Victory Over Death (1 Corinthians 15)

1 Corinthians 15:1-8 & 12-22 & 35-38 & 42-44 & 50-58 The Resurrection of Christ

15 Now, brothers and sisters, I want to remind you of the gospel I preached to you, which you received and on which you have taken your stand. ² By this gospel you are saved, if you hold firmly to the word I preached to you. Otherwise, you have believed in vain.

³ For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, ⁴ that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures, ⁵ and that he appeared to Cephas, and then to the Twelve. ⁶ After that, he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers and sisters at the same time, most of whom are still living, though some have fallen asleep. ⁵ Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles, ⁵ and last of all he appeared to me also, as to one abnormally born.

The Resurrection of the Dead

¹² But if it is preached that Christ has been raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? ¹³ If there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. ¹⁴ And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith. ¹⁵ More than that, we are then found to be false witnesses about God, for we have testified about God that he raised Christ from the dead. But he did not raise him if in fact the dead are not raised. ¹⁶ For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised either. ¹⁷ And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins. ¹⁸ Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ are lost. ¹⁹ If only for this life we have hope in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

²⁰ But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. ²¹ For since death came through a man, the resurrection of the dead comes also through a man. ²² For as in Adam all die, so in Christ all will be made alive.

The Resurrection Body

³⁵ But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body will they come?" ³⁶ How foolish! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. ³⁷ When you sow, you do not plant the body that will be, but just a seed, perhaps of wheat or of something else. ³⁸ But God gives it a body as he has determined, and to each kind of seed he gives its own body.

⁴² So will it be with the resurrection of the dead. The body that is sown is perishable, it is raised imperishable; ⁴³ it is sown in dishonour, it is raised in glory; it is sown in weakness, it is raised in power; ⁴⁴ it is sown a natural body, it is raised a spiritual body.

If there is a natural body, there is also a spiritual body.

⁵⁰ I declare to you, brothers and sisters, that flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable. ⁵¹ Listen, I tell you a mystery: We will not all sleep, but we will all be changed— ⁵² in a flash, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed. ⁵³ For the perishable must clothe itself with the imperishable, and the mortal with immortality. ⁵⁴ When the perishable has been clothed with the imperishable, and the mortal with immortality, then the saying that is written will come true: "Death has been swallowed up in victory."

⁵⁵ "Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?"

⁵⁶ The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. ⁵⁷ But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

⁵⁸ Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor in the Lord is not in vain.

Please have your Bibles opened to 1 Corinthians 15 starting at verse 1

There's an **outline** for you to take **notes.** Let me **pray** first. Let's pray...

Intro/Death/What If?

Death is a monster!

Having conducted over **100 funerals** – I've **seen firsthand** the **devastating effect** the **death of a loved one** has on a family!

Death is a monster!

What I've **noticed** at these **funerals** is

- When the funeral is for an unbeliever or for a believer where most if not all of the family are non-believers there is incredible grief and sorrow and sadness and very little hope for those in attendance.
- Whereas when the funeral is for a believer yes there's still grief and sorrow
 but there's also incredible thanks to God and rejoicing that there is the certain hope of Heaven for the deceased and for the believers in attendance and there is the certain hope of resurrection

As some of you know – before I went into ministry I was a computer programmer.

When I was writing a program – I had to think of every scenario that the user of my program my do. For example – they might type in letters instead of numbers for their date of birth – or say they were born like 3 centuries ago or born in the future.

I was <u>constantly asking myself</u> – "what if" they do this, "what if" they do that.
Unfortunately, it means my brain is wired that way now!

So, <u>I'm always thinking</u> "what if" my car breaks down coming to church, "what if" my USB with my scripture lesson doesn't work at school – <u>so I now have 5</u> backups!

It also means when I conduct funerals now – I ask myself - "what if" it were me in the coffin, how would that affect my family and friends.

Context (1 Corinthians 15:12, 32)

The Apostle Paul would make a good computer programmer.

Chapter 15 of 1 Corinthians is a "what if" chapter.

The **context** is - the <u>Corinthians that Paul was writing to are basically asking the question based on v12 – "what if" there is no resurrection of the dead!

[Slide-v12]</u>

V12 says - But if it is preached that Christ has been raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead?

Greek culture of the day believed that <u>only</u> the <u>soul</u> is <u>immortal</u> and the body is nothing and doesn't matter – so why would there be a need to have a resurrected body?

