we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus on Christmas Day – and how we prepare for Jesus coming again at an hour we don't know when?

And <u>we concluded</u> that **we can <u>prepare</u> to celebrate Jesus' birth by sharing the love of Jesus with others** – <u>and</u> **we can <u>prepare</u> for Jesus coming again by making sure everyone we come across – knows that Jesus saves us for Heaven.** 

This week we are looking at the JOY of Christmas

So, before we go any further – we'd better define what **JOY** is:

[Slide 2 – Joy]

A feeling of great happiness (Oxford Dictionary)

When we look around our world and see the **turmoil**, **disasters**, **conflicts**, wickedness, cruelty and persecution that goes on, it's <u>pretty hard</u> to feel much <u>JOY</u> – <u>isn't it</u>?

When I look at the sufferings and struggles that some of our church family are going through, it's hard to feel much JOY – there either.

Even our sister church In **Terrigal** is **hurting right now**, after two recent arson attacks has left them unable to worship in the church; **not much JOY there either**!

Yet the Apostle Paul says we should (in Philippians 4:4) rejoice always and the Apostle James says "consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know the testing of your faith produces perseverance" (James. 1:2-3)

Are these guys for real?

I don't <u>always</u> feel joyous <u>when it's been a tough week [like this week]</u> and I have to stand by and watch my church family suffer both corporately and individually

But in our Old Testament reading from **Psalm 98** the psalmist gives us **some reasons why we can have joy** no matter what is going in our lives and in this world!

Let's take a look

[Please turn to Psalm 98]

# **Joy in the Old Testament (Psalm 98)**

## [Slide 3-Psalm 98]

Psalm 98 is a Royal Psalm praising God as the King of His people

The <u>writer of the psalm</u> – the **psalmist** - <u>calls upon people to sing</u> a <u>new song</u> to <u>the Lord their King</u> - <u>because of</u> - the <u>marvellous things</u> He has done.

What marvellous things?

V2 - The LORD has made his <u>salvation</u> known and revealed his righteousness to the nations.

V3 - He has <u>remembered</u> his love and his <u>faithfulness</u> to <u>Israel</u>;

<u>It begs the question</u> – <u>when in the Old Testament did God</u> **make His salvation known** – and - when did God remember **His love and faithfulness to Israel**?

Two huge events in Israel's history come to mind

The first was when God chose Moses to lead the Israelites out of slavery and captivity in Egypt and take them to the Promised Land.

This was a **huge salvation operation** – a **mass exodus** 

And <u>during the time of that exodus</u> – <u>God did indeed do marvellous things</u> – **with His right hand and holy arm** – He sent **10 plagues** to "<u>persuade</u>" the <u>Pharaoh</u> of Egypt to **let the Israelites go**.

So, the <u>psalmist is saying</u> the <u>people CAN</u> sing a new song <u>because of</u> the <u>victory</u> their God – the King - has given!

The second huge salvation event was when the Israelites were in Exile in Babylon – and held captive by the Babylonians.

Again, *God's right hand and holy arm* – enabled the Israelites to come out of Exile

– there were <u>no plagues this time</u> – <u>no battles</u> – <u>no armies involved</u>

God in His sovereign grace <u>simply arranged for Persia to take over the Babylonian</u>

<u>empire</u> – and <u>arranged for a Persian King</u> – <u>Cyrus</u> – to give a <u>decree</u> to let the

Israelites return to their homeland (Ezra 1:1-3)

Two <u>amazing salvation</u> events – the Exodus <u>and</u> the return from Exile

The Psalmist – <u>sees these events</u> as worth singing a <u>new song</u> of victory

Because as he says in v3 - all the ends of the earth have seen the salvation of our

God.

And because God is righteous and fair – look at v9 - for God comes to judge the earth. He will judge the world in righteousness and the peoples with equity.

The Psalmist says this should cause people to shout for <u>JOY</u> (v4) and burst into jubilant song (v4) – play music on harps and trumpets <u>and</u> blow the ram's horns (a symbol of God's authority and power!)

God has done such marvellous things – that the Psalmist says it's even like creation itself - is rejoicing – not just the people

So, in vv7-8 – the sea and its creatures are rejoicing – the world and all its occupants are rejoicing – even the rivers clap their hands – and mountains sing together

<u>That's the JOY of the Old Testament</u> – <u>but</u> the **Psalm also leaves with <u>a hint for the</u> future** - in v9

The Lord is coming to judge – and *He's coming with righteousness and equity*All people who are oppressed, struggling and weighed down with problems will be able to rejoice once again – because as the end of v6 says – people are singing to the Lord, the King of Heaven and Earth!

You see Psalm 98 – anticipates the coming of a King (v6) – that King is King Jesus – who came on that very first Christmas Day – And Psalm 98 also anticipates King Jesus coming again one day to judge in righteousness

<u>That's what's so great about the Old Testament</u> – <u>it has something to say to the people of Israel at the time</u> – <u>but</u> - **it <u>always</u> points ahead to the New Testament and to Jesus!** 

<u>Let's look then at that first Christmas Day</u> – and **the birth of King Jesus** [Please turn to our NT passage from Luke 2:1-12]

What JOY can we find there?

[Slide 4-Joy NT Heading]

**The Joy of the New Testament (Luke 2:1-12)** 

[Slide 4a-promises]

<u>1st – there's the **JOY** of knowing that</u> **God remembers and keeps His promises** 

- God promised the Messiah King would come from the family line of David (2 Samuel 7)— and Joseph is a descendant of David (see v4)
- God also promised the Messiah would be born in <u>Bethlehem</u> (Micah 5:2) and Jesus was born in <u>Bethlehem</u>. (see vv6-7)

## [Slide 4b-Jesus for everyone]

2<sup>nd</sup> – there's the **JOY** of knowing that **Jesus came for** <u>everyone</u> – **not just the rich** and the popular

- Jesus' birth in humble surroundings is a hint of his humility as a servant
   king who will humble himself and lay down his life for us
- Jesus' first sleep in a manger an animal feeding trough hints that He will feeds us as the Bread of Life (John 6:35) in fact even the name Bethlehem means house of bread so this one born in the house of bread will give us our daily bread and spiritual food
- Jesus' first visitors and witnesses are humble shepherds often seen as outcasts, stinky and not to be trusted but God arranged for them to hear this good news first showing Jesus' birth is Good News for all even the marginalized and the unfortunate, even those disliked and disapproved of no one will be excluded if they come to Jesus

# 3rd – there's the JOY of knowing that Jesus is a Saviour

• Jesus came to seek those lost from God – and to save them for Heaven.

- This child will grow up to die on a cruel cross and take the punishment of sins away from us and give us forgiveness and 3 days after His death will rise again to show that death is not a problem for us if we believe in Him.
- You see without Jesus we are like the ancient Israelites in captivity and
   slavery to sin and in spiritual exile
- Jesus calls ALL who are lost from God to repent come out of spiritual
   exile and turn back to God and believe in Jesus the Saviour

So, we CAN have JOY – despite what's going on in our lives and in this world

We CAN rejoice knowing – we have a Saviour – who saves us for Heaven

We <u>CAN</u> rejoice knowing – that even when someone dies sooner than we expected – and they believe in Jesus' death and resurrection – their soul is with the Lord in Heaven straight away – and one day – they will get a new resurrected body - when Jesus returns.

We <u>CAN</u> have <u>JOY</u> in knowing that - our brother <u>Adam</u> – is experiencing that <u>JOY</u> of being with the Lord right now. And one day he will get a new body that's <u>not</u> broken and full of cancer! Praise God!

# **Challenge**

In our Bible Study this week - we were asked what gives us JOY?

## We had **various** answers

## Things like...

- Meaningful relationships with family, friends and spouses
- Personal and professional achievements
- Family gatherings
- Acts of kindness
- Creative activities, like: art, music, writing, movies and cooking
- Following our favourite sports-team
- National events and successes
- Giving Christmas gifts
- Being alive!
- Church family gatherings/worship/hymns/songs
- Joy when God's Word speaks to us personally
- Joy when someone chooses to follow Jesus!
- Joy in having a personal relationship with the Lord
- Joy in knowing that Jesus has defeated sin and death!

<u>Personally</u> – I get great <u>JOY</u> when someone who was <u>lost</u> from God - starts following JESUS!

[Slide 5-Challenge]

But I'd like to challenge us – this morning - to think about those we know who are LOST from God.

My challenge for this Christmastime – is to tell those who are LOST – about King

Jesus the Saviour – that He is the way to be found - and - that He saves people for

Heaven. Ask those who are lost - to consider repenting – and to follow Jesus.

in Luke 15:10 - Jesus says – "I tell you, there is rejoicing in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents."

Jesus is saying that the angels in Heaven - rejoice - when people hand their lives to Jesus

We can share in the angels' JOY – if we take up the challenge - to tell people who are LOST from God - about Jesus!

But remember there's an URGENCY - to tell those who are LOST about Jesus the Saviour - because - Psalm 98 says - the King - King Jesus - is coming again one day to judge with righteousness and equity (fairness) and we don't know when.

We don't want <u>ANYONE</u> to be <u>lost</u> from God <u>forever</u>, do we?

[Slide 6-2 Peter 3:9]

Neither does God – here's how the Apostle Peter puts it in 2 Peter 3:9

The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness.

Instead, he is patient with you, not wanting <u>anyone</u> to <u>perish</u>, but everyone to

come to <u>repentance</u>.

WE - are **God's instruments** in enabling people who are lost to come to repentance.

And as we do that, WE WILL experience exceedingly great JOY!

Let's pray...

Father God, thank you we can sing a NEW SONG of joy

Knowing that God remembers and keeps His promises!

Knowing that Jesus came for everyone!

And knowing that Jesus is the Saviour King – who saves people for Heaven!

Help us share that joy with those lost with God – this Christmas and beyond

In Jesus name, we pray. Amen!