[Slide-V32]

Also, Greek culture of the day believed the senses surrounding the immortal soul were given by Nature and could not be enjoyed beyond the grave – therefore there was the attitude as in v32 – let us eat and drink for tomorrow we die

Imagine if this life on Earth was all we had – we go through the ups and downs of life – and then die – that's it – dead and buried – nothing more.

That would certainly influence how we live out our life – wouldn't it?

So, because of this doubt of a resurrected body

First up, in verses 1 to 11 – Paul defines the Gospel and concludes that the Gospel says Jesus rose from the dead – so Jesus had a resurrected body.

[Slide-Point 1]

1. The Gospel says Jesus rose from the Dead (1 Cor 15:1-11)

See v1 Paul says – I preached this Gospel to you Corinthians - remember – and you received it – and took a stand upon it – in other words you believed it

So, what is this Gospel?

See V3 – the Gospel is – Christ died for our sins – it's a simple statement but it covers the entire Bible's history – it takes us back to the first people Adam and Eve and the Garden of Eden – and it takes us back to the fact that they disobeyed God's rule – and ate the forbidden fruit – and by doing so – sin (disobeying God) came into the world – and that sin angered God because He cannot look at sin – and so with that sin - the punishment for sin came into the world – namely death. But here Paul says – Christ died for our sins.

By God's grace (undeserved favour) He sent His Son Jesus [The Christ – chosen One] to Earth on a rescue mission - and Christ Jesus died on the cross for our sins to be put on Him and He gave us forgiveness – this is the major theme Paul

preaches in this **letter** (as 1 Cor 2:2 says - For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified)

We also see that Christ dying for our sins - was all part of Scripture — still in v3 it says — according to Scripture — the Bible said He would die — see Psalm 22 or Isaiah 53 for example

The **Gospel** also **includes** that **Jesus was buried** – <u>to be buried</u> **Jesus** <u>had</u> **to die** – this is **important** because **remember** the **punishment for sin** is <u>death</u> – so if Jesus takes our punishment – then **He must die** in our place

But the Gospel continues – v4 – that God the **Father raised Jesus** from the dead on the **3**rd **day** – and <u>again</u> it's **according to Scriptures** – the **Bible said He would rise** from the dead [Ps 16:10; 30:3; Hos 13:14; Jonah 1:17/Matt 12:40; 16:4; Luke 30:10; Acts 2:24-28] – and **Jesus Himself said He would rise** after 3 days.

Why is the resurrection important?

<u>Without</u> the **resurrection** – the <u>punishment</u> for sin is <u>not</u> removed – <u>death still</u> wins

But when Jesus rose – he showed and proved – death <u>can't</u> hold him down!

That's why the Apostle Paul takes the Corinthians back to the Gospel

Because the <u>resurrection</u> of Jesus is <u>crucial</u> to the Gospel

<u>Unless Jesus dies for sin to be forgiven – unless Jesus takes the punishment from sin away from us – and <u>unless Jesus removes</u> the <u>punishment of sin altogether</u> by

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defeating death and being raised to life – and <u>unless</u> all this happens <u>we can't</u> be resurrected either – then there's <u>no</u> Gospel – <u>no</u> Good News – it's <u>just</u> bad news!

Now <u>remember</u> the Corinthians doubted the resurrection of the body

So, Paul sets out to prove the resurrection is true

Now we don't necessarily need proof

We could just simply have faith and believe!

After all **faith** is **believing** something **without** necessarily **being able to see** it - or **prove** it

The **proof** Paul gives is **eye witnesses** – see verses 5 to 8

Eye witnesses are the key to prove <u>any</u> historical event – people were there at the time of the historical event and witnessed it

<u>In this case</u> – the risen **Jesus appeared** to **Peter**, the **Apostles**, over **500 people** – most still living in Paul's time – so anyone can check out what they saw – and He also appeared to **James** and to **Paul himself**

That's an incredible number of witnesses. We don't require that many witnesses in a court today to prove a case. Even in OT times – only 2 or 3 witnesses were enough to prove a case (Deut 19:15)

The other reason for mentioning these witnesses, is so that Paul can say in verse 11 – these witnesses whether Paul or any of the others – they <u>all</u> had the same message to preach – the Gospel – that Jesus died and rose again – this is what <u>they preached</u> – and this is what the Corinthians <u>believed</u> – and it's what <u>us</u>

Toukleyians <u>believe</u> too! I pray!

So, the **Gospel** is <u>personal</u> – it's <u>not just</u> <u>believing</u> an <u>historical event</u> – it's <u>believing</u> that <u>Jesus died for me</u> – and <u>Jesus rose for me</u> – and <u>Jesus</u> is <u>Lord</u> of <u>my</u> <u>life</u> – as v2 says – <u>by</u> the <u>Gospel YOU</u> are <u>saved</u>

What Paul has done then is to <u>prove conclusively</u> that Jesus rose from the dead – and that's <u>fundamental</u> to the Gospel - that's <u>fundamental</u> for the Corinthians <u>and</u> fundamental for <u>us</u> – as he'll go on to explain

Paul's 2nd point – because the Gospel says Jesus rose from the dead – we <u>also</u> rise from the dead – that's in verses 12 to 34

[Slide-Point 2]

2. Because Jesus rose, we rise from the Dead (1 Cor 15:12-34)

Paul argues in v12 – $\underline{\text{how}}$ can the Corinthians say there's no resurrection of the dead – $\underline{\text{l've}}$ just proven conclusively Jesus rose from the dead? He continues his argument – $\underline{\text{if}}$ there's $\underline{\text{no}}$ resurrection of the dead there are a number of problems:

- Jesus if the concept of raising people from the dead doesn't exist.

 Jesus's resurrection is paramount for anyone else to be raised from the dead
- Also, <u>if</u> Jesus <u>hasn't</u> been <u>raised</u> <u>no amount</u> of <u>preaching</u> will <u>make</u> any <u>difference</u> it's just a <u>waste of time</u> I can preach all day but if the foundation of the preaching which is Jesus' was raised to life is not true it's <u>useless preaching</u> v14

- It also means, Paul and the other apostles are false witnesses they're
 preaching lies v15
- It also means <u>our</u> faith is futile we're basically believing a lie if Jesus hasn't been raised back to life. <u>If some how</u> they found a tomb in Jerusalem and found Jesus' bones in it <u>and</u> could somehow prove it <u>what would that do to our faith?</u> Our faith would be completely shattered wouldn't it?
- And <u>if Jesus hasn't been raised</u> then V17 then we're <u>still in our sins</u>.
 For our sins to be forgiven Jesus <u>has</u> to die and then rise again to complete the sacrifice and remove the punishment for sin which is death.
- And <u>if Jesus hasn't been raised</u> then all the **believers who** have
 already died have died believing a lie and they're lost and gone
 forever v18
- If all we have is a bit of inspiration in this life then we're in a sorry
 state aren't we v19

But **Paul** <u>concludes</u> – v20 – **all these problems** <u>don't</u> exist - <u>because</u> Jesus <u>has</u> been raised!

Paul can even refer to death as sleeping – because death is not this evil monster we have to face – because of Jesus' resurrection

Paul says **Jesus** is **like** the **first in a long line of people raised from** the **dead** – see v20 – Jesus' is the **firstfruits** of the **harvest** of people to be raised. **Firstfruits** of a

crop **guarantee** there's **more** of the **crop to come**. **Jesus'** resurrection **guarantees** every **believer's resurrection**.

He compares the first man Adam (v22) – with Jesus

- Adam brought death to <u>everyone</u>. Because of Adam's sin we all inherit sin and death
- But Jesus brought life leading to eternal life to those who believe in
 Him through His death & resurrection

<u>Then</u> comes the **end** – Paul says – v24 – when **Jesus delivers** the **kingdom** <u>into</u> the **Father's hands** – <u>when</u> **He** has **defeated** all **powers** of **evil**In fact, **Jesus** is **reigning** <u>now</u> – v25 – it's not like He's died and rose and gone to Heaven and left us to our own devices – <u>He's reigning now</u> – **making sure all enemies are defeated**

Including the **final enemy** which is **death** –

When will this end happen? When Jesus returns (see 1 The 4)

Paul also throws in a couple of **extra reasons** why the **resurrection** of believers is **true**

- See v29 why do people offer to be baptized for those who are
 already in the grave? What's the point of them doing that, if there's no
 resurrection of their body?
- And v30 32 Paul asks why does he and other preachers risk all sorts of danger (like Paul did in Ephesus) if there's no resurrection. He's saying do you think we'd risk our necks if there was no chance that the Page 10 of 15

resurrection is true? **Preaching** the **death** and **resurrection** of **Jesus** - is Paul's **sole purpose for ministry**.

He finishes his point in v33 – warning the Corinthians (and us) not to by hoodwinked by any talk of there being no resurrection. Paul even quotes a Greek poet, Meander, "bad company corrupts good character". His point is - if we hang around with people with unbiblical thinking; we can be deceived.

Paul's 3rd point

<u>Because</u> the **Gospel says Jesus rose** from the dead, which <u>also means</u> we will rise from the dead – the **Gospel guarantees we will have a resurrected body** – that's verses 35-57

[Slide-Point 3]

3. The Gospel guarantees a resurrected body (1 Cor 15:35-57)

See v35 – Paul asks the question that – <u>he assumes</u> would be next question on the doubter's lips

If we are going to rise from the dead – what kind of body will we have?

To explain what the resurrected body will be like - Paul uses a few analogies:

Analogy 1 – is a farming analogy – what we sow in the ground can't come to life unless it dies. Wheat has 2 modes of existence – a seed buried in the ground which is like it's dead – and then a crop of wheat springs to life when the seed grows. In the same way – our earthly body has to die (buried or cremated) to rise & grow as our spiritual heavenly body made for eternity.

<u>Analogy 2</u> – <u>Just like</u> there are different earthly bodies – like people, animals, birds and fish – so there are different kinds of heavenly bodies. There are <u>even</u> heavenly bodies like the sun, moon and stars.

His point is that our earthly body has different attributes to our heavenly body.

Our **earthly body** is **perishable** (it **dies**) – our **resurrected** body will be **imperishable** (it **lives forever**)

Our earthly body is full of dishonour (because it's sinful) – whereas our resurrected body is glorious (because it's pure and sinless because of Jesus)

Our earthly body is natural (physical) – whereas our resurrected body is spiritual.

The bottom line is – our earthly body is made for earth and our heavenly body is made for heaven.

Comparing Adam and Jesus again – in vv45-49 – Paul says:

<u>All</u> human beings share Adam's nature and are earthly – <u>but</u> Christians <u>also</u> share Jesus' nature – and are heavenly.

For Christians there is the guaranteed continuity of existence with the resurrection of their body and its transformation into the likeness of Jesus.

<u>Having this promise</u> of a **resurrected body** because of Jesus – **gives us** <u>assurance</u> – that <u>our</u> **earthly perishable body** will <u>one day</u> be **changed** into a **heavenly imperishable body**.

<u>This happens</u> – v52 – <u>when</u> **Jesus returns** – and the **trumpet sounds** – those **already dead** will be **raised** with **imperishable** bodies – <u>and those</u> **still alive** will be **changed** – all **in** the **twinkling** of an **eye**.

Paul describes this as the final victory over death

Death **no longer** has any **sting**.

What wonderful assurance Christians have of living with God forever in Heaven – it's not a maybe – or if I'm good enough – it's guaranteed because of our faith in Jesus. This is the promise of the Gospel.

And it means Christians don't need to be afraid of dying!

The Gospel Requires our Response (v58)

Now - the **Gospel** is <u>not just something cognitive</u>, **something that we** just **merely KNOW** – it **requires** a <u>response</u> in our lives

The Gospel requires us to belief it – to have faith in it.

Our faith in the Gospel means we're right with God and saved.

But our faith must never be alone.

Our response must be head, heart AND hands:

In v58 – Paul gives **our response** to the Gospel – <u>actually</u> **3 responses**[Slide-Response]

 Stand firm – it means to refuse to change our position on the truth of the Gospel of Jesus' death and resurrection. This is the rock-solid foundation that our faith is built on. The rock-solid guarantee of our own resurrection one day

- this guarantee <u>should be the foundation</u> we will **build our lives on** and we should **never turn away** from <u>that</u> **faith**.
- 2. Let nothing move you we are to be an immovable object when it comes to our belief in the Gospel and particularly the resurrection. We are not to be led astray by other people trying to undermine our belief or other people trying to sow doubts in our mind.
- 3. <u>Instead</u> we are to **give ourselves fully to the work of the Lord**. <u>What</u> is this work of the Lord? It is to bring the Gospel good news <u>to those who don't know</u>. That Gospel work is <u>not just telling</u> people about Jesus' love <u>but showing</u> them Jesus' love. As Jesus said "whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me" (Matt 25:40)

Conclusion

This work is <u>not</u> in vain – <u>because</u> we will be resurrected <u>one day and</u> as **Hebrews**6:10 says – which is where we'll finish

[Slide-Heb 6:10]

God is not unjust; he will not forget your work and the love you have shown Him as you have helped His people and continue to help them.

Heavenly Father,

We thank you for Jesus' victory over death – so that we have the certain hope of our own resurrection and eternal life with you to look forward.

Help us to stand firm in our faith in the Gospel – that Jesus died for our sins, was buried and rose again. Help nothing move or shake our faith in the finished work of Jesus.
